Here's how the Tigers were down 19 points at the finish. Dick Kurts came in as easy as a walk behind Savage in the backstroke but was disqualified by the judges because of an illegal stroke. Meadows put up a great battle for third place in the 100-yard freestyle, but he was beaten by Fred Savage, New Rochelle and Mamaroneck's 100-yard freestyle relay.

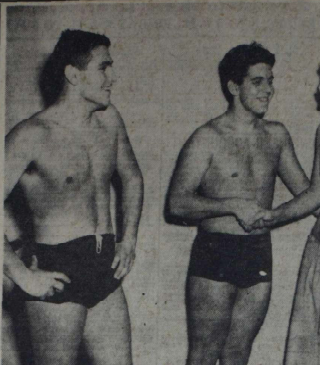
