17-Year-Old Student Saw Men Landed From U-Boat Near Home

FBI REMAINS SILENT

NEW YORK (AP)—FBI officials remained silent today as to how they picked up the trail of two alleged Nazi espionage agents who, the FBI said, slipped ashore from a U-boat Nov. 29 near Hancock Point, Me.

In the remote Maine fishing village, Deputy Sheriff Dana Hopkins said his son, Harvard, 17, a high school student, spotted the men the night they landed walking along a snow-covered highway near his home. He inspected the men carrying a rubber boat at night after their submarine had lain off the coast of Maine for a week. They were arrested several days ago.

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Americans Take Growing Toll In Nazi Weapons

LONDON (AP)—Escorted American heavy bombers invaded western Germany yesterday and day proved to meet any opposition in the Nazi-occupied New Year Day show of aerial strength. It was the 11th consecutive day of heavy bomber activity. Revised statistics showed at least 231 German aircraft destroyed. Monday's widespread combats, while Berlin declared 471 Allied planes were destroyed, most of them on the ground in morning swoops on fighter bases behind the western front.

Triple Goal Attained In Bond Drive

Servicemen's Purchase Of \$4,000 Worth Puts Total Over 3 Million

E. BOND SALES SEUM

Because of a credit of \$4,000 allotted Saturday to Mamaronck for bonds purchased by servicemen, the village went over the three million mark, tripling its quota for the 6th War Loan drive, according to final figures released today by Gabriel Wendel, chairman of the War Finance Committee. The \$4,000 credit brought the amount of bonds purchased by servicemen during the drive up to \$9,725.

"That's a remarkable record," Mr. Wendel commented, "and something everybody should recognize. In addition to spilling their blood, these boys are buying bonds to help win this war." Including the purchase of \$2,500,000 in corporation bonds by the Union Savings Bank, the final figures reached \$10,427.50. In spite of the fact that the quota was \$4,000, the village was ahead because there was a slump in the purchase of E bonds by individuals in smaller denominations. In other words, 800 more E bonds were sold during the 6th, but the total sales in money were about \$20,000 less than in the former.

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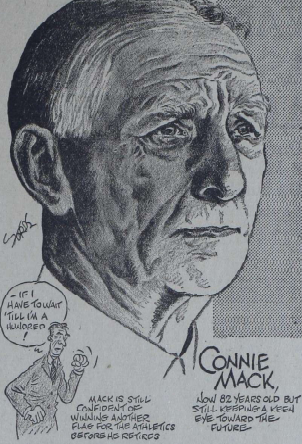

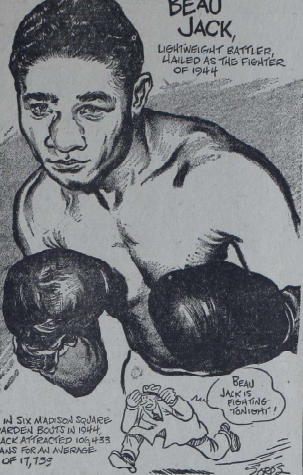

Town of Rye Welfare Officer James S. Miner today announced he will go to Albany on Wednesday to oppose efforts to organize support for washing out residence requirements for relief in New York State that will be made at the convention of the New York State Association of Public Welfare Officers. Bills pending in the Albany Legislature to eliminate settlement regulations under the Welfare Law.

Emerson, of New Rochelle, who is making known his intentions to attend the convention and oppose efforts to eliminate the residence requirements, declared that "instead of washing out residence settlement, should increase the requirements to four or five years, since all states around us have that requirement."

In opposition to the amendment to wash out residence requirements, Mr. Miner has the unanimous support of the Rye Town Council, Supervisor Sammarco said today.

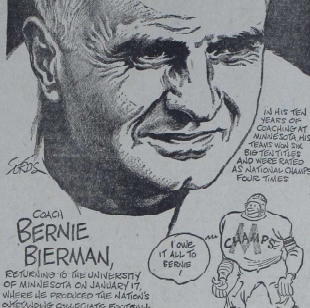

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U. S. Planning For Post-War Housing Boom

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government housing experts are planning for post-war housing construction.

John D. Blanford, Jr., national housing administrator, told a Senate subcommittee on postwar housing that some ideas might be changed later but at present the agency is thinking along these lines:

For the moderate income home buyer, a plan for a small down payment and a provision establishing the right to defer an agreed upon number of principal payments in event of unemployment, illness or similar reasons.

For the builders, "some form of government insurance, possibly with guarantee features, which would assure them adequate construction money at low cost, some reduction in their marketing risks, and some assurance or modification of their commitment beyond a single building season."

Blanford added in testimony to the committee yesterday that the agency would be federal loans or other aids to help cities replace "blighted areas" with new housing.

Pupil Labor Curbed By Assembly Bill

ALBANY (AP)—Employment of school children, other than on farms, now widely used to combat wartime manpower shortages, would be limited under a bill introduced this week by Assemblyman John R. Brook, New York City Republican.

Pupils between the ages of 16 and 17 would be limited to four hours work in a school day, 28 hours in a week when school was in session, eight hours on a day when school was not in session, and six days in any week.

Those under 16 would be allowed to work a maximum of three hours during a school day, 23 hours during a school week, eight hours on a non-school day, and six days in any week.

Last year a bill offered by Brook and Senator Frederick R. Condit, Jr., also a New York City Republican, limiting the combined school-work hours of children under 18 precipitated a lengthy battle which was defeated.

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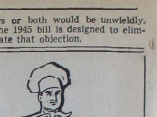

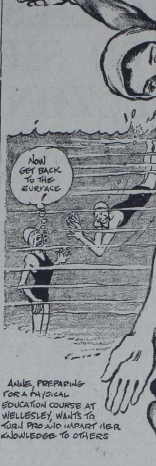
