Lone Citizen Irked By Snow Delay

Klein Describes Late Larchmont Clearance As "Disgraceful"
REPORT PRESENTED

Sounding like a lone voice in the wilderness, only one resident appeared at the meeting of the Larchmont Board of Trustees last night to complain about the delay in snow removal. He told the board he thought it was a "disgraceful condition."

Apparently the 5,000 other residents had no complaints, a turnout compared with the number of calls that flooded the town's switchboards during the storm.

In anticipation of a large turnout of residents, several rows of chairs had been set up for the meeting, but only A. Norman Klein of 6 West Avenue, Larchmont, showed up. Mayor Spencer Green said, "Do you think you could sleep with a good conscience in the next 10 days, Mr. Mayor?"

Armed with photographs taken last Sunday, he showed the board copies of snow he had from his father's store on Palmer Avenue, of which he is assistant manager, and also complained about the cars parked on West Avenue which prevented the removal of snow from that street.

Village Engineer Arthur Richards explained that the plows had been unable to get into West and East Avenues because of the parked cars and said that there were still some cars in there which would impede snow removal.

Mayor Green sent to Police Chief William J. Keenan to ask what's being done to remove the cars.

The chief replied that his men have notified owners of all stalled cars to get them out. He added that about three weeks ago his department had tagged more than 100 parked cars, warning the owners to move them because they would impede snow removal. Most of the people, he said, complained that they had no place to park their cars. He said he advised them to use the parking lots at the railroad station.

The Mayor set noon today as the deadline for the removal of all stalled cars and instructed Chief Keenan that any cars found unremoved are to be towed out and the owners charged for the service.

He then read a report submitted by Chief Keenan on his department's activities during the snow storm emergency which showed that the police received an average of one telephone call every three minutes on the day of the storm, for assistance or to file a complaint.

"I think the police department deserves a word of commendation for the services they performed during the emergency," Mayor Green said and instructed that it be so noted in the minutes of the meeting.

Meanwhile, Mr. Klein, who was momentarily lost in the shuffle, came back to the board with "What about the next time? Who's responsible for the removal of the snow? Larchmont is in a disgraceful condition."

"Do you think this situation is peculiar to Larchmont?" Mayor Green asked.

"Larchmont is the worst in Westchester County," he answered, and compared it with Rye, Harrison, Manamorneck and New Rochelle.

At the mention of New Rochelle, a mild howl went up from the board members by Mr. Klein contended that the intersection of North Avenue and Huguenot Street in New Rochelle, which is cleared to the pavement by Sunday night, two days after the storm.

"Do you think the taxpayers of this community are willing to expand the same amount as New Rochelle for snow removal of a street that occurs once in 25 years?" the mayor asked.

"Do you think you could sleep with a good conscience in the past 10 days, Mr. Mayor, with conditions as they were and a Police Department that's not adequate and men sleeping in fire houses?" he asked.

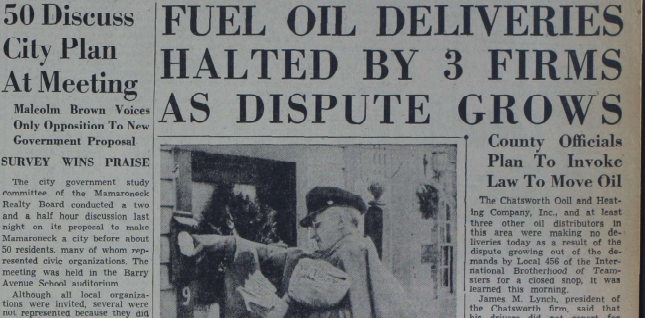

PRESIDENT'S BUDGET TOPS 39 BILLION FOR PEACE AND REARMAMENT

79 P. C. Reflects War Cost, Truman Tells Congress

WASHINGTON—President Truman fired an unprecedented peacetime budget of \$39,669,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

He told the hostile Republican Congress nearly four-fifths of the spending estimate represents the aftermath of World War 2 and efforts to head off World War 3.

Although it exceeds by \$2,000,000,000 his budget request for the current year, Mr. Truman declared its preparation was governed by "real standards of operating economy" in the Government.

"The plain fact is," he said in his accompanying message, "that our budget is not realistic until we have met our international responsibilities and can see the way clear to a peaceful and prosperous world."

In an oblique reference to the hoped-for effect of foreign aid in increasing the country's "economic growth," Mr. Truman said:

"Should failure of these programs result in a further extension of totalitarian rule, we would have to re-evaluate our security position and take whatever steps might be necessary under the circumstances."

Mr. Truman declared that 79 per cent of the expenditures he proposed "directly reflect the effects of war, and efforts to prevent a future war."

In this class he listed the two biggest items in his budget: \$14,000,000,000 for national defense, 28 per cent of the total and \$10,000,000,000 for foreign and other international affairs, 25 per cent of the total and up \$1,000,000,000 from the previous year.

After allowing for veterans benefits and interest on the public debt and tax refunds, Mr. Truman said only 21 per cent of the outlay was devoted to social welfare and ordinary expenses of Government.

He said that the Federal Reserve will yield \$7,480,000,000 this year and another of \$4,800,000,000 in the following 12 months if Congress approves his fiscal plan.

The Chief Executive said that if Congress approves his fiscal plan, it will save \$46,467,000,000 in war-time costs.

Mr. Truman said that the Government should use all excess over spending the scale down the \$28,000,000,000 public debt. He (Continued on Page Three)

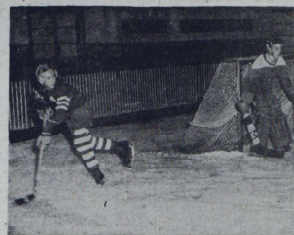

Town Likely To Skip Tax For 3 Years

ESTABLISHED OCT. 1, 1925

Supervisor Sees No General Levy Through 1950, Perhaps 1951

GIVES ANNUAL REPORT

The possibility of eliminating the general town tax levy through 1950 and "perhaps 1951" is foreseen by Town Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville in his annual report on the state of the Town of Mamaroneck submitted at the recent Town Council meeting.

Mr. Mandeville said that if the Town Council decides to set up a reserve sufficient to pay the debt service for 1949, 1950, and 1951, of \$284,500 and assuming that \$150,000 would be needed to pay the school and county, and barring any unforeseen emergency, it would appear that sufficient funds are at hand to eliminate a town tax through 1950 and perhaps 1951.

The supervisor also recommended in his report that the town continue to follow the pay-as-you-go plan to the extent that it is possible to adopt uniform policy in the annual and semi-annual levies of the Town.

The complement of the Larchmont Police Department has three sergeants. At present, two vacancies exist. Sgt. Harry Madolen holds a permanent appointment. While Officer Zimmerman was given a provisional appointment, he is present on March 3, 1948. The third position has been vacant for the last eight years.

Officer Adams, being the only veteran on the list, is reasonably assured of being appointed as the position of sergeant in the Town Police Department, for which one vacancy exists.

Should the Larchmont Village Board, the appointing body, decide to fill the third vacancy, it has the privilege of selecting a non-veteran list member from the non-veteran list. Hearing that group are Officers Boye, Manning and Zimmerman.
