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Panel Discussion Shows Parents See Child's Scope

Parents do not expect too much of their children, it was decided last night at a panel discussion meeting at Central School, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association in the school auditorium.

Members of the panel, which was moderated by Mrs. Herbert Biber, Anson Beaver, Mrs. Harry G. Walter, Jr., Herbert Morrison and Dr. Donovin Eaton, they

were presented by Mrs. Elinor Joyner, parent-education chairman. Topic of the discussion was "Do We Demand Too Much of Our Children?"

First speaker was Mr. Beaver, who stated that "we demand too much in competition" which he said is rampant in small children.

"The world demands successful competition, and proper development to this end is important," he asserted. Mr. Beaver spoke briefly on extra-curricular activities, including riding, dancing, skating and music, which consume, take too much of the child's hours after school.

"We do not demand too much of our children in general, but too much in social relationships from kindergarten and pre-school age youngsters," he said.

Mrs. Walter, who said that the word demand is too strong and that "expect" should be substituted, stressed the fact that children should learn respect for a person capable of operating a car for a period longer than necessary to get without assistance.

Narrowing his reasons for stating that "we do not expect enough on our children," Mr. Morganth criticized "no sense of responsibility among teen-agers' deplorable manners and lack of respect at schools." He said that when a child is started in the right direction at home, he will continue on that path.

Dr. Eaton, school psychologist, stated that "limiting is very important and should be exercised by the parent who is in charge of the child's life." He said that parents should expect as much as the children can handle at different age levels, and stated, adding that they must develop gradually the ideas of "mine and thine."

Mr. Brown gave a summary, concluding that the majority agree that parents do not expect too much of their children. He urged parents to not expect too much during school hours to observe their work.

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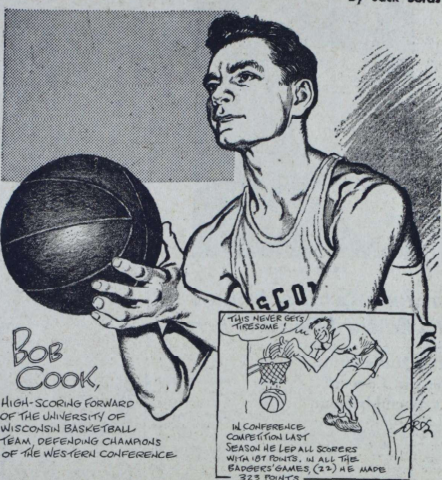

The Army chief of Staff's statement referred to entry of his name in the New Hampshire Presidential Primary March 9.

"I've written Leonard V. Finner Publisher of the New Hampshire Union Leader, that for two weeks he had been waiting to be named to the post, but I was refrained from making the bid statement that I would not accept nomination."

The first, Eisenhower said, was that such an expression would "smack of defeat."

A second and deeper reason, the General added, was a "persistent doubt that I could phrase a flat refusal without appearing to violate that concept of duty to country which I have upon every good citizen to his place no limitation upon his readiness to serve in any designated capacity."

In this connection, Eisenhower said, he has a personal conviction that "unless an individual feels some kind of compulsion and special qualifications to enter the political arena—which I do not—there is no reason for his violation of the highest standards of American citizenship." He continued:

"It was only the possible misinterpretation of my attitude that caused me concern and so long as I could believe that more denial of political ambition would prevent serious misunderstanding and misdirected effort, I was prepared to say more."

It would seem almost superfluous for me to add that as long as I live I shall hold myself in instant readiness to respond to any call by the Government to military duty."

Eisenhower is scheduled to go on terminal leave from the Army today. He will be in June will become president.

Returning from the Baltic Sea area, the ship was bound for Baltimore with a cargo of Swedish iron ore.

For five days, the little vessel tossed about like a toothpick in gales approaching 50-mile velocity, accompanied by mountainous seas with all decks awash and all hands hanging on.

Finally, the seas in the No. 3 hold forward of the bridge split and the ship cracked 18 feet across.

"It had split all the way," Lund said, "we would have gone under for sure."

The captain allowed course and ordered full steam ahead for Sweden, Norway, where the ship finally limped into port for repairs.

Simon reported at Baltimore many days later with her cargo. Lund's voyage lasted 94 days.

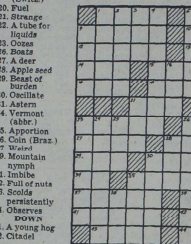

PSC Delays New Haven's Commuter Fare Rise Rule

ALBANY—Westchester commuters on the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad will not have to pay higher fares at least until next Aug. 12, under an order by the Public Service Commission continuing its suspension of proposed new higher rates.

The railroad asked the commission to approve new rates to equal the increase granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission for interstate communication fares, and sought to have the higher rates become effective tomorrow, Feb. 1.

The Commission suspended the proposed rate schedule until Feb. 12, and under its new order required the railroad to submit six months' pointing out to the Interstate Commerce Commission for its review.

The Commission recently granted an interim increase of 10 per cent on commutation rates of the New York Central Railroad, effective after midnight, to have. For several years Westchester commuters on the New Haven have paid higher rates than those using the Central.

Charts projected on a screen and displayed on hand showed how closely the curve of Federal Reserve Board reports of sales in the district parallel the sales in the given department, retail stores. The curve is low in January, rises to May, falls in July and September, and goes high in December with the Christmas season.

Wesley Geer, promotion assistant, explained other charts and how they can be used to advantage by advertisers.

Frank Kitchard, publicity manager of the division, urged that the publication Success Story which fills unutilized advertising space in newspapers and magazines be prepared for merchants to place their own business developments in the trade.

Editor of Retail explained how news in the newspaper can be used in a diagrammed four-page form of hundreds of trade papers and publications to keep advertising managers and their accounts abreast of latest business developments.

Julius Hanson, promotion manager of the bureau, described in detail the scientific tools of advertising being used by specific newspapers and store executives for correct allocation of appropriations for more effective newspaper advertising.

Louder U. S. Voice In Europe Asked

WASHINGTON, (AP)—An aggressive foreign information program will serve the war of words which Secretary of State Acheson recommended yesterday by a joint Congressional committee.

The committee took 22 European countries last Fall to study United States information and education activities. It was headed by Rep. Tom Lister (R. N. C.) and included seven House and five Senate members.

Their unanimous report said they found the present program "wholly inadequate" with the U. S. Information Service abroad "only a whisper."

No Tax Boost In Governor's Record Budget

(Continued from Page One) next year's operating surplus is estimated to \$1,800,000, the smallest since he took office in 1943.

The Governor, a candidate for the Republican Presidential nomination, told the legislature that "the State must readjust its fiscal operations to the level of production in which the nation's economy has been operating."

He said that "in the midst of the serious confusion of national finances, bank credit, prices and wages, the State must endeavor to maintain stability in the management of its own affairs and thereby, by the eventual restoration of national stability."

This was interpreted by political observers as another indirect threat to President Truman.

In his annual message to the Legislature, Dewey charged Truman of responsibility for the present economic situation.

Dewey predicted his budget "upon an expectation that inflation will be curbed before long by wise governmental action and exercise of due restraints by business, labor and farmers."

He warned, however, that "our budgetary balance is precarious and may be really upset by any untoward development in the nation's economy."

Higher tax rates would remove existing incentives toward further operational economies, while increasing pressures on the State government to spend more.

Increased rates also would encourage the free spender to make even greater demands on our State government," Dewey said.

"Under the present circumstances," he added, "I recommend the continuation of existing tax rates. This means a 40 per cent 'forgiveness' on income taxes. It was 50 per cent last year, but the Legislature voted to cut it and apply the difference toward liquidation of the veterans' bonus debt."

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Gandhi's Body Is Cremated As Thousands Mourn, Son Sets Fire To Funeral Pyre

By G. MILTON KELLY Associated Press Staff NEW DELHI, INDIA—Mohandas K. Gandhi's youngest son touched off the funeral pyre that consumed the wasted body of the martyred Mahatma today in the Hindu tradition.

Tens of thousands of Indians sobbing and shouting the Mahatma's name, surged forward from crowds inflamed by the falling sticks of those fighting for a view of the procession.

Some trouble was reported also from the crowd. Police said it was "perhaps due to mistaken identity of Gandhi's associates" that some trouble was reported today.

Business stopped. India, whose people are mostly Hindu and Pakistan Moslem led, joined in tribute to Gandhi. He had striven for more than two decades to free the subcontinent from the British Empire. His efforts paid off when those two dominions were created Aug. 15.

The Pakistan Government with its capital in Karachi, closed all central and provincial government offices for today. Business ceased in Karachi, Lahore, Peshawar and other big Pakistan towns.

Mohamed Ali Jinnah, Pakistan's governor general, said he had had political differences with Gandhi but was shocked to hear of the Hindu leader's assassination.

"He was one of the greatest leaders of India and the Hindu community," Jinnah said, "and I wish to express my deep sense of sorrow and sympathy to the Hindus and Muslims."

Julius Poona, crown attorney for the property of persons known to have opposed Gandhi, filed a memorial in court for investigation of murder. He was arraigned under the name of Narayan Vinayak Gaidke of Doona. The 25-year-old assassin had pumped bullets into Gandhi's chest and leg at close range.

In procession to the Jurna pier was tumultuous all the way. At one point, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru was reported to have rescued a woman endangering by the crowd.

Meat Institute Discounts Talk Of Serious Shortage

WASHINGTON, (AP)—B. J. Egertz, associate director of the American Meat Institute today said that fears of a serious meat shortage are unfounded.

"The supply of meat per person next Spring and Summer will be about one-half an ounce less than last year, but there will be more meat per person during that period than before the war."

The Agriculture Department has forecast that a severe shortage will develop in the Spring and grow worse during the Summer. The subcommittee is considering a bill by Senator Vandenberg, R. Mich., which would let the Government get ready for meat rationing. It would be up to Congress to decide whether to put the program into effect later.

"Meat rationing will not work, but it would only create black markets and discourage production so that the supply of meat into 1949 would be even shorter," Egertz said in the prepared statement.
