The volume, "Henry Adams and His Friends" contains 377 pages and reveals much hitherto unknown information about the social historian and essayist. John Levensberg, reviewing the book in last Sunday's New York Times, said Mr. Cater "deserves special praise for his success in breathing life into this outwardly cold Bostonian man in revealing the friendliness and human sympathy that underlie the cynicism and intellectualism for which Adams is best known."

Mr. Cater was born in Alexandria, Va., and is compiling a history of World War II for the navy.

No Technical Advance Seen In Palestine

With immigration out of the present, the Jewish homeland must wait for needed technical help an indefinite length of time, he said, but pointed out also that in recent years, the flow of immigrants had consisted largely of technical men from the defeated nations of Europe. He expects that the same general type will characterize future immigration to Palestine.

Enumerating the present population as "mostly farmers," he drew a sharp distinction between their way of life and the technical improvements that enrich living in this country.

"The hotels here are an example," he said, "there is nothing even remotely like equal in Palestine."

Following the main address, it was announced that the local Zionist Organization will hereafter hold a meeting every month.

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Senior High P. T. A. Backs Teacher Pay Rise, Offers Proposal To Raise Funds

Group Suggests \$34,616 Loan To Finance Grant

The Mamaroneck Senior High School Parent Teacher Association has gone on record as approving the request of the teachers for a \$662 cost of living adjustment and has submitted to the Board of Education a possible solution as to how the necessary funds could be raised.

The association suggested that the Board borrow \$212 for each of the 163 teachers for a total of \$34,616 against the 1947-48 budget to be added to the \$300 to be derived from the State Education Office which the board has already offered. They further suggest that if the Board is reluctant to borrow this sum on its own initiative, the proposal be placed before the public in a referendum.

The letter, dated Jan. 17 and signed by Mrs. Mrs. R. H. Hirschman, Mrs. Louise Hillyard and Mrs. Nancy Coffinberger, members of the Legislative Committee, reads as follows:

"At a recent meeting of the Executive Board of the Mamaroneck Senior High School Parent Teacher Association, the undersigned were empowered to express the following suggestions to the Board:

"The Senior High School P. T. A. Executive Board wishes to go on record as approving the cost of living adjustment of \$662 as requested by the teachers, that this sum could be made up as follows: \$300 as suggested by Governor Dewey, \$150 as suggested by the State, \$150 as offered by the Board of Education out of existing funds and the balance of \$212 to be borrowed against the 1947-48 budget. The Board of Education is reluctant to borrow this sum on its own initiative, the undersigned therefore suggest that a public meeting be held and that the teachers be given the opportunity to express their views on this proposal.

"The Senior High School P. T. A. Board is in full accord with the above proposal and the P. T. A. Council that all information should be given to the public and that requirements should be openly discussed."

Britons Are Told Meat And Beer Cut Is On The Way

LONDON, (AP)—Austerity-edited Britons learned yesterday they are to get less fresh meat and less beer and that cuts in bread and bacon rations may be necessary soon.

This bad news to millions awaiting poorer fare that they did during the worst war years brought a scorching attack on the Labor Government, with Lord Woolton the wartime food minister, declaring in Parliament, "It is high time the people had a treat in this debilitating austerity."

Food Minister John Strachey announced that the fresh meat ration was cut because of a drop in home production of beef and mutton, but added that extra supplies of corned beef would go on sale to keep the weekly ration at an unshaking four pence (about 20 cents) worth of meat.

The output of beer, already so scarce, that some pubs are early nightily because their supplies have run out, will be cut 25 to 50 per cent immediately because of the coal shortage, the brewers announced.

State Housing Board Surveys Project In Rye

Investigation into living accommodations at the New York State Veterans' Emergency Housing Project, Rye, was conducted yesterday by David Junkin, representative of the New York State Division of Housing for the purpose of discovering what material may be used to make the accommodations more satisfactory for tenants.

One of the items of investigation is which Mr. Junkin particularly interested himself was the overheating of some of the apartments of the project which has caused children and parents living there to have nosebleeds necessitating their consulting a physician.

One tenant informed the housing authorities that all during the winter the radiators of his two-room apartment have been shut off and the windows of one of the rooms have been kept open in order to keep the heat around a comfortable temperature. However, he reported that the temperature has been between 80 and 90 degrees which has affected his 90-month-old daughter and himself, in the form of nosebleeds.

Upon investigation of the report, which was supported by other tenants of the project, Mr. Junkin said that "the condition is not good because of too much radiation and I will recommend to the proper authorities that steps be taken to remedy the situation. Other problems which Mr. Junkin noted were cracked ceilings, warped side-walls and floors, and draughty windows.

SENATE RENT DEBATE CALLS ON LANDLORDS TO PROVE ELEANOR

Tenants Assured Protection; OPA Rise Off

WASHINGTON, AP.—Senator Tobey, R., N. H., today opened a Senate inquiry into rents with an assertion that it "tests squarely upon the landlord" to prove any need for higher rent ceilings.

Tobey is chairman of the Senate Banking Committee making the investigation. There was no immediate explanation of yesterday's action in which an OPA order proposing to boost ceilings 10 per cent was quashed by the White House before it could be issued.

The Committee originally was scheduled to hear government witnesses today but Tobey said none would be present. This postponed the appearance of James V. Follen, deputy administrator of the office of Temporary Control, who had been expected to explain the mystery of the abrupt increase.

"We believe the average American wants to play fairly," Tobey said in a statement. "If the landlord is being discriminated against, if he is not getting a fair return on his investment, the American people will want to do something about it. The American people want to be heard."

The burden of proving that rents should be abolished or revised is placed squarely upon the landlord.

Tobey said the committee was determined to protect the interest of the tenant. "It is not able to fight for their own legislation, the drafting of new legislation."

"I think I am correct in my understanding of this class of property not many if any improvements have been made by the government. The increase in rent would be almost intolerable and it is not fair to the tenant."

One high official meanwhile explained yesterday's snarl over the OPA order as a "mishap." A government agency "mix-up" prevented a report.

President Truman scotched the order the minute it "came to the attention of the White House," the official told a reporter, adding:

"It seems to be quite definite there will be no across-the-board increase at this time."

1946 Seen As Banner Year For Telephone Calls Here, Local Managers Disclose

The year 1946 in this vicinity, as elsewhere in Westchester County, was the busiest the telephone company has ever known. The number of telephone calls in the county last year, according to the rate of about 37,500 per day, an increase of some 1,650 over the same daily period last year. The number of telephones now in service in Larchmont is 1,604, a gain of 887 since the first of last year.

Manager R. H. Thurston, Jr., reports that in the Mamaroneck office, calls are recorded at the rate of about 37,000 per day, an increase of about 3,800 over the same period last year. There are now 4,268 telephones in service in Mamaroneck, or 783 more than at the beginning of 1946 and about 1,000 more than in 1941, the last pre-war year.

In this county, the number has reached an all-time high of about 198,000, with more than 27,500 added in 1946. The gain since 1941 is nearly 40,000 or about 25 per cent.

"Most of the calls from these telephones are going through without difficulty," the managers state, "but during the rush periods there may be occasional delays. The busy periods are between 9 A. M. and 11 A. M. and later between 7 P. M. and 9 P. M."

At telephone needs have increased, there has been a corresponding increase in telephone forces to take care of these needs. Serving Westchester County are some 7,700 employees, exceeding the 1941 total by more than 50 per cent.

Additions were made in four central offices in Westchester County during 1946. In 1947 the telephone company plans installation of line equipment in the following central offices: Chappaqua, Croton, Croton Falls, Katonah, Larchmont 2, Mamaroneck, Mount Vernon 3, Ossining, Peekskill, Pleasantville, Poughkeepsie, So. Salem, Tarrytown, Tuckahoe 3, White Plains-Gladstone, Yonkers and Yorktown Heights.

"While we are making installations as fast as possible we would have been further along in our expansion program" the managers point out. "There have been shortages of materials needed for the installation of central office switchboards, cables and central office equipment."

"Nevertheless, we are now using every piece of apparatus to give the best service we can. There are some modifications are frequently made with the existing equipment. The switchboard equipment in an effort to improve the quality of service we are now creating facilities to serve additional subscribers."

10. All games to be played under official softball rules.

12. Postponed games must be played at the earliest convenient date within two weeks of the original postponement. The manager involved in the postponement will set the date within two weeks.
