WHITE PLAINS—A parkway policeman was suspended last yesterday after a motorist claimed he paid the officer \$5 after being stopped for a traffic violation, District Attorney Joseph P. Gaughan said today.

Mr. Gaughan identified the officer as P. Arthur De Palo, thirty-three, of 24 Chestnut Place, Mount Vernon. He said the officer denied the incident.

The District Attorney said the officer was stopped on Friday for the grand jury in its third session looking into Westchester links to a "protection cap" traffic ticket scheme.

The officer has been on the force less than a year and is single.

Mr. Gaughan said the motorist claimed the money was paid to the officer last Fall after the motorist was stopped for speeding.

The name of the motorist was not revealed by Mr. Gaughan. He also declined to say whether the motorist was one of three persons heard by the grand jury in its second session yesterday.

The officer denied the incident in questioning by Frederick B. Weeks Jr., Chief Assistant District Attorney. Mr. Gaughan said the officer was suspended immediately by Parkway Police Director William J. Slater pending a departmental hearing. Mr. Gaughan said.

15 DIE IN CRASH OF TWO PLANE AT BURLINGTON

Craft Collide On Way To Cincinnati Airport Landing

BURLINGTON, Ky. (AP) — At least 15 persons were reported to have been killed today when two planes collided near here on the approach to the greater Cincinnati Airport. The airport is 13 miles southwest of Cincinnati.

"I doubt if there are survivors from either crash," John Hedrick, operator of a flying service, told news after a flight over the area.

He said he saw bodies lying over a 200-yard area.

It was understood the TWA jet had 12 passengers and a crew of three, while the other ship had two persons aboard.

Fall 2 Miles Apart

Ray Gannet, Hebron, Ky., fireman, said the planes fell about two miles apart. He said wreckage was strewn about for many yards, and that both planes burned.

Mr. Hedrick said only the tail assemblies were visible from his plane.

We circled it two or three times," Mr. Hedrick told a reporter. "There's very little left of it. Wreckage is still smoldering."

In New York, a TWA spokesman said it was believed one of its twin-engine Martin airplanes and an unidentified DC 3 colided.

The resolution was introduced by Councilman Edward A. Cunningham, Bronx Democrat. It noted that the Board of Supervisors of Westchester directed on Monday that only Westchester residents be admitted to the Saxon Woods course.

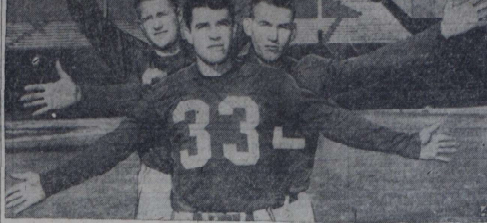
