## WEST POWERS ASK PRISONER COUNT

## Move Is Sharp Counterblast To Communist Propaganda On War Captured

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Western Powers, in a sharp counterblast to Communist propaganda changes, have demanded an exact count of German war prisoners still held in the Soviet Union.

Under a four-power agreement, all prisoners of war were to have been sent home by the end of 1945. Russia has had more than 100,000 former German soldiers being held as "phony 'Western' workers" in the Western zones of Germany.

The United States, France and Britain gave their answer to that charge yesterday.

The State Department announced a note had been delivered to Moscow asking (a) how many prisoners of war still are in Russia; (b) what the Soviet Union plans to do about returning them to Germany; and (c) how many have died in captivity.

The Soviet news agency TASS retorted in a broadcast from the Russian capital that an "overwhelming majority" of the German prisoners have been sent home, and added:

"The repatriation of the remainder is proceeding according to the plan adopted by the Soviet government and is to be completed during 1947.

Allied and German sources estimate that more than 200,000 prisoners of war remain in Russian hands.
