Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, (AP)—U. S. troops and tanks pounded today to a point within two miles of St. Lo, key road hub forming the Germans' central fortress in Normandy, gaining two to three miles in a furious new offensive spreading the American attack over a 40-mile front.

The attack was coordinated from the north and northeast at St. Lo. Fall of that city of 35,000 would force the German withdrawal from the remainder of the Cherbourg Peninsula, and Nazi lines were under heavy pressure along a front carrying 40 miles to the sea.

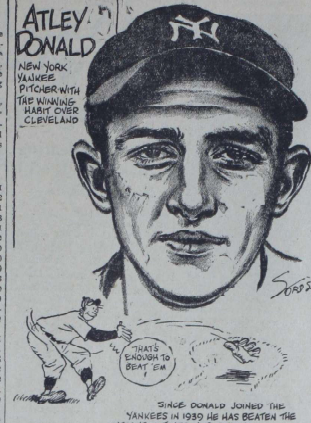

The financial condition of the town of Mamaroneck is "continually improving" and is being reflected in "interest rates paid on town offerings," according to the general financial statement showing the town's position at the end of the first six months of the current year, presented last night at the meeting of the town board, by supervisor Owen A. Mandeville.

The collections "compare favorably with any of the other Westchester communities," the supervisor stated, "and have been reduced from \$1,596,543.88 in 1942 to \$1,464,318.84 in 1943. In addition, the town has avoided to operate the town, exclusive of debt service requirements, at a loss of \$140,222.36 in 1943 as compared with \$465,222.36 in 1942 and \$249,588.00 in 1941.

Bradley's Army Within 2 Miles Of Coutances

By GLADWIN HILL Associated Press Staff

SUPREMACY—Lieut. Gen. Omar N. Bradley's forces advanced to within two miles of Coutances in Normandy, and field dispatches predicted the fall soon of the city, a choke point for German attempts to escape from the Lesay and Periers areas.

The American tank breakthrough had plunged spearheads more than 11 miles deep into the heart of enemy defenses and shattered into a forest of mine-browsed lanes the enemy lines, threatening destruction of most of the German forces in the west.

The London public speculated that Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., of the Third Army, was leading this huge stream of men and armor pouring through the gap. London newspapers dated 50,000 British troops were mentioned with being caught.

One of Bradley's six spearheads attached to St. Denis de Cosseville, taking that town 11 miles south of St. Lo and about the same distance from the jump-off point in the offensive.

Here the Americans were nine miles from the Cotentin peninsula, while other columns of the same command appeared along an eight-mile front pointed at the city itself. The nearest was within striking distance of only bridges straddling the Cotentin peninsula.
