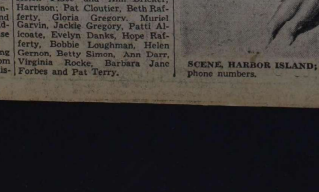

# Appeals in Bonds Manor Society in Tax Refund Suit

## Park Group Wins Battle Against Assesses, Under Court Victory Yields Society \$25,000 Credit

The Larchmont Park Society won its fight for a return of taxes paid to Larchmont and the Town of Mamaroneck yesterday when the Court of Appeals in Albany unanimously affirmed the decision by Westchester Official Referee J. Addison Young.

The society brought suit, contending that taxes had been improperly assessed against its beach property by the Town for the years 1936-1943 inclusive, and that it should be thrown open to general use of the Village and Town. His decision was unanimous in the Appellate Division, Second Department, and the case was then carried to the Court of Appeals.

The decision, in which Chief Justice Irving Lehman of Port Chester did not participate, held that the property is held as a park and should be assessed on that basis. The society is entitled to a refund of about \$5,000 for the four years from 1940 through 1943 and the town and county return covers a period from 1928 through 1943, for a sum approximately \$8,000 which will be divided equally between the Town of Mamaroneck and Westchester County.

The property was assessed in 1934 and 1935 for \$86,409 and during the remaining years at \$92,000. The above estimate in round numbers is based on the rates in the village, town and county during those years. To these figures will be added interest at 4 per cent from the date of assessment, which is also due the society.
