### Dogs Bite Boy To Death And Attack Cop

NEW YORK (AP).—Stanley Mianian, 11, was chewed and clawed to death yesterday by a pack of bull terriers in a tract of undeveloped marshlands and a patrolman sent to investigate the case was injured severely by the animals before they were driven off by gunfire.

The boy was attacked after leaving a Bronx swimming pool where he had gone with his mother.

Several hours later, another boy crossing the marshland noticed five dogs tearing at some object—then he saw a boy's foot protruding to the bone, protruding from tall grass and called police.

Patrolman Louis Rissone, 31, went to investigate. As he approached the pack, one of the dogs lunged at him and threw him to the ground while others circled about.

As Rissone wrestled with the animal reinforcements arrived and fellow policemen finally shot two of the dogs dead while the others scattered. The other animals were rounded up and sent to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Police said the dogs were owned by Svend F. Sandgren who was quoted as saying the animals usually were kept locked up in a hampster-type box which he could not offer any explanation as to how they got loose.

Assistant District Attorney Marvin Lechtman said an arrest would be made in the case but that it would be presented to the Grand Jury when Rissone, who was injured severely, was able to appear before the body.

Police said Sandgren told them that two of the dogs had won ribbons in local dog shows. He described them as good watch dogs. The owner kept them as pets.

In an effort to secure additional state aid for school districts in this area.

On Trustee Kirkman's recommendation, the board passed a resolution giving its support to the committee and authorized the expenditure of not more than \$100 for making the state aid studies. Trustee Kirkman was appointed to work with Superintendent Ahern, who, together with two members from a citizens group will make up the committee which will represent Larchmont-Mamaroneck schools to the studies.

Mr. Ahern read a letter from Arthur Hamilton, chairman of the state committee of Troop 2 Larchmont Boy Scouts, thanking the board for the use of Murray Avenue School during the year and requesting permission to use the school next year for the same purpose, which was granted in executive session.

A letter from David Lynn, secretary of the Senior High School General Association, addressed to President Peace, was read by Clerk Kenneth G. Van Sciver, thanking the board for making available the voting machines used in the association's elections last month.

A proof of the "Know Your Schools" bulletin, prepared by the Superintendent, was passed among the members of the board. It suggested revisions and changes prior to its distribution to each home in the school district when the school census is taken this summer.

Superintendent Ahern also reported on the bulletin, prepared by the board, which was passed among the members of the board.

Trustee Nelson asked the building and grounds committee why it had accepted the bid of the M. E. Maloney Company, of Mamaroneck, instead of that of the Peckham Road Construction Co. for construction where one item in the letter's bid had been revised in a saving of \$610. Trustee Nelson said he believed that either bidder would have done the work efficiently and pointed out that the overall bid of the Maloney Company was only \$19 higher than that of the Peckham Company. They said that Maloney's work had been satisfactory in the past. Trustee Nelson was of the opinion that the bid of the Peckham Company was a local concern which it would prefer to award contracts to.

The board also received a letter from William J. McWilliams, chairman of the Larchmont Forum for Public Opinion, in which he expressed the appreciation of the Forum for the use of the Chatsworth Avenue School auditorium for its meetings and requested permission to use it again next year. The letter was referred to the school committee for recommendation, and permission was granted in executive session.

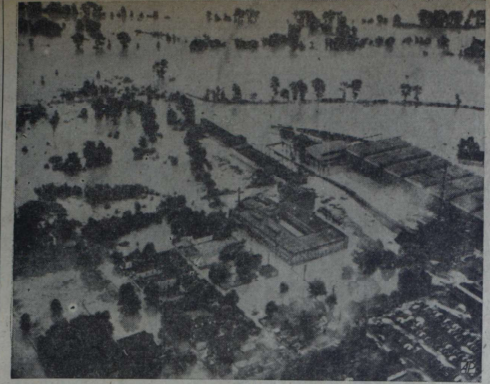

### Mine Owners Hope To Avert All-Out Strike

WASHINGTON (AP).—Powerful soft coal operators predicted today that an agreement will be reached with John L. Lewis in time to avert an all-out strike next Tuesday in the bituminous industry.

The operators, who asked to remain anonymous, said the United Mine Workers' chief already has been assured by influential industrialists that his soft coal diggers in Northern and Western mines will get their full 35 cents an hour wage hike demands.

The concessions were made at a secret meeting last Thursday attended by Lewis, President Benjamin F. Fairless of the U. S. Steel Corporation, Chairman George M. Humphreys of the Pittsburgh-Coke, Consolidation Coal Company, and other northern producers.

The industry spokesmen who confirmed this meeting said western operators agreed to the wage plan.

This left Southern miners—which produce about 25 per cent of the nation's soft coal—faced with the prospect of capitulating on the same terms or seeing their pits closed when the miners' 10-day vacation ends next Tuesday.

The Southerners had insisted on separate bargaining conferences. One issue—chief among them Lewis' demand for a 10 instead of a five cent a ton royalty for the Union Welfare and Retirement Fund—were said to be the only barrier to a formal North-West settlement.

With no contract yet signed, however, both Senator Taft and Rep. Hartley, Republican opponents of the new Labor Act, called last night for President Truman to invite the provisions of that law. Taft, saying that now is the time to face the coal problem added that if a mine shutdown develops, the President should act at once to appoint a board of inquiry—the first step in an 80-day strike delay program contemplated by the law.

Hartley, in a New York article, saw no reason to wait for a strike to occur. He declared the Chief Executive should act at once in getting up the inquiry board to be followed by prompt action to get an injunction against a walk-out.

Taft noted that the Taft-Hartley Act "does not outlaw strikes undertaken for the purpose of improving wage, hours or working conditions."

Granting of Lewis' wage demands would raise the miner's daily pay from \$11.85 for a nine-hour day underground to \$13.05 for an eight-hour day.

### Flood Sweeps Past St. Louis, Damage Great

ST. LOUIS (AP).—The raging Mississippi River continued its destructive sweep past the St. Louis area today after breaking four nearby levees and routing thousands of persons from their homes when additional dikes were threatened.

U. S. Army engineers estimated the economic loss between Louisiana, Mo., and Cairo, Ill., at nearly \$12,000,000—most of which was caused to farmland and buildings.

Some 26,800 persons were reported homeless by the Red Cross in the four-state area of Missouri, Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska. A new flood crest was reported at Graton, Ill., just north of Alton, where the Illinois River flows into the Mississippi.

A hundred miles south of St. Louis, at Grand Tower, Ill., Mayor Jesse Grammer said, "We will be shut off from all roads soon."

### Msgr. McDonnell Is Made Bishop

WASHINGTON (AP).—Pope Pius XII has appointed the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. McDonnell, national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, to be titular Bishop of Setia and auxiliary to the Archbishop of New York.

The appointment was announced last night by Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, apostolic delegate to the United States.

Born in New York City in 1884, Bishop-elect McDonnell received his education from Xavier High School and Cathedral College, New York City and St. Joseph's Seminary, Yonkers, N. Y. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1919.

## Record Seen In Proposed Pay Rise To Minors

WASHINGTON (AP)—John R. Lewis is well on the way toward getting the best wage contract in the history of his United Mine Workers—who otherwise would extend their closed-out into a full-blown strike next Tuesday.

The way some operators figure the tentative settlement reached yesterday by Lewis and top executives of "Big Steel" mine owners and northern commercial producers, the soft coal industry will get a 4 1/2 per cent boost in their basic hourly pay rate.

The "pattern" increases negotiated by rival CIO unions in other basic industries earlier this year have been around 15 cents an hour.

The big question remaining, however, is how many mining companies will accept the agreement. It is not secret that a big segment of the industry was staggered by concessions the Eastern producers made to Lewis. The Midwest, Far West and Southern Mine owners—left out of the secret, top-level settlement negotiations—went into hurried huddles to map their strategy before the UMW Policy Committee assembles here Saturday.

Some operators described the proposed contract as "highly inflationary," claiming it would boost not only the price of coal but of steel and dozens of other items essential to the national economy. But if the tentative settlement is signed and sealed by a major chunk of the industry, other producers will have to dispute or face an extended shutdown.

## Sansone's Reply Raps Mandeville

Village Attorney Sansone's reply follows:

"On June 20 issue of The Daily Times carried an account of a speech made recently by me at the meeting of the Conference of Mayors and other Municipal Officials held in Buffalo, at which several hundred Village Officials were present.

"Reference to my discussion of the subject of Town taxes, insofar as they affected incorporated areas, on a state-wide basis, in the June 26th issue of The Daily Times, Supervisor Mandeville takes issue with my remarks and brands all false my contention that some taxes were levied on the whole township for services beneficial only to the unincorporated area.

"It likewise in a general way refers to some of my remarks as erroneous, but does not attempt to point them out.

"The taxes in question were levied on the entire Town for services which benefit only the unincorporated area and cannot be disputed even by Supervisor Mandeville.

"The services in question, as he refers to my criticism with respect to the cost of preparation and maintenance of the zoning ordinance, the building and plumbing inspector, and highway engineering, are set out on Page Three.

## MAY FOUND GUILTY OF ACCEPTING MUNITIONS BRIBERY

### 2 Garssons Also Convicted With Congressman

#### WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressman Andrew J. May was convicted today of selling his influence while wartime chairman of the House Munitions Committee.

A Federal Court jury also convicted munitions makers Henry and Murray Garsson of paying the 72-year old former Kentucky Congressman more than \$50,000 in fees for favors during the war years.

The three defendants received the verdict calmly. All had refused the offer to minutes before reaching its verdict, climax of a trial that lasted 11 weeks.

Announcement of the verdicts however, was delayed more than 20 minutes while the court officials were assembled.

Foreman George E. Wells solemnly answered "guilty" to each of the three counts in the indictment, which charged that May took money for interfering at the war department for the \$700,000, 600,000 munitions contract.

His response to a defense request, each of seven men and five women jurors was polled on his decision. The Court deferred sentence until later to give the defense an opportunity for appeal motions.

The maximum penalty would be a sentence of six years in prison and \$50,000 fine.

Charles J. Margiotti, head of the defense counsel, said he would appeal the verdict today.

## Explosion Hurls Motor Overboard 'Flying Saucer' May Have Been New U. S. Plane

A terrific explosion rocked the Mamaroneck waterfront shortly after 11 P. M. yesterday when a 40-foot cabin cruiser, "Wife Edna," blew up in the West Basin, completely demolishing its superstructure, and causing injuries to three persons who were on board. Cause of explosion of New York City, the owner, was thrown by the water by the blast, suffering a fracture of the right arm. With him were his wife, Mrs. Beatrice Weinstein, who received lacerations of the right knee and left foot, and Mrs. Rose Tennessee, who suffered third-degree burns about the face. All three were taken to Mamaroneck police headquarters where they were treated by Police Surgeon Dr. William A. Barrett.

Mr. Weinstein told police he did not know what caused the explosion. He said he had his motor running, preparing to take out to the Sound, and also had the fans turned on to clear out any gasoline fumes that might have been in the boat.

A general alarm was sounded at 11:15 A. M., and the five companies responded under the direction of Chief Fire Marshal Orsino. The apparatus went first to Harbor Island and experienced difficulty in reaching the scene of the explosion, on the Orienta point side of the West Basin, due to the heavy holiday traffic on the Post Road. Fire Chief Reginald J. H. Smith, who was at the Post Road and Orienta Avenue, said that the boat was identified as a flash explosion of undetermined origin.

The boat is reported to be equipped with its own extinguishing system which would have put out any fire. The fire department has been called by telephone fumes, but the cause of the explosion has not been determined.

The boat was towed to the Kingsboro Boat Works at 300 More Avenue, where it was reported that the hull and engines were in good condition.

## Letter Collection Reveals Our Forefathers' Interest In Liquor And Distilling

An interesting study of the personal and public lives of some of our nation's founders can be found in a collection of letters, proclamations and documents on the subject of liquor and distilling owned by Dr. Alfred J. Liebmann, director of the Larchmont Research Laboratories.

"History and drinking are closely related," Dr. Liebmann pointed out. "In the history of our country it is found that a great many of those who helped to write it took a drink at one time or another. Often as they wrote letters ordering liquor to be sent to them, they signed documents which reveal the content of these letters and documents dated the walls of Dr. Liebmann's office at the Larchmont Laboratories at 200 Myrtle Boulevard.

"Recently incorporated some of the more interesting ones into my collection," he said. "They are of various dates, from the 'Early American Spirit' and 'Food and drink are necessities to human life' to the 'Declaration of Independence' and the 'Declaration of Sentiments'."

"Five miles of signatures of the illustrious Philadelphia declaration have left their personal imprint on the documents related to the more potent drink of their time."

"Another document in the collection is a patent issued Feb. 21, 1804 to Israel Wood of Massachusetts, covering 'improvements in setting stills and other lagers' in those days, Dr. Liebmann explains, "large were signed by the President and the Secretary of State."

The patent bears the signature of Thomas Jefferson, and James Madison as well as the attested Levi Lincoln as Attorney General.

The signature of George Clymer of Philadelphia, who, at one time was "Superior of the Revenue for the District of Pennsylvania" appears on a certificate for duties paid on a case of "Geneva" (gin), containing three and a half gallons of the first proof.

The well-known signature of John Hancock, the last of five signers in 1783: "The Honorable His Excellency, John Hancock, Secretary of the Continental Congress, Court of General Sessions for the County of Suffolk," and the General and Selection of Boston, in behalf of John Molloy, who appeared as solicitor for the same, are suitable for a trade with the people from the country... but, as those traders always choose to take their West Indies Goods from London, as other Shopkeepers on the south part of town called for."

"Your petition, therefore, humbly pray your Honors to save him with a License, retreating Sanguis Liqueurs at his said shop."

Another signer of the Declaration of Independence whose signature appears on a document in Dr. Liebmann's collection, is Thomas McKean of Pennsylvania. (Continued on Page Three)

## Holiday Fishaps Claim 219 Lives Throughout U. S.

None Injured In 3 Holiday Crashes Here

14 Die In State; 92 Drown, As Car Crashes Here

More than 200 persons, including 14 in New York State, lost their lives in violent accidents yesterday, and other accidents throughout the country lured millions to Fourth of July holiday events.

Of the 219 violent deaths recorded from 6 P. M. Thursday until 10 P. M. Friday, 92 were drownings, 79 killed in highway crashes. There were 44 persons killed in collisions with miscellaneous causes, including several in plane crashes.

An explosion of skyrocket at a family reunion in Elk Neck, Md., cost the lives of three persons, William Cameron, 33, his eight-year-old daughter, Ann, and her cousin, Ruth, 10. Another daughter, 2, also died. The explosion was caused by fireworks.

A half dozen drownings were reported in Metropolitan New York and Long Island resorts. Edward Clark Hark, 29, of 2200 Brookfield Street, White Plains, was killed yesterday when he fell into West Rock Reservoir near Carmel while fishing.

John Baran, 30, of the Bronx was drowned while swimming at the beach in the Bronx. Pascale V. Eccola, 25, of Brooklyn, drowned in the Hudson River in Garden when a case upset.

In last year's four-day week-end, 512 violent deaths, including 210 drownings, were reported, and 118 killed in miscellaneous accidents.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States demanded today that the United Nations Security Council give top priority to the explosive Balkan problem in view of its "urgency."

Herschel V. Johnson, U. S. delegate, proposed that the Council meet at 10 A. M. this afternoon and work exclusively on the Balkan case until it arrived at a decision.

Johnson declared that he was acting on instructions from Washington where top officials considered the situation "urgent."

He disclosed that he had proposed to the Council a meeting of Poland, Council president, that the Balkan delegates, originally scheduled for this afternoon, be moved up to the morning session.

He said, however, that he would not press his demands because some delegates apparently were coming to begin discussions this morning. He did not indicate which delegates objected.

Langs assured Johnson that all Council meetings this week, except this morning's session, would be held in the morning. He said he would announce the schedule for next week later.

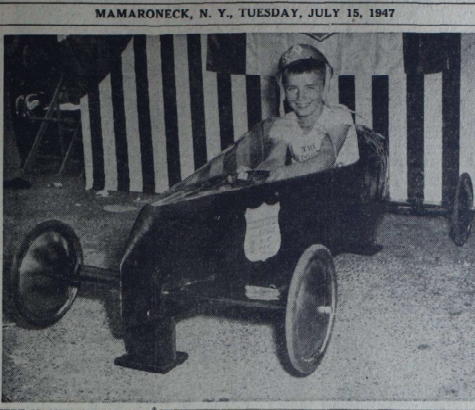

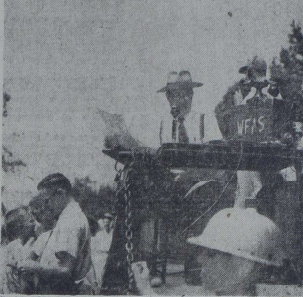
