

### Castle Point Veterans Cruise aboard Auers' 'Quaker Lady'

Sixteen hospitalized war veterans turned their backs for a few hours yesterday to the walls and white beds of the Castle Point hospital in Beacon for a cruise on Long Island Sound. Mamaroneck and Larchmont and a home-cooked turkey dinner on the lawn of the Auers home in Greenhaven.

The men accompanied by a doctor and a Red Cross field director were transported from the sunbaked hills where they have been undergoing treatment for three

the close of the war by their Red Cross Motor Corps drivers who turned them over to the entertainment and instruction committee of Mamaroneck Branch about 10 P. M.

Half of them were taken aboard the Auers' boat, "Quaker Lady," for a trip on the Sound with the other half rested on the spacious lawn of the Auers home after the 40 mile drive from Beacon. An hour later, when "Quaker Lady" was maneuvered back to the Greenhaven dock by skipper Auers and Roy Haley, the passengers hopped ashore like any healthy long island Sound sailors and gave up their places to their eight companions for cruise No. 2.

When the boat rides were over, the men lined up cheerfully on the terrace with plates and knives and forks to wait their turn at a feast able laden with turkey, baked ham, smoked tongue, potato salad, green salad, frankfurters, fried potatoes, chips and sticks and all the usual "trimmings." The banquet was topped with coffee and cake punch and coffee.

The patients lined up in groups of three or four as they ate, listening to their portable radios playing the Red Cross "waitresses." They were under the watchful eye of Dr. Judith Bernstein of White Plains who decided shortly after 7 P. M. that the long ride back to Beacon and their food-eyes were starting to get a little tired. The Red Cross station wagon, they were given a different crew from the one which had arrived yesterday a few hours before. The Sound show came out a few minutes later and there was salt air in their lungs. They were on their way back to the gray walls and to their memories of the experiences of the war. 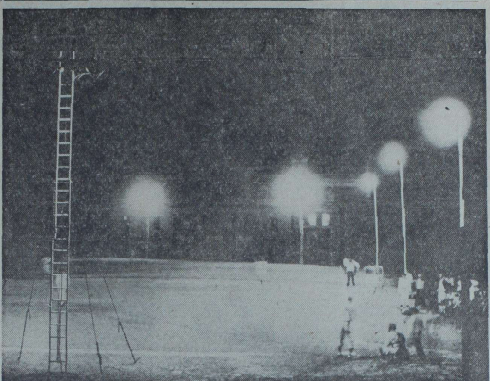

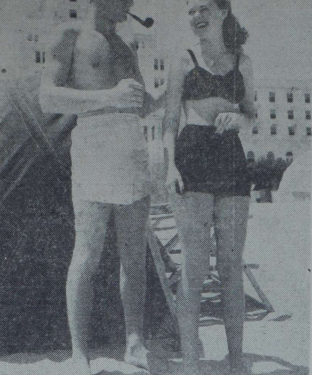

An eight-year-old Italian girl who has been wandering over her war-torn country hungry and ragged since the death of her father in the bomb blast which wrecked their home, has been "adopted" by Mrs. Charles W. Bellows of 164 Rocky Road, Larchmont, through the Foster Parents Plan for War Children, Inc.

The child is Maria Tucciarone who was born April 4, 1941, and whose short life has been a series of hardships until the Foster Parents Plan found her.

"Maria was a ragged and emaciated child when we first saw her," the workers write. "Her bare feet were bruised and calloused from her many wanderings and she was frightened and very nervous. The little girl feels better now that she has been given something to wear and her feet first nourishing meals in years."

Maria's mother wandered for months with her three children after their home was destroyed, and saw her 10-month-old baby die from starvation. She sacrificed her own meager ration of food and clothing to keep her other two children alive and finally became so ill from the privation that she had to appeal for help for Maria.

According to the Foster Parents Plan, which has cared for more than 52,000 children during the last 11 years, the American "parent" contributes \$15.00 monthly toward the child's support for at least a year and is encouraged to correspond with the child. The Plan is now operating in England, France, Belgium, Holland, Poland, Malta, Czechoslovakia, Italy and China.

agency which takes most of his time.

He said the group he represented wished to form a corporation and he submitted an operational plan under which they would conduct their service 24 hours a day. They propose a fleet of 20 taxis which would insure sufficient number of active services and a reserve in case of emergencies. They would also offer a "convenience" rate to any resident who uses the taxi service daily and similar rates would be afforded to families who shop by taxi. Under the proposed service there would be one man elected as head of the group who would take full charge, insuring prompt delivery of taxi service.

Meyer Walter D. C. Washburn, treasurer of the group, said the matter would be taken into consideration and it was referred to Trustee Harold E. Ruzicki who will confer with the railroad authorities.

The services of the village were scored in a letter from Frank M. Gallardi of 237 Larchmont Avenue, Larchmont, who stated: "There is a substantial increase from last year in the number of taxis which are used in this town. It is not surprising that it is not increased salaries, some of which are not deserved and gross incompetence and indifference to some of the demands."

The board members and Village Engineer Arthur Richards expressed their interest in the matter and they had not heard complaints from Mr. Gallardi in the past.

They, when the race is over, the prize committee will take over, assign prizes and arrange for their distribution some time next week.

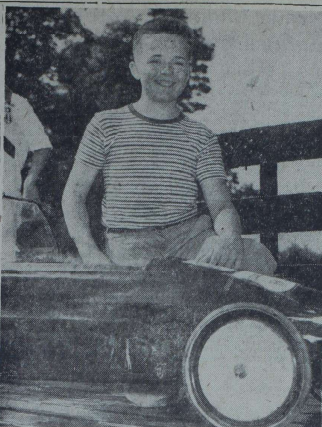

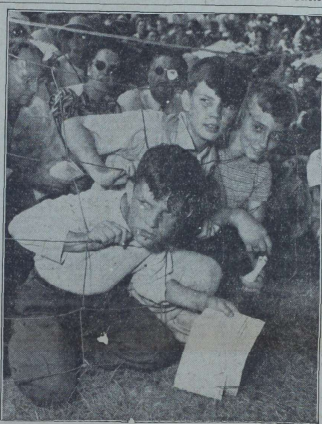
However, Aulerich also built another car and raced in the Detroit News event.

## Westchester Weighs Extended Chlorination In Pollution War

**WHITE PLAINS** — In further efforts to eliminate sewage pollution which on many occasions caused closing of Westchester bathing beaches this year, County Public Works Commissioner James C. Harding is considering extended use of chlorination of sewage plant effluent for the 1949 season.

At present the county begins chlorination of the output of county-operated sewage treatment plants on May 15 and continues such sanitation aid until Sept. 15. C. A. Holmquist, director of sanitation for the State Health Department, has proposed that two weeks additional periods of chlorination be added at each end of the bathing season, beginning on May 1 and continuing until Sept. 30.

Checking on the added cost, Commissioner Harding has a report from Otto Gerlach, in charge

of county sewers, that 32 more tons for the Mamaroneck and Blind Brook plants, at an overall cost of \$4,225. Additional water needed for the extra chlorination period would bring the added overall cost up to \$6,000, it was estimated.

In answer to the state's suggestion, Commissioner Harding said this morning he would give cooperation, but would also suggest that a State Health Department order to that effect be made officially, so that all sewage treatment plants be brought into operation. There has been agreement that tidal effects in the metropolitan area spread sewage pollution into Westchester waters from New York City, New Jersey and Connecticut points.

# TRUMAN TELLS CONGRESS EXACT GOP PLATIFORM

## SOUTHERN REBELS CAL CONVENTION

Boilers to Name States' Rights Candidate To Oppose Truman

By FRANCIS M. LAMAY PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Some but not all of the rebel Southern Democrats slumped down at their national party convention packed off for Birmingham today.

There—under a state's rights candidate for President and write a states' rights platform.

Mr. Truman's GOP foes alike President Truman raised the civil rights issue high into the presidential campaign.

The Chief Executive climaxed his acceptance of the Presidential nomination with a call for Congress to reassemble 11 days hence to act, among other things, on his anti-Republican call for greater civil rights for Negroes and other minority groups.

Mr. Truman has asked for federal anti-lynch, anti-poll tax, anti-miscegenation and anti-jojoba discrimination laws.

It was the Democratic convention's action in writing those specific proposals into the party's 1948 platform that brought the call for Saturday's rebel conference in Birmingham.

Party Plank Protested This action came swiftly after the full Mississippi delegation convention hall last night to protest a double defeat over the platform.

At the May 5 meeting of the Town Council, Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville suggested that the office be moved and stated that plans for partitioning the second floor of fire headquarters were being drawn.

He stated that until the plans are completed he is unable to estimate the cost of moving but pointed out that the \$1270 a year which the Town now pays for the present location of its offices at 188 West Boston Post Road will in time pay for the cost of the improvements.

Included in the plans is a general meeting room, which could be used for meetings of the Town Council, Town Court and possibly the office of the auditor.

The members of the Fire Department, particularly the older members, argue that the building was not originally intended to house the town offices but was erected as a community house as well as Fire Department headquarters.

The members also feel that the taking over of the auditorium for social affairs which would necessitate hiring an auditorium for their functions.

The department was unanimous in its opposition to the proposal and appeals to all residents and taxpayers of the unincorporated area to express their opinions in the matter.

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## PRESIDENT ACTS TO OFFSET SPLIT

Summons Republicans To Make Good On Their Party Pledges

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Truman today formally called the Republican controlled Congress into special session at noon on Monday, July 26.

The brief proclamation did not formally outline reasons for the call. The President merely directed the members to assemble "to receive such communications as may be made by the executive."

By The Associated Press President Truman's call for a Special Session of Congress July 26 promptly drew cries of "cheap politics" today from many Republican leaders.

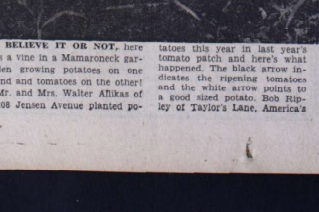
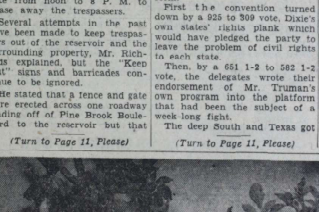
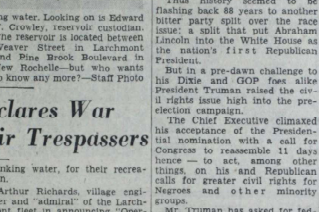

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## PERSHING DIES AT AGE OF 87

Noted World War I General Succumbs at Walter Reed Hospital

WASHINGTON, (AP)—General John J. "Blackjack" Pershing, who led American troops to victory in World War I, died today at the age of eighty-seven.

He had been suffering from a heart ailment since his return from the Democratic National Convention at Philadelphia.

The aged former Chief of Staff had been ill since February, 1938 when he was stricken at Tucson, Ariz., by a form of rheumatism which affected his heart muscles.

He came close to dying at that time, but rallied with a display of fighting spirit which amazed his physicians.

Since then, he had lived at Walter Reed Hospital here, in recent years staying in a wine built specially for him.

Death was caused by a blood clot which reached his lungs.

Maj. Gen. Shelby M. Hays, hospital commander, who met Mr. Pershing at the train on his arrival from Philadelphia—reported that the underlying cause was "arterio sclerosis" and "arterial fibrillation."

Pershing's bedside was his son Warren, his sister, Miss May Pershing, and his longtime physician, Maj. Gen. Shelby M. Hays.

A General of the Armies, Pershing was the nation's highest-ranking military man. Only one other American, George Washington, has held that title. Several other military leaders of the Civil War and World War I have held the title of General of the Armies.

Before the fire is borne across Potomac to the Arlington Hills, it will be taken to the Capitol to lie in state on Tuesday.

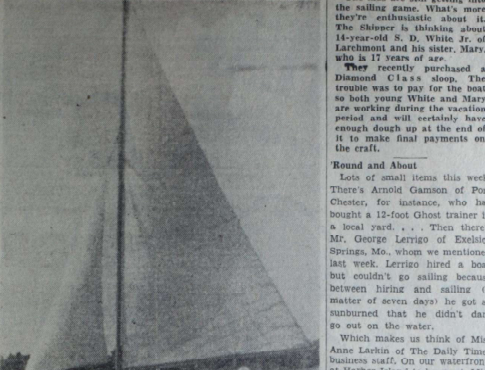

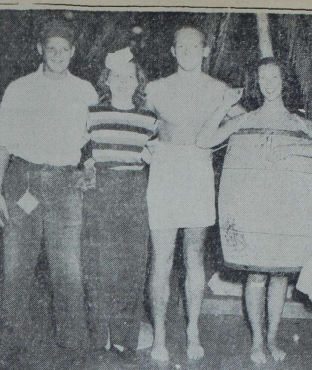
