Board Acts On Legion Convention

Parking Space To Care For Guests Presents Larchmont Problem

GRADING PROPOSED

The problem of providing parking space for 200 to 2,000 additional cars in Larchmont during the county convention of the American Legion July 11 and 12 was studied last night at the meeting of the Board of Trustees in the Municipal Building.

The Board was reluctant to authorize the expenditure of \$100 to grade land in the Larchmont Shores area as a parking space. Reports he had had out parking grounds at Flint Park which would accommodate 150 to 200 cars. He said he had asked the Legion how many cars were expected and was told from 500 to 2,000.

The only other spot available for parking space, he said, was some private property in Larchmont Shores which the owners had given the Legion permission to use. The property would have to be leveled off, estimated, making it could be done in a day.

WHITE PLAINS—Chairman Edward J. Crennan of the County Democratic Executive Committee of Vincent De Paul, Larchmont, announced today his Democratic nomination for Sheriff.

Murray said Dominic J. Capeli, former Post Chester police judge, was the only other candidate for the office. Crennan said he had indicated their willingness to become candidates for the office.

He was associated with his father, County Judge John Crennan for 35 years and is now associated with the Forty Hours Devotion, according to Edward F. O'Reilly, president of the parish.

Officers for the coming year will be elected and refreshments served. All members are urged to attend.

Building Shows May Upswing In Larchmont

Building in Larchmont continued on its upward swing during May with 26 permits issued covering an estimated cost of \$1,450, an increase of \$25,210 over the preceding month when 14 permits were issued.

Four permits were issued for new construction which includes a restaurant at 47 Boston Post Road at an estimated cost of \$17,000, a \$16,000 private residence at 66 Shore Drive, and two private garages at an estimated cost of \$3,800.

For the corresponding month of 1946, 11 permits were issued covering an estimated cost of \$34,541, which included a \$22,000 private residence.

Other permits issued during the last month were five alterations to existing buildings, one addition, one plumbing, four sign, and one other building.

40-Hr. Week Vote Dodged Temporarily

WHITE PLAINS—Facing opposition from County employes unions, and criticism from the Westchester County League of Women Voters, the Board of Supervisors last yesterday decided to defer further study to a program which included establishment of the 40-hour work week and elimination of one day-a-week set-aside, partially the added cost of the shorter work week. It has been estimated an additional \$500,000 will be required to put the shorter week into full operation for all County employes.

A month ago the board's budget committee had recommended the shorter week and the companion report had been made a special order for yesterday.

But when the item was reached, Majority Leader Richard H. Lever, who had placed the item on the board's agenda, said he would recommend the matter to the Budget Committee for further study and the committee would retain the services of Barling Associates, New York City, as consultants, to survey the "very complex matter."

The board will also consider other petitions or applications that may be brought before it.

Local Groups To Discuss Consolidation Of Village Government Monday Night

Representatives from all organizations in the Village of Mamaroneck will meet Monday night to discuss consolidation of the village government.

The meeting will be held at 8 p. m. in the basement of the Mamaroneck Free Library, Union of Larchmont, the unincorporated area of the Village will be considered at a later date.

According to Peter C. Doern, Jr., chairman of the Realty Board's government consolidation committee, the mass meeting has been sponsored by the board.

The subject has long been discussed by the Realty Board as well as other organizations and the letter states: "Such a consolidation will undoubtedly effect considerable savings in taxes and make for more efficiency in local affairs."

Mr. Doern said this morning that the Realty Board would conduct the meeting with no pre-conceived conclusions as to the best manner of procedure. We believe the public is the only judge of that.

Niles Warns Of Pitfalls In Drafting Wills

Prof. Russell D. Niles of 841 Taylor Lane, Mamaroneck, assistant dean of the New York University Law School, last night urged lawyers to pay particular attention to the drafting of wills to insure against irregularities, at a meeting in the lobby of the First National Bank in New Rochelle, N. Y., sponsored by the Trust Department of the bank. More than 130 lawyers, life insurance men, accountants and other guests attended.

The drafting of wills, Professor Niles declared, is largely a matter of teamwork among the lawyer, the life insurance adviser and trust officers.

He warned the public to guard against being trapped by acting "too smart" in attempting to effect tax savings.

Prof. Niles disclosed that changes have been made in law since the late 1930's regarding estates and estate planning and urged lawyers to advise themselves of these changes.

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Indians Must Act On Selection Of Own Government

LONDON, (AP)—The British Government announced today that it will transfer power in India to the Indian people and will leave it to the Indian people to elect their own government.

The announcement was made simultaneously by Prime Minister Attlee in the House of Commons and by the Viceroy, Lord Mountbatten, in a broadcast to the Indian people, and by the British Government in a white paper.

Regulation will be introduced during the present session of Parliament for the transfer of power this year to a dominion status basis—one or two Indian governments depending on which part of the Indian people subscribe to it.

It is stated that the absolute withdrawal of the British, announced for July of 1948, India will be considered as two self-governing countries which will belong to the British Commonwealth of Nations.

Attlee said the new British plan, with its offer of temporary dominion status, had been "favoured and received" by the leaders of Indian political parties.

Former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, in a statement, criticized the Conservative opposition behind the principle of temporary dominion status, and asked whether as a united country of 500,000,000, a separate Pakistan (Moslem) and Hindustan (Hindu)—but reserved the right to oppose the details of the plan.

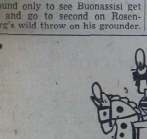

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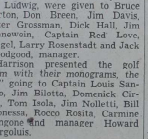
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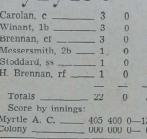

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A Good Start

The Mamaronock Realty Board deserves a wealth of credit for focusing renewed attention on the old-fashioned proposal for a consolidation of local government through the medium of a general discussion of the subject Monday night.

All village organizations have been invited to send representatives to the meeting scheduled for 8 o'clock in the basement of the Mamaronock Free Library.

The discussion will center around the plan to merge Rye Neck and the Village into a city. The Mamaronock Board was specifically denied the right to appropriate funds for such a study.

The Village thus stymied, the Realty Board at a recent meeting petitioned to seek a basis for proceeding with the study. The Monday night meeting is only the first step in attempting to formulate public opinion on a subject which has been mooted for many years.

At a later meeting the Realty Board hopes to go into the broader question which would merge Larchmont, the unincorporated section and Mamaronock.

In the words of Peter C. Doern, Jr., chairman of the Realty Board's government consolidation committee, the meeting was conducted "with no preconceived conclusions as to the best manner of procedure. Which is as it should be."

Consolidation of complex governmental setups is a subject fraught with complications and one which calls for a serious, studied, thorough survey before any definite conclusions are reached. On the surface it appears logical, wise and the economical thing to do. But beneath the surface are many cross currents. There are many hard arguments, pro and con.

The Realty Board will be performing a civic service of a high order if it is able to carry the question through to a definite answer. That cannot be accomplished at one meeting. It calls for continued momentum.

We hope that the Realty Board can furnish stout enough to keep up that momentum.

More Sugar Now Surer

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Prospects for an end to household sugar rationing by July 1 brighten today as the United States has received a bigger share of the world sugar pool.

The International Emergency Food Council, inter-government agency which divides scarce foods among importing areas, granted the United States more than 300,000 tons of sugar, more than originally had been allotted for this year.

This increase is equivalent to about five pounds a person. A highly placed Agriculture Department official, who asked that he not be named, said the additional supply should be enough to permit rationing to households, if not to institutions and to industrial users, to be dropped by the end of this month.

He said supplies available for the last half of the year should be sufficient to allow consumption—including industrial use—at the pre-war rate of nearly 100 pounds a person.

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World Peace Aim Of U.S., Truman Says

OTTAWA—President Truman said today that the United States intends to help those nations that want to live in peace with their neighbors, without coercion or intimidation.

He also promised that American resources will be used to promote world recovery by aiding those who are willing to make the maximum contribution to the same cause.

Addressing the Canadian Parliament in a speech in which he called for completion of the St. Lawrence project, a subject which long has stirred controversy in the United States, the President declared:

"We want a peaceful world, a prosperous world, a free world, a world of good neighbors, living on terms of equality and mutual respect, as Canada and the United States have lived for generations."

"We intend to support those who are determined to govern themselves in their own way, and who honor the rights of others to do likewise."

"We intend to aid those who seek to live at peace with their neighbors, without coercion or intimidation, or being intimidated."

"We intend to uphold those who respect the dignity of the individual, who guarantee him equal treatment under the law, and who allow him the widest possible latitude to work out his own destiny and achieve success to the limit of his capacity."

"We intend to cooperate actively and loyally with all who honestly seek, as we do, to build a better world in which man and woman can live in peace and prosperity."

In what was interpreted by many as an indication that the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid program and the \$300,000,000 relief measure for other devastated countries may be followed later by support for other countries, Mr. Truman asserted:

Public Urged To Resist High Auto Prices

Carl E. Fribley, president of the New York State Automobile Dealers' Association, declared today that the "ridiculously high" prices of "slightly used" new cars will continue "as long as the public is foolish enough to buy them from unauthorized sources."

Mr. Fribley said the resale of new cars by used car dealers at far above list prices could be controlled only by the car buying public.

"Until people check up on the price of 1947 cars at a regular franchised dealer, and refuse to pay more than the manufacturer's list price. Unscrupulous dealers will continue to charge whatever the traffic will bear," he added.

"If car buyers will buy their cars from recognized and legitimate dealers only, and stop paying whatever is asked, automobile prices will come down just as meat prices came down when people refused to buy from the black market."

Mr. Fribley also charged that "greedy individuals," and not the legitimate dealers, were responsible for the exorbitantly high car prices. "I am sorry to say that some very responsible individuals have engaged in such practices."

"Persons who buy new cars in order to resell them to used car dealers for four or five hundred dollars more are the ones responsible for keeping this racket alive," he said.

"If people will buy cars only for their own use, and not resell them, the supply of new cars on used lots will soon be dried up, and prices will return to normal. I am asking new car dealers to carefully check up and be sure the customer really wants and needs the car for his own use and is not buying it for resale and I suggest that the dealer obtain a written statement from every customer to that effect. List prices are available for every make of car from any franchised dealer."
