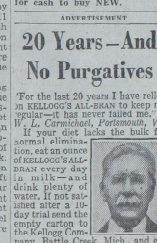

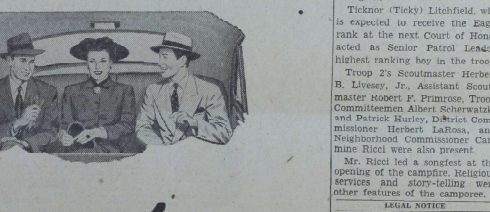

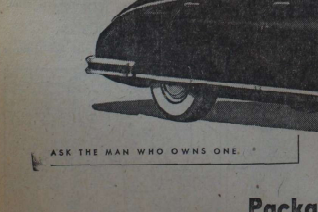

taken on an inspection of the waters surrounding Manhattan last Wednesday, found plenty of evidence to support the contention of the Interstate Sanitation Commission that increasing sewage pollution has created health hazards and, moreover, threatens to block bathing beaches.

At present only 40 per cent of the billion gallons daily which flow from New York City sewers into adjacent waters is treated.

As a result, the filth pouring into the waters has forced New York City to close 13 bathing beaches in the East River up to Throgs Neck, and Nassau County has had to take similar action at Great Neck.

At the same day that inspection was made of waters adjacent to Manhattan and the Bronx, health authorities of Westchester County and New Rochelle also have been checking the water in New Rochelle, Larchmont and vicinity.

It must be born in mind that while pollution is primarily a health hazard, it also has an economic angle, since closing of beaches deprives business, really valuable, and reduces sharply the attractiveness of residential areas served by such beaches.

Westchester County, itself, must face soon the question of modernization of its trunk sewerage plants, at present treating sewage inadequately to conform to standards set by sanitation and health authorities.

In general, the question boils down to the issue that we can have raw sewage or we can have swimming, but we can't have both, unless we wish to face the probability of serious epidemics. It's time to decide which we prefer—begin to figure how we may meet the cost of cleanliness.

NO TIME FOR EXPEDIENTY

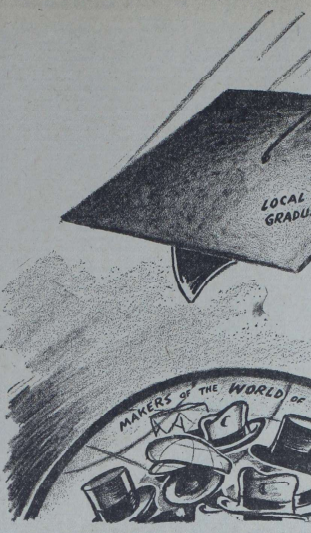
