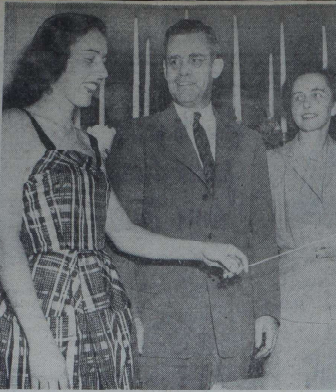

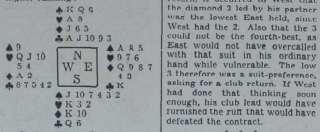

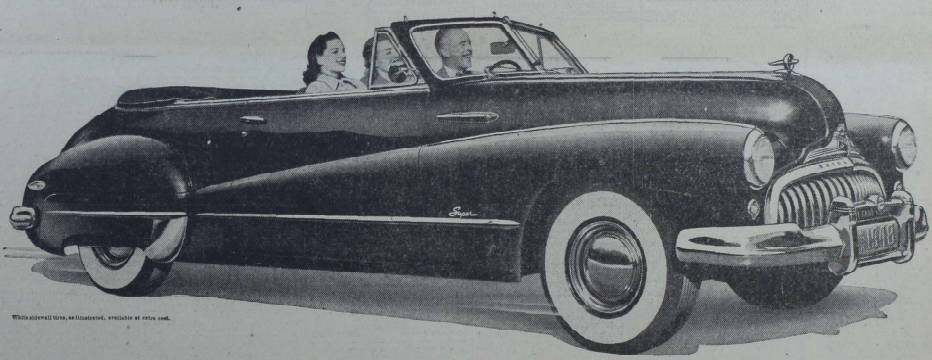

Around The Cracker Barrel

WITH PETER TAUB

Night Football Again
As one reader of this column remarked the other day, if it's a barrel, it ought to go all the way around. Regardless of the age behind that gentleman's geometry, he has made his point: night football in high school competition does have its advantages. Furthermore, that fan's interest is just what we are trying to arouse with the column, for if the Cracker Barrel starts just one person thinking on some local issue, then it has succeeded.

To move to the opposite side of the barrel and the question of night football, evening games for Mamaroneck High's gridiron team could naturally develop into a good thing. Whether or not its advantages outweigh its disadvantages is something only the individual spectators and the coach can decide for himself. No one is in a position to pass judgment on night football in the local high school play until the new system as tentatively outlined a few days ago is played and judged properly at its utmost efficiency. Maybe on October 16, after Mamaroneck's first venture into night ball, officials will be able to decide whether to reject night games or to try to add more to the schedule. Maybe they won't be able to decide until several more games have been played under the lights. And maybe they won't be able to decide until quite a while after that. If it is to succeed, night football is at best a long range project and must be improved upon continually until it is at least approaches the level of the best night football in the country. The October 16 game alone may not reveal a great deal about the possibilities or the fallings of high school night football.

Night football is an innovation which has only been slightly tapped up to now. The fact that it has countless possibilities goes without saying. And here are some of them.

If Mamaroneck played its football games every Friday night instead of Saturday afternoon, it would give both fans and players a chance to watch some of the top flight college football games on Saturdays. With wartime travel restrictions no longer a hindrance, gridiron enthusiasts could once more take in games in New York or New Haven and still see the local coverage on television.

High school football players could watch these college-outside games. In an effort to prove their own style of play, they would pick up valuable football know-how details which can only be acquired by watching more experienced players perform. Not only that, it would give the players themselves a chance to scout future opponents. If they had Saturday afternoons free, as they now have, they could attend high school football for three years never see anybody play but his own team and his own opponents. Perhaps these are some of the most important benefits of national football games in high school.

The commercial element could be kept to a minimum, for not many more fans than would ordinarily attend a Saturday afternoon game would be able to go Friday night. In many cases, games postponed because of rain might be played the following afternoon, if rain forced cancellation of the scheduled night game. And it's often more comfortable to watch a night game than one in the afternoon.

Night baseball, if it should follow from night football, probably has even more appeal, for the sparse crowds made up mostly of the student body that now witness high school baseball would be replaced by much larger gatherings. What's even more important is the fact that larger crowds would give the players something more tangible to work for than the glory of their alma mater alone. To know that it would play before more than a bunch of friends would surely result in a better team. This year's team at the outset is a poor example for it won the Eastern WIAA championship, but how good would the team be if the coach led it to better success performed before anybody but the student body?

And last completes the barrel. Night football has been presented from both angles—now it's up to you. High school night football: for better or for worse?

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CHARGES MENACE HOLY LAND RUCE

CAIRO (AP)—Charges of violations by both sides threatened to blow up Palestine's powder-keg truce today.

The Arab governments reserve the right of quick action in reply to criminal Zionist attacks on an Arab League note to the United Nations mediator, Count Folke Bernadotte, warning an Arab League representative could mediate out of his bed before dawn to give him the message.

The Jews also warned that violations would provoke Jewish counter-attacks and they charged the truce, now in its second day, had been broken in several Palestine sectors.

Bernadotte and his aides left Cairo by plane early today for the Greek island of Rhodes, by way of Trans-Jordan and Jerusalem, to begin preparations for peace talks.

He said charges were being investigated. A high Jewish officer held out a veiled threat of repeated bombings against Arab capitals.

Bernadotte told reporters Swedish and American observers had arrived in the Holy Land and gone to the scenes of reported truce infractions. He had no reports from them yet. He explained that communications were poor between Cairo and Palestine.

The truce, to last four weeks, began yesterday morning. It was arranged to give Bernadotte a chance to negotiate for permanent peace in the Holy Land.

Israel's Jewish State proclaimed when Britain gave up her rule over Palestine May 15, since then has been fighting invasion armies of six Arab countries, helped by Palestine Arabs.

Other Christopher Lovely came upon the four boys just after they had forced the front door open. stand that the rate of infantile paralysis this far this year is three times what it was previous years. Infantile paralysis strikes children in middle class suburban communities such as Mamaroneck, and it does in the slums.

A few preventive health measures are worth a great deal more than thousands of dollars of public health service after people become afflicted.

"People who cannot readily dispose of such things as excruciatingly dirty, old paint cans, dirty turpentine tins, boxes of used-up disinfectant, and other things around in their garages, basements, or on roofs, constituting a fire hazard and health menace. Disposal of these things should be made easy to encourage people to keep their basements and attics, as well as the grounds outside their homes free of fire hazards and unhealthful accumulations of trash.

"The persons who reside in apartment houses in the Town of Mamaroneck should favor this as much as home owners, inasmuch as their health depends on the general health of the community.

"I do not see with the present high taxes why this service cannot be provided. I am convinced that it is worth the cost of more than 10 per cent of the residents of the entire district. I have discussed this matter with a number of my neighbors and I know that they too are very disturbed about the problem of non-bargar refuse.

"On the principle that residents without children pay for the bulk of our schools, it might be desirable for all residents to be kept up to date on the collection in the interest of safety and health in the community.

"I do not advocate raising taxes to take care of this problem. Based on what I know of taxes in other communities this service should be provided with the money that is available to the Town Government.

"However, if there is no practical way of covering this refuse problem under present taxes, I wish to go on record as favoring the arrangement suggested in the above-mentioned newspaper article of the Town setting tickets for the residents to wear this refuse. The clean-up-week system required the residents to wear tickets that keep a large amount of refuse in the next clean-up week, or arrive either six months or a year hence.

"I do not see how to prevent the handling of some such ticket system. Individual truckers, when they can be prevailed upon to come at all, charge exorbitant rates, sometimes seven to ten dollars for picking up a few baskets of refuse and a small quantity of household trimmings.

"I urgently request that you gentlemen not drop this matter until some solution is found."

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COLUMBIA RIVER THREATENS AGAIN

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—The rising Columbia River rose today in renewed threat to three industrial areas in the Pacific Northwest.

President Truman viewed the devastated American flood zone of Oregon and Washington yesterday as these high spots were developing in the three-week battle against the Columbia and Fraser rivers, worst rampage in U. S. and Canada.

1—Water from the Columbia lapped at a secondary dike protecting a \$45 million aluminum plant east of Portland in Oregon. Spill levees remained critical along the 100-mile industrial and farming belt from Portland to the Pacific in Oregon and Washington.

2—The Columbia cracked flooding defenses on its Canadian headwaters near the half-dozen miller city of Trail in British Columbia. One hundred thousand homes were under attack. Levee packages to the city increased.

3—U. S. Army engineers said Columbia dikes were in critical condition at Richland, near the huge Hanford Atomic energy works in Washington. The plant engineers said they were ready to evacuate workers from their Richland homes if necessary.

In Portland, Mr. Truman signed a \$10 million emergency housing bill that had been rushed through Congress. It will allow suffering caused by the Memorial Day flooding of Vancouver—most disastrous single flow of the flood wave.

Meanwhile, the toll for the two nations mounted to 38 known deaths.

very kind, dear friends, especially since you do not know us. When my teacher put a big box in my hands, I felt so happy, especially after opening it. It was full of pretty dolls inside. My friends, shall never forget your generosity. We thank you for our hearts.

"This is a translation of the Moravia Telegram."

"At Christmas time, 1947, Madame Le Duc, through her sister, vice-consul in N. Y., got in touch with a N. Y. organization which offered sponsorship for the Calvary School, the hardest hit among the schools of our country."

"This sponsorship began to show results at once. The club asked American school children to offer toys and clothing to their young friends. With a generosity and willingness that does them great credit, these boys and girls collected all sorts of things which they presented."

"On March 22, five enormous boxes, filled with playthings, and another, filled with clothing, soap, footwear, and soap were shipped to France. The boxes were of excellent shape and were wrapped in the Calvary School."

The board will advise the superintendent and director of summer recreation plan better playground programs for the children of the community.

Mr. Aherm introduced Charles I. Warren, principal of the Mamaroneck Avenue School, who will direct the program. Mr. Warren stated that while he feels the program of activities is a good one, there is always room for improvement. He outlined in detail the activities conducted at the four playgrounds each day.

In addition, there will be story hours for children from five to 11 each day, musical programs of choral singing, phonograph records and radio; arts and crafts in paper, wood and leather; plus amateur show and costume parties.

The program also offers other games such as checkers, dominoes, pool, croquet, blocks, and other permanent pieces of equipment on playground.

Free milk is provided twice daily for the children at First Park through the generosity of Larchmont resident. Picnic facilities are also available at First Park.

Stabling facilities are confined to First Park, which has a wading pool. Other playgrounds are show-ers which have been placed outside the buildings. Walter Pickett of Mamaroneck, a member of the advisory board, suggested that enough money may be found in the \$100,000 recreation budget to purchase three surplus wading pools from the government which could be placed at the playgrounds instead of using the showers. He estimated the cost of these wading pools at \$125 each.

Mr. Warren said he believes it is the responsibility of the school to teach all children how to swim, especially Mamaroneck children who have the facilities of Harbor Island. He wondered if some sort of cooperative effort could be undertaken with the Village of Mamaroneck whereby the children from Mamaroneck and Central School could be taught to swim at Harbor Island. The teaching of swimming is a subject which is not covered in the curriculum.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate took up today a bill to repeal the Federal tax on oleo. The vote was to take it up 37 to 26. It came under such circumstances that there would be no final action on the measure seemed likely.

The Senate was under agreement to take up long range farm legislation at noon (EST). That meant the oleo measure would be laid aside at the time if no vote was reached by then. The oleo bill was taken up only about 40 minutes before the noon hour.

Allen said "the brass hats" claim the Russian faces "a great emergency." If that is so he said, why do those who profess to be alarmed "see there is no emergency to keep the Congress here in session?"

"Verbal pyrotechnics," Allen said, "have not been given a fair trial."

Call For Executive Pick — Dewey As Best

NEW CASTLE, N. H. (AP) — One of a group of Southern Governors announced today that a caucus of Southern States opposed to the nomination of President Truman will be held in Philadelphia before the Democratic National Convention.

Thurmond said the meeting was called by seven Southern Governors at a private session during the National Governors' Conference here yesterday.

He said the caucus would be held a day or two before the Democratic Convention and that some Western delegations would be invited.

"We are against Truman," Thurmond said. "We feel he is not the right man for President. If he is nominated we don't think he can be elected. At any rate we are against him."

Thurmond has been one of the leaders of the so-called Southern revolt against Truman which was touched off by the President's civil rights program. The Southern Governors who met with Thurmond discussed several candidates for the nomination but would not identify them.

Attending the conference with Thurmond were Governor Bradford H. Jester of Texas, Millard Caldwell of Florida, William M. Tuck of Virginia, Earle C. Clements of Kentucky, Ben T. Laney of Arkansas, and Pringle L. Wright of Mississippi.

Gov. Jester was the organizer here to strengthen the organization of the Southern revolt against Truman.

Most of the Republican Governors of the South and the Associated Press of 15 Republican Governors as to what they thought would win the party nomination showed this:

Governor Dewey, seven; Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan, three; Robert A. Taft of Ohio, one; Harold E. Stassen, former Governor of Minnesota, one.

Three Governors of so-called "loyal" states refused to voice an anonymous opinion.

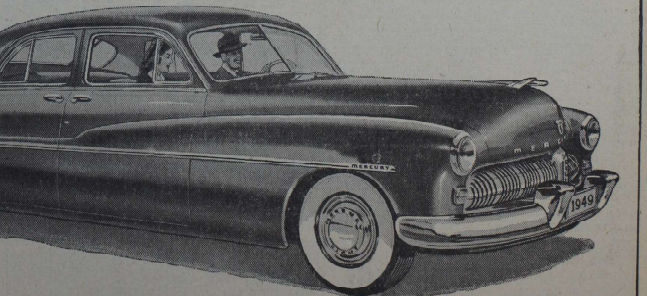

Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Army Chief of Staff, said that the draft bill is a long step toward preventing foreign conflict. He told a news conference in Los Angeles yesterday it will "back up our position in the world and will strengthen our foreign policy."

 UMW Chief to Be Witness Before Presidential Unit On Miners' Pension

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government rushed legal procedure today to head off a new coal strike after the U. S. Supreme Court called Lewis to testify before a presidential inquiry board called in John L. Lewis and soft coal operators in their respective states on their respective sides.

The board has a Wednesday deadline for sending a report to the White House. Once that report is in President Truman's hands the administration can set a strike-banning court order under the Taft-Hartley Law's emergency procedure.

The miners start a ten-day work stoppage this Saturday, but before they are due to return to work July 6, the present contract expires. To date no progress has been made toward a new one.

But there is one chance for getting a new coal agreement before the miners' vacation starts. They are looking by bus as far north as Boston where they received their first contract experience in cities in Vermont, New Carolina, and in Washington, D. C., where they received high praise for their recital at the NAACP convention.
