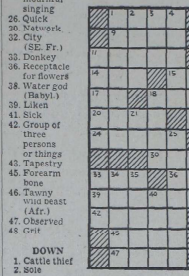
(No. 7, 4-13-49) I waded so enthusiastically over Cuban rum, Cuban Daiquiris, and at least one Cuban bartender-Constantino, the Cocktail King—that I may have given the impression that, compared with the United States, Cuba is some sort of a Mecca for lovers of the fruit of the vine. If so, should like to correct that impression. Some things I liked very much indeed; others, not so well. Pineapples, bananas, grapefruit, and limes (of all of which I am very fond) are as common there as are apples here. Everyone seems to have at least two or three lime trees in his back yard and they bear the year around. Or you can buy limes for a few cents a dozen on any street corner. Just why they do not also grow lemons I do not know, but the only lemons I could find were from California. They were small, thin-skinned, and did not furnish

a satisfactory "casaca de limon" or rind of lemon (pp. 95, 103) for my Martinis.
Of course, I liked the fact that I could buy 100 proof for \$4.25 that would cost me \$4 to \$5 here. I liked the fact that I could get real Gordon gin from England and real Cognac from France. The price of alcohol in the European liquors was somewhat lower than here because Cuban liquor taxes are lower than ours.
One of my greatest surprises was to see in every bar and liquor store Mount Vernon bonded whiskey. Yes, I said bonded, not a blend but real, honest-to-gosh straight rye. And, brother, did that burn me up! Now, of course, while whiskey cannot be bottled in 100 proof below 100 proof for sale in the U. S., it is bottled at 86 proof for export and that is what the Mount Vernon there was. That, however, is approximately the same proof as the average blend and, anyhow, which would you rather have at any proof—a bottle of straight genuine whiskey, all 4 years old or older, or a bottle containing from one quarter to one third whiskey of varying ages and two thirds to three quarters alcohol and water? Why does the real, top-quality article have to be shipped abroad and how is the baby-wash sold to us? Another thing I liked was the fact that you can buy 95 percent (i. e. 190 proof) alcohol the same as you would buy a bottle of rum, or whiskey, or gin. Maybe you would like a few dashes to prevent your gin and tonics from fermenting and spoiling (see p. 84); maybe you like a rubbing alcohol that isn't doped up with iodine or formaldehyde to burn your skin (see No. 11, 5-12-49); or maybe your taste is so perverted that you just want a coke pepped up with a slug of alkyl. In Cuba no questions will be asked. No paternalistic bureaucracy will insist that you preserve your fruit juices with sodium benzoate or sulphur dioxide, or that you pollute your rubbing alcohol with oil of juniper or at least 20 percent of some kind of alleged whiskey. If you are willing to pay the government taxes on grain alcohol you can use it for any purpose, proper or perverted, that your own conscience and good taste may dictate. Peace! It's wonderful!

It was my privilege to meet the chief executives of several of the oldest, largest, and best-known Cuban distilleries. Discussions with them at length liquor in general and rum in particular, and to inspect one of their plants and see and taste Cuban rum in every stage of its manufacture from the initial "high-wines" down to a particularly delicious "Cacha de Oro" withdrawn for my special delectation from the cask where it had been lying for years maturing in the warmth of the tropical sun.
I also met Sr. Hilario Alonso Sanchez, the secretary of the Cuban Bartenders' Association, who graciously presented me with an autographed copy of his recent 454 page book, "El Arte del Cantinero—The Bartender's Art. To

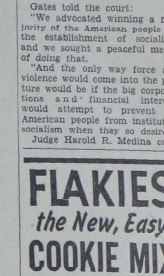
RED TRIAL HEARS WALL ST. THREAT

NEW YORK, (AP)—The possibility of armed conflict in the United States over establishment of "socialism" is admitted by a defendant in the communist conspiracy trial.
But the fault would lie with "Wall Street" interest—not with the Communist Party—John Gates, editor of the communist Daily Worker, testified yesterday.

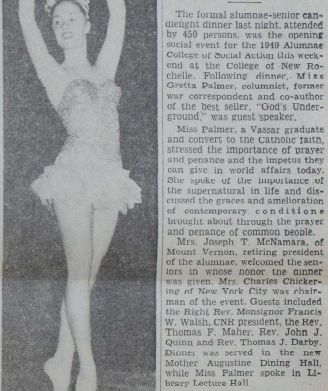

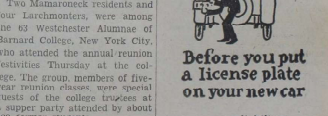

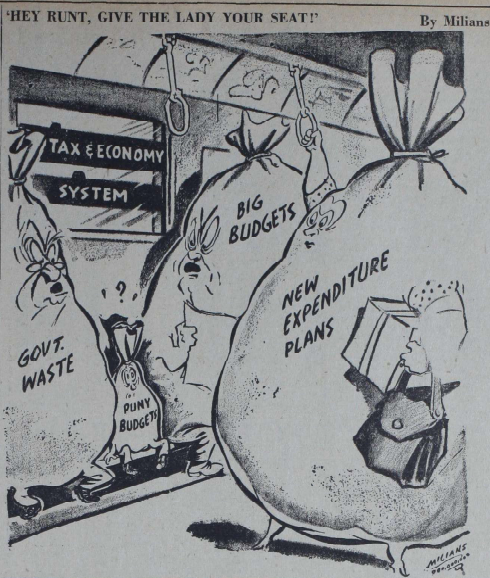

TAXPAYERS MUST NOT 'GLOAT'
TO ENABLE Westchester County employes to meet increasing costs of living, the annual budget has provided a sliding scale upon which the employes enjoy a bonus over and above their salaries...

But now the Federal BLS index shows a downward trend, and for the latter half of 1949 the bonus would be at the yearly rate of \$720 instead of \$495...

The directors of the Westchester County Competitive Civil Service Association and a CIO local union representing a majority of the County employes, have now petitioned the Supervisors that the remaining \$795 of the bonus be integrated into the base pay...

The important angle, it seems to us, is that the County employes should realize the issue is not simply how much they should be paid. It is not wholly an individual arrangement between employe and employe...

RED TAPE?
THE official reply of the Federal Civil Aeronautics Board to Westchester's protest against the refusal of the CAB to allow American Airlines to use Westchester County Airport at Ilye Lake for stops on regular scheduled flights indicates that the airlines may have utilized the wrong procedure in its application...

The solution may be for American airlines now to make a new application in accordance with the procedure outline by CAB. At least that is as close to a solution as one can get out of the bureaucratic publicbook which characterizes all Washington correspondence these days...

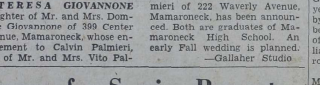

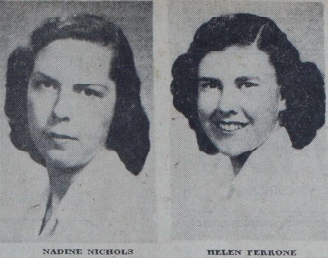

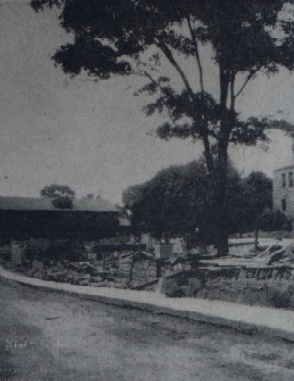
