Harbor Island Water Survey Asks Aid Of 1,000 Residents

The United States Public Health Service is launching preparations this week for a two-month survey to be made at Harbor Island Beach to determine the effect of salt water bathing on health. The cooperation of 1,000 Mamaroneck families will be asked as the project progresses.

Three tests of the Harbor Island water will be made daily for two months beginning June 5 to determine the coliform bacteria count during the tidal cycle. At the same time two groups of families—bathers and non-bathers—will be kept a daily record of any eye, ear, nose or throat infections which occur. The bathers will also keep a daily record of which members of the family go swimming and on what days.

The survey is expected to covariate the incidence of illness with the variations in bacteria count in the water, at the same time maintaining a control with the incidence of illness in persons who do not go swimming.

Charles Sponagle, the engineer in charge of the survey, and Dr. M. McCullough, director of the County Health Department, conferred yesterday with Village Manager William H. Johnson on methods of enlisting the cooperation of 1,000 families and plans were made for door-to-door visits by public health nurses and other staff.

JAP COMMUNISTS CALL FOR GENERAL STRIKE SATURDAY
 Action Expected to Bring to Head Dispute Between MacArthur and Reds

TOKYO, (AP)—Openly defiant, Japan's Communist Party today ordered a general strike Saturday in reprisal for the occupation's rush trial of eight Japanese accused of killing and stopping American soldiers.

The strike call promised to bring to head, long-standing disputes between Gen. MacArthur's occupation and the beleaguered Communists.

This tension, fueled by recent inter-faction Communist charges that the Japanese Reds were too docile, erupted Memorial Day in the first physical violence of the occupation against U. S. troops.

Observers at a Communist anti-American rally in downtown Tokyo said they were kicked, beaten and stolen. Only a few were hurt.

Truman Urges Fund Of \$1.2 Billion for Arms Aid Program

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Truman today asked Congress to provide \$1,225,000,000 for a second year of the arms aid program.

He said delay in supplying the money might "strike a fatal blow at all our efforts to contain the kind of peace which the free world seeks and would lessen our chances of continuing to live and work in freedom."

The fund would finance arms shipments to more than a dozen foreign nations, including Atlantic Pact Allies. During the fiscal year beginning next July 1, \$815 Million Under Last Year's appropriation last year to help 13 nations term against communism.

man of committee 6A since an allowance for the guidance director has already been included in the budget, the discussion will be on his duties and functions. Mr. Heiming and Dr. George Bennett agreed that it would be difficult to find another administrator to do the job that the guidance director should be freed of as much administrative detail as possible. Superintendent Alvin W. Hicks said that the guidance program will be designed to implement and extend the process already in operation and that the new director will be free to survey the general needs in the school before directing his attention to specific guidance problems. He will be expected to work with the pupil, the parent and the teacher in working out these problems, he explained.

Trustee Edgar B. Burchell Jr. said he thought the danger of overemphasizing the guidance program was that it carried to a point where the guidance director might be considered necessary. One for each teacher. Dr. Bennett took issue with that statement by pointing out that the function of guidance is not that of teaching "A guidance booklet is not just a teacher with a little added skill," he declared. "He is trained in the handling of personal problems rather than in imparting information."

Board President Raymond T. O'Connell said he thought the teachers should be taught the basic principles involved in guidance but that in some cases the guidance director should be called upon for help. Reporting for committee 7A, Frank S. Rathbone Jr. said that the members had considered the integration of physical, mental and emotional health as vital and recommended a program to be carried out in each of the three schools to coordinate the program.
