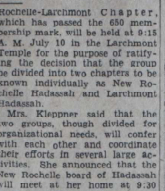

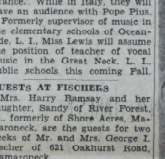
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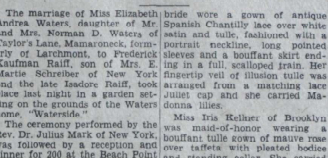

NEW YORK (AP)—With No. 1 bookie Frank Erickson locked away in jail, District Attorney Frank S. Hogan moved against several other big-time bookmakers in the city today.

After Erickson was sentenced yesterday, Mr. Hogan told newsmen his office had "evolved a new technique" in a drive to "eliminate the big bookmakers or at least 'check their activities'."

The District Attorney said the new system involves the use of canceled vouchers and testimony by better and bookie employees.

Presentations of such evidence to a grand jury led to Erickson's downfall in a bid for a \$125 million-a-year national bookmaking business.

The District Attorney said he could not reveal the identities of the men under investigation "until a grand jury passes on them."

Erickson — after spending his first night behind bars — leaves the city prison in Manhattan for a stretch in Rikers Island Penitentiary in Great Neck.

He was sentenced to two years and fined \$30,000. With time off for good behavior, he could be released in 15 months.

He also was given a three-year suspended sentence with a condition that he never return to professional gambling. The charges to which he pleaded guilty were bookmaking and conspiracy to violate gambling laws.

Mamamorneck Village Up 15.4% As Town Census Gains 2,677

Sharp population increases for the Village of Manamorneck and unincorporated section of the Town were recorded in census figures announced today by Walter L. Fitzpatrick, supervisor of the census in the 28th Congressional District, Eastern Westchester, at his office in New Rochelle. The village of Manamorneck, which scored the fifth largest increase among the villages of Westchester, added 2,677 residents since 1940 when the figure was 13,034. With an increase of 15.4 percent, Manamorneck's population is recorded as 15,041.

The Manamorneck section of the town with an increase of 13.2 percent reported a population of 9,718 compared with 8,488 in 1940, a gain of 1,300. The Village of Larchmont reported an increase of 14 percent with a population of 6,293. The 1940 figure was 5,970 making a total gain of 293.

For the entire town of Manamorneck, which includes the Villages of Larchmont and Manamorneck, exclusive of Rye Neck, the total population is 24,391, an increase of 12 percent over the 1940 total of 21,629, a total population gain of 2,677. The Pelham Villages show little change in population, a 4 per cent increase in Pelham Village itself according to census figures.

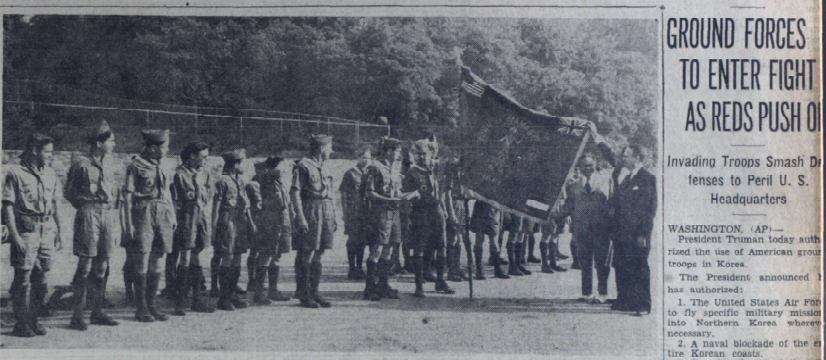

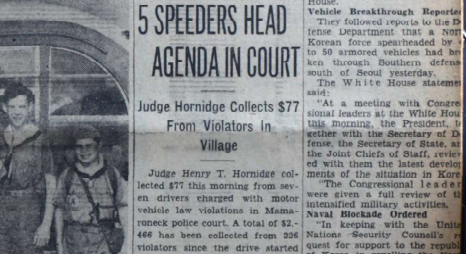

Judge Thomas F. Pennell was one of the grandest men I ever knew, one of the humanists and kindest. He was a Cornell football star and crew star in the late '90s. He died all too soon for the good of this troubled world and the countless little people who were being made happier because he lived. Everybody called him Tom—or Tommy.

One time when he was holding court in New York he called me at my hotel room late at night. "I ran into a friend of yours today," he said. "That is, I did it I got a good looking — which wouldn't matter much." This was Tom's story.

He was passing along 42nd Street, near Grand Central station. His big athletic build kimped into a man who was milking among the horde of hurried subway moles en route to the Manhattan neighborhoods that they call home.
The man was dazed by the impact, staggered backward as if to fall. Tom caught him by the shoulders and held him up. He was well dressed and sober but his eyes were wild and bloodshot. "Let me go. I'm all right," he said to Tom, but Tom saw that he wasn't and clung to him.

Judge Pennell, tired from a long day on the bench, took the bewildered stranger back to his Comodore and induced him to stay for dinner. "That's where you come in," Tommy said to me. "I guess between us we saved a man's life. If his story is true, do you know him?" I did know him. That very afternoon he had come to me in distraction and I had pleaded with him. He was a pretty well known newspaper supply salesman; had called on me for years, in days when all was well with him. He had a good job then and earned good money. Everybody liked him; was glad to have him come around.
