### New Methods In Sick Care Are Described

New teaching methods in nursing were outlined yesterday by Miss Ruth Kelly for members of the board of directors of the Mamaroneck Health Center at their final meeting of the season at the Center.

The speaker, a pre-specialization student at Teachers College, Columbia University, told of the emphasis now being placed on the treatment of a patient as an individual rather than "simply a case to be cured as quickly as possible." Hospital personnel now work in teams, according to Miss Kelly, making use of the specialized and trained talents of the nurses' aide, the social service worker, mental hygienist and psychiatrist. In addition to the doctor and nurse, the student is thus introduced to the field of psychosomatic medicine in her regular training, the speaker said.

In answer to questions from the members, she stated that Westchester County in general and Mamaroneck in particular are outstanding programs and personnel in the field of health service.

Off the course record by only one stroke, Mount Kisco Country Club's veteran pro Bill Goldbeck, overcame rain and a duplet-edged team to top the Westchester Golf Association's pro-amateur tournament at Hampshire Club yesterday. Teamed with Fred Wright of Lewood, who came up with his fourth ace in 25 years of golf, the fifty-four-year-old Goldbeck topped the field with a 31-31-62 score.

Goldbeck took the course, the last three holes in the rain, with a 32, 33-65 score, one stroke off the record 30, 31-61 set by Al Wright in 1930 and tied since by none pro Gus Salerno.

Wright set his ace on the 11th hole by covering the 180 yards with a No. 5 wood. Wright also helped Goldbeck on the fourth with a net-gear three and turned in a 34-31-65 total.

Joe Moore Jr. of Metropoli was second in the individual pro scoring with 31-28-59. He was followed by J. of Bonnie Brar, 35-40-75, and Joe Maria of Danwood, 36-30-73 tied for individual amateur.

Love met with Eugene McCann of Westchester Hills who had 38-28-65. Kadden's 74-45 was disregarded as he had taken the third ball-put.

La Benskey, his wife and daughter were calm through the trial.

When the jury foreman announced the verdict the La Benskey family and some close friends left the courtroom.

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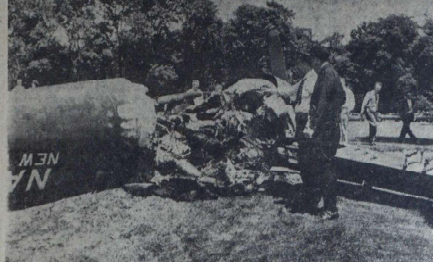

It has a school population of about 1,600 children, he said, and some 200 families. At about 900,000 people all of which is 74,100 in Rye. 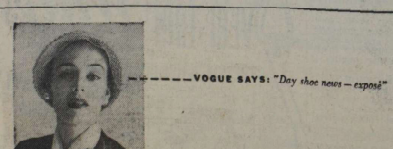

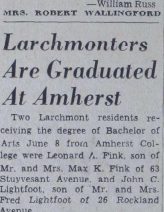


### Assembly Held Closing Year At Junior High

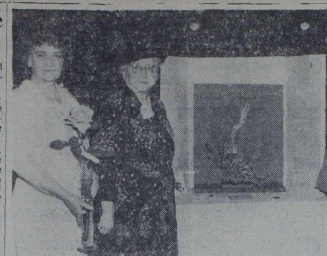

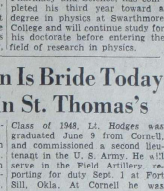

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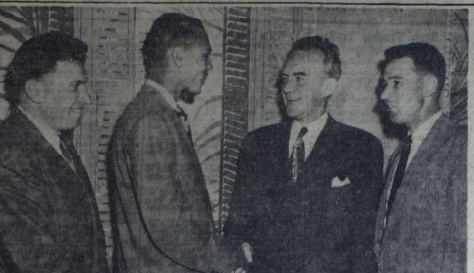

# NAACP CHARTERS RAP LA BEANSKEY TRIAL

### WHITE PLAINS

The acquittal of Stanley T. Beansky of Yonkers on charges of playing James and Wyatt Becknell of Yonkers was described as "a gross miscarriage of justice" by presidents of five Westchester branches of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, yesterday at the Fishier Branch YMCA.

The presidents' council met with the White Plains Branch and adopted a resolution offering legal aid to the Becknell family, and calling for "political education" in office officials who will vigorously protect the right of all peoples.

The freezing of the car Parkway petrolman "gives license to those who would deny any right of normally without fear of economic retribution." The council offered legal aid to the Becknell family to obtain redress for loss of wages.

The resolution was signed by the following unit presidents: Rev. Thomas H. Slater of White Plains, Mrs. Robert Amundson of Mount Vernon, Miss Hester Baileman of Oostburg, Bertin Marmon of West Rochelle, and Mrs. Cecil Caspbe of Yonkers.

### OUT OF BALANCE

Even those citizens who felt that President Truman had acted rightly in seizure of the steel mills were partly consoled by the patriotic reflection that the Supreme Court's reversal of the seizure had restored the system of checks and balances upon which our Republic has grown great.

But how much longer can we stay out of balance? The success of our type of government depends also upon a political brake which prevents any particular group of our citizenry from too long dominance.

### HELL HATH NO FURY

This may serve as an interludic memo to editors, reporters, copywriters and the like attached to this newspaper. It might also be of value to outside radio and TV political commentators.

Dwight D. Eisenhower is NOT a Republican and not a "native Kansan." We realize that his recent trip to Abilene, Kan., was a homecoming. We understand that Kansas claims the general as its own.

What they say about hell's fury and a woman scorned is probably true. But it's even worse when you scorn a Texan!

### WEAKNESS IN PROTECTION?

A REMARKABLE and somewhat disagreeable theory was expounded last week at the International Symposium on Anthropology. In substance, it was that the physical improvement of the human body through evolution might be more its end because we have now reached the stage in civilization where we protect the weak and encourage them to procreate.

Remember that this stage is not reached until, instead, it covers the period wherein social legislation began to be effective. And in studies of evolution we are accustomed to dealing in terms of centuries.

The theory, we feel, is cruel in its implications. Here is, briefly, what its exponent held.

Through centuries of the past, survival of the fittest and natural selection of mates have been effective factors in the physical improvement of the human body. This has been the pattern through several hundred thousand years.

Reasons for this reasoning is the belief that when natural selection is removed or weakened, with the weak as free to mate and procreate as are the strong, the species begins to decline in strength and vigor.

What it says, actually, is that if we aid the weak to survive, if we permit them free choice in mating, if we grant them equal economic and social rights, we are to that extent condemning our race to a return hundreds of thousands of years hence to the tree-living apehood from whom we originally began our climb.

In the first place, we refuse to accept the theory—for it is all it is, a theory. And in the second place, even if we were inclined to accept an approximation of its accuracy, we would still believe that it is better to take this calculated risk than to return to the jungle-horn premises that only the strong shall be permitted to enjoy freedom in selection of their mates.

All our progress since we emerged from the Paleolithic slime and been toward a realization that brain is better than brawn and it has not been the muscle but the spirit which has led us upward to the highest standards of intellect and civilization that the world has even known.

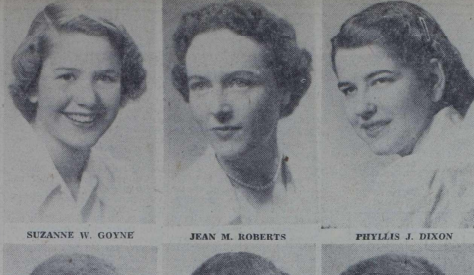

### St. Lawrence Proposal Hits Second Balk; Returned To Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate, spurning a last-minute plea by President Truman, today killed a bill to authorize the United States to join with Canada in constructing the \$24 million St. Lawrence seaway and power project.

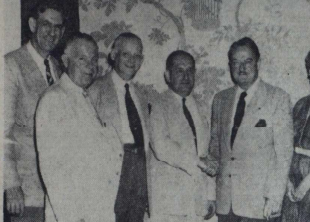

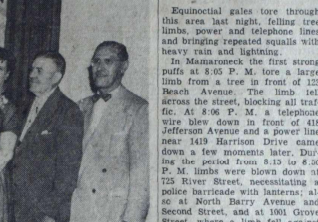

AFTER several months of speculation it is now officially disclosed that the contract purchaser of the 232-acre Butter estate at East View is the Union Carbide and Carbon Corp.

The corporation, which has 200 plants, including several at Oak Ridge, Tenn., for the Atomic Energy Commission, employs about 65,000 persons throughout the nation and is owned by more than 100,000 stockholders.

Five fields of production feature the corporation's activities: alloys and metals, chemicals, carbons and batteries, industrial gases and carbides, and plastics.

We congratulate our prospective new neighbor upon astute selection of a site for its plant and in this connection it is significant that the selection came, in part, from one who is himself well aware personally of the attractiveness of Westchester.

Westchester, we are sure, will be glad to cooperate to make the new neighbor welcome.

PLATFORM PROBLEMS TOO

NOT only in the selection of candidates but also in the preparation of the respective platforms will there be acrimonious controversy at Chicago next month.

Major problems for the GOP will be reconciliation of conflicting views between Taft and Eisenhower forces on foreign policy and foreign aid.

Ordinarily, platforms contain more generalities than outright declarations of policy, more compromises than specific commitments. For a platform is a four-year declaration of intentions which can harm as it baunts.

Accordingly, many voters listen to the words of the candidate rather than hold faith in the planks of the platform. Yet, here, too, they can be misled. Remember, as a notable example, the 1952 campaign words of F. D. Roosevelt:

"I regard reduction in Federal spending as one of the most important issues of the campaign."

Those words were followed by the emphatic promise that if elected he, Mr. Roosevelt, would cut Federal spending by 25 per cent!

JUNE BRIDE OF '52

THERE were almost 1,700,000 brides in this country in 1950. Last year there was a decrease of four per cent. And license bureaus report that on the basis of applications for 1952 will show a further drop, despite the tradition that Leap Year accelerates the heart tempo and coaches Cupid from the sidelines.

The bride of '52 is possibly quite different from her mother, bride of '32. She is much more likely to make a visit eventually to the divorce court than was her mother, and far more likely than her grandmother. In the last 60 years the divorce rate has risen from 59 divorces per thousand of population to 2.7 per thousand.

The '52 bride is much more likely to go on working after the ceremony than was her mother. There are actually now in this country more employed married women than employed single women. But our bride is almost certain to drop out of labor's ranks, at least temporarily, when her first child arrives.

Mama had it better in some ways, however. Back in '32 we still had prohibition and she probably didn't have to compete so strenuously for her mate's leisure time. She had no nylon stockings but she could buy good silk ones for 77 cents a pair, gloves for a dollar or less, and Fifth Avenue dresses for \$5 or under. As for the honeymoon then, the blushing couple could take an eight-day cruise on the St. Lawrence for only \$60 apiece.

Times change. Customs alter. New figures rise and strut across the stage of the world. But the June bride is always with us, sweet and blushing and happy in her new home. So, whatever the future may hold for her, here's to our bride of '52! The sweetest of yesterday and the wife of today, of whom we may say, we admire her for her beauty, respect her for her intelligence, adore her for her virtue, and love her because we can't help it.
