

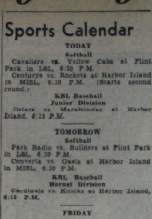

Try To Reach Accord On Anti-Red Line Of Action

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Churchill come to grips today with the hard core of present East Asia-American difficulties that what to do about halting Communist conquest in southeast Asia.

Diplomatic observers said it seemed possible that by the end of the Washington talks—slated to go through this weekend and perhaps longer—the two heads of state might agree on some line of action. There was no indication of what that line would be.

The U. S. position up to now has been that urgent measures are needed to form an anti-Communist alliance which would include Britain, the United States and other countries with direct security interests in southeast Asia. Mr. Eisenhower presumably was prepared to urge Churchill to join in such an undertaking.

The British position, most recently stated by Foreign Secretary Aneurin Bevan, is that a defensive alliance could be effective in its own right but that it should be paralleled by a system of nonaggression guarantee, which would include Communist nations as well as others.

American officials have rebuffed the nonaggression pact idea as involving Communist promises which could not be trusted and as a potential obstacle to real security systems.

The rebels under Castillo Arben had threatened to take up their fight against the regime headed by Col. Diaz. The Guatemalan Radio said yesterday that rebel planes had bombed Guatemala City. The rebels had the station west off the air. A communiqué from the rebel headquarters made no mention of the bombing.

Private advice reaching New York said the Diaz junta was overthrown in a coup by Col. Monzon. He was described as an anti-communist. These advisers said Col. Monzon was expected to negotiate the surrender of the anti-Guatemalan government. They added that the new government announced a general amnesty for all anti-communists who had been arrested since the end of the coup.

Col. Diaz, a former army chief, followed the army-forced resignation of leaving President Jacobo Arben Guzman. The new military regime promptly ousted Diaz. It was reported that he failed to please the anti-Diaz rebels driving toward the capital. The rebels, however, were not the only ones to be ousted.

Retreating Unit Ambushed By Viet Min. Losses Admitted

SALONG, Indonesia (AP)—The French today announced abandonment of a stronghold in central Viet Nam and admitted two deaths and four injuries among the withdrawing troops.

The high command said French and Viet Nam forces pulled out last Friday from an area of 200 miles northeast of Saigon and 60 miles west of the China Sea.

The French said their forces suffered serious losses in an all-day fight with the Communist forces last Friday and more damage in actions continuing into Sunday. The high command asserted Viet Min. claims of more than 1,000 casualties were possibly exaggerated.

On Sunday, the announcement of the withdrawal admitted that the French had suffered heavy losses in the area. The high command said the Viet Min. had been successful in regrouping the French forces in Indochina.

But the withdrawal, under Gen. Henri Navarre's admission earlier this month that a five-month campaign to smash the Viet Min. in central Viet Nam had failed.

The prospect of military service, while a great barrier, and an interruption of one's plan gives "each returns a discipline of mind and body and a general maturity which is invaluable in later life," he reasoned.

The challenge of democracy, "carved from the wilderness by people with courage, brains and determination," is always with us, he declared. Today's graduate inherits a nation preserved by those who fought and died in two great wars, he pointed out, and "the red tide of communism again threatens the nation's well being."
"To survive, he warned, "our country must remain strong within and show the world a solid front which will not crumble." The people are the strength of a democracy, he said, and every graduate must become an integral part of the political system. "We can make ourselves strong in word and deed, and by so doing make our country strong," he concluded.

Faith is the means for overcoming obstacles in our pathway, Miss Phelps said, again taking up the Paraphrase, and it is well expressed in George Bernard Shaw's poem, "Oh World," which was recited by Joyce Benedict.
Finally, Miss Phelps said, we must look far ahead, and introduced Beverly Munier who spoke on "The Distant View."
Questions each should ask himself explaining the future, Miss Munier said, are "What success do I want?" and "How can this success be obtained?" As to the first question, those who crave that they want wealth, fame and glory, which she called outward assets, have forgotten inward developments in listing material aspirations, she warned, "we must not lose sight of countless other resources such as understanding, cooperation and personal integrity." The thinking individual she pointed out, does not measure success in dollars.
