PRAYER FOR TODAY

Connecticut Ups Tolls; Should Westchester Also?

ITH surprising suddenness, Connecticut has doubled its tolls on the Merritt Parkway and has increased by 50 per cent on the Wilbur Cross Parkway.
The tolls on the Merritt Parkway at Greenwich and Hillside rise from 10 to 20 cents, and on the Cross Parkway at Allingford from 10 to 15 cents. The new tolls are to become effective within a few days, as soon as the highway signs and legal notices can be prepared.

The impact on Westchester tollways will, naturally, be considerable. For hundreds of thousands of our residents these two Connecticut parkways. Many use them each week during the hot months, and others use them periodically to visit friends of the Nutmeg State throughout the year.
But there is more to this development than its immediate effect upon the toll parkway business, has doubled its tolls—apparently without any substantial public opposition. Westchester holds its tolls exactly where they have been first imposed.

We do not suggest that Westchester raise its parkway tolls to get even with Connecticut. That would be a childish thing to do.
But we do offer the suggestion that the same economic factors which led Connecticut to raise its parkway tolls have also been at work in Westchester—and for a much longer period of time. Inflation, larger maintenance expenses, increased personnel and higher wages, need for modernization—all these factors have raised Westchester's annual parkway costs. And they will probably become even more worrisome in the future.

Connecticut has taken a bold step in meeting these financial problems.
Should Westchester, with a parkway traffic 85 per cent outside our boundaries, do the same?

Westchester Pays More For Car Insurance—Why?

THE CLAIM advanced by the insurance companies is that the new rates will move motorists of this state \$3.6 million.
That applies overall—but in Westchester, rates elsewhere in the state, and particularly elsewhere in the metropolitan area, the rates are not so high.
What care I know of the law?

In other words, we're selfish enough to be a whole lot more concerned with increased auto insurance rates here in Westchester than with lower rates elsewhere in the state, and particularly elsewhere in the metropolitan area.
The announcement of the new rates wasn't too clear as it came. Nor did it say why there was such discrimination.

For full "comprehensive" coverage, which includes insurance against fire, theft and vandalism, the Westchester rates go up 5.4 per cent. But in Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx the rate is cut 5.2 per cent and in suburban Queens, it goes down 9 per cent.

On the \$50-deductible collision policy, the rate stays the same in Westchester. But in New York City it is cut 4.6 per cent, in Nassau and Suffolk it goes down 7.8 per cent, and in Long Island City it drops 20.5 per cent.

On the \$100-deductible collision policy, the Westchester rate rises 5.3 per cent. But in nearly all of New York it goes down 6.7 per cent, in suburban Queens it is down 14 per cent, and in Long Island City it is reduced 31.7 per cent.

We believe the insurance companies owe Westchester motorists an explanation of why this sudden gouge is made upon their pocketbooks.
Would they have us believe that we have more thefts and more fires than in the comparable counties of Nassau and Suffolk?

Do they mean to tell us that our collisions are more costly than those in Long Island City?
Do they expect us to accept the theory that we are subjected to more vandalism than the Bronx, Manhattan and Brooklyn?
Westchester motorists have a right to answers to these questions. We shall try to get them.

For we certainly cannot accept without grave question the supposition behind the new rates that we have more costly thefts, fires, collisions and vandalism here in Westchester than anywhere else in the entire metropolitan area.

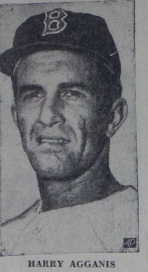

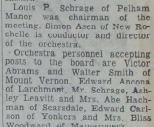

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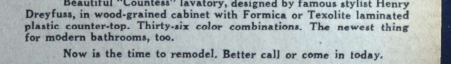

Our Children Really Can Read

by VIRGINIA CLAIR
NEW ROCHELLE—

In case parents are in doubt as to whether their "Johnny" knows how to read, members of the city's school teaching and administrative staffs assure them

that "with few exceptions Johnny is now on the level of his age level ability."
At a special meeting under the direction of Dr. Elsie F. Neuner, director of instruction, several teachers, principals and special school personnel explained to Board of Education members the curricula of all school levels in the public school system. The meeting was called in response to requests from board members and school personnel to clarify today's curriculum in the schools, and especially the so-called "three R's." Dr. Neuner said she hoped the meeting would be the first in a series of curriculum discussions.

Urged To Discuss
Parents were urged by the educators to meet with principals and teachers of respective schools to discuss children's reading problems and the methods used to teach reading in the home. The panel members are taught so that they will not bring about conflicts in their children's understanding of reading at home or by resorting to texts, which might differ sharply from those used in the schools.

Dr. Neuner said it must be remembered that in today's elementary school program science and social studies are as much a part of the curriculum as the "Three R's."

Mental Age Six
Although a concept of numbers varies greatly among children, it has been established that a child needs a mental age of six years to begin a reading

program, Dr. Jack D. Roberts, principal of Daniel Webster School, Mamaroneck, said. "The flash-card method is still used, but it is no longer necessary for the first grader to know the 100 combinations on these cards, however, when he finishes first grade. Learning in this area also is dependent on maturity rate and a child's general development," the principal stressed.

Dr. Roberts said that educational researchers claim that if all arithmetic work was postponed until the eighth grade, students would learn it in three months as abstract subjects such as arithmetic are learned in relation to maturity.

Writing skill, it was pointed out by the speakers, begins with manuscript writing in first grade and develops into cursive writing, which they said is fairly easy for a child since he just learns to connect the manuscript letters.

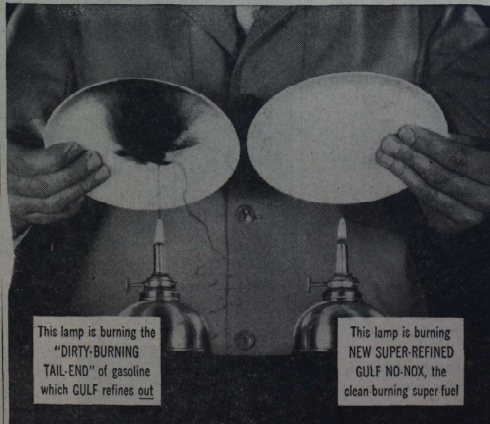

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Adenauer Set Back On Volunteer

Bonn Drags Feet On Army Step

Adenauer's plans came last night after a heated debate in the Bundestag (lower house). Government sources said new proposals would be drafted but there was considerable doubt that the legislators could prepare and pass another bill before the start of their scheduled Summer recess July 16.

Although still approving retirement in principle, many of Adenauer's supporters complained that the measure contained no guarantee of civilian control over the military and could lead to a resurgence of German militarism. The sharp blow to Mr. Adenauer's plans came under sharp attack from representatives of all parties, including his own Christian Democrats.

The decision to return it to committee was taken on a show of hands, without a recorded vote. Despite a personal appeal by their seventy-nine-year-old leader, many of Adenauer's chief lieutenants deserted him in his debate. The government said all controls would be provided in the later, permanent legislation.

New 'Wehrmacht' Opposed
Opponents of the plan demanded extensive safeguards to assure that the new German army can never become "a state within a state," as the old Wehrmacht was once termed. Members of the powerful Security Committee, who returned recently from a tour of the United States, urged that West Germany follow the U. S. pattern of congressional control over the armed forces.

Although a setback for Mr. Adenauer, the result was not a complete rebuff. Under its rules, the Bundestag could have rejected the bill outright instead of sending it back for further study before the decisive second and third readings. But the mounting demands for changes could postpone for months the start of West German rearmament.

Local Government Costs \$205 A Person In State For Year

ALBANY (AP).—New Yorkers paid local taxes at the rate of \$110 a person during fiscal 1954-55 to support city, village, town and county governments. The State Comptroller's office reported today that local governments had spent \$31 billion during that fiscal year, equivalent to \$205 for each resident of the state.

Of that sum, they received \$370 million in state aid, \$114 million in federal aid and \$333 million by borrowing. The remainder, \$1,674,000,000, was raised by real estate taxes and non-property levies.

Nearly \$1 billion of the expenditures went for construction and operation of schools.

Too-Sharp Curves Make Hag Of County's Glamor Expressway

Much of the "express" will be taken out of the Cross-Westchester Expressway by changes in the plans for the route in Elmsford. Although the state has not officially announced speed limits for the expressway to connect the New York and New England Thruways, those familiar with the plans estimate that not much more than 45 mph will be safe or possible.

How the Elmsford curves are being sharpened is shown by some comparisons. On the New York Thruway, where 60 mph is permitted, there are no curves with a radius of less than 2,800 feet. The original plans of Charles H. Sells, expressway consulting engineer, for the expressway through Elmsford called for sweeping curves with a radius of 3,000 feet. The new plans require two curves of 1,900-foot radius.

Curves can be handled for added safety, but there is a limit to the banking possible in slippery sliding, especially in slippery weather. Not only will some curves be almost twice as sharp as those on the Thruway, but numerous entrance and exit ramps along the 12-mile strip also will require reduced speeds.

These factors raise the question of how motorists coming off a 60-mph speedway are to be persuaded to cut their speed by 15 miles or more. Many motorists, after a long trip at high

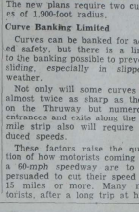
