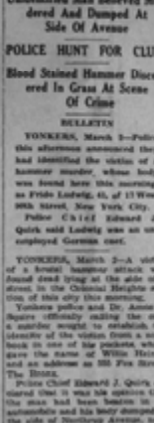

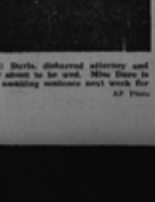

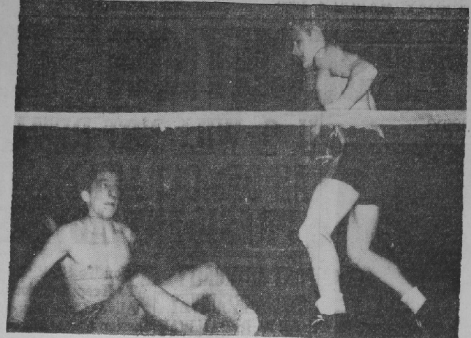

FACES... Equal Justice Party Files Petition On Deadline

AIMED AT KUHN An independent group of voters styling themselves the "Equal Justice" party filed a petition of candidacy last night naming William F. O'Connor as its candidate for trustee.

No candidate for mayor was named in the petition, which was filed one-half hour before the midnight deadline for such action.

The petition bearing 349 signatures filed with Clerk Bull before the deadline, was filed by law, and that is its primary object...

No other petitions filed and no other petitions by independent groups were filed with Clerk Bull before the deadline.

The filing of the "Equal Justice" party's petition was not unexpected. It was generally considered a foregone conclusion that the party would attempt to win to the polls on March 21.

The 349 signatures on the petition included those of many persons identified with the Democratic Party including those of Jeremiah Manning Jr., acting chairman of the Democratic Party...

Notarized papers in the petition bore affidavits signed by William Egan of 418 West Post Road, Mr. Rosch and Mr. Thomson of Arthur H. Bunting Avenue and Harry Bell of 152 Bay Avenue.

One page, bearing 12 signatures, had not been notarized. Whether the entire page by eliminating Mr. O'Connor as a candidate would have more than the required 12 signatures, political observers were not sure.

Mr. O'Connor was not named in the petition. He is a member of the Albany County Board of Supervisors.

Mr. O'Connor is unopposed in his own district in the coming election, therefore, will be between Mr. Kuhn and Mr. O'Connor.

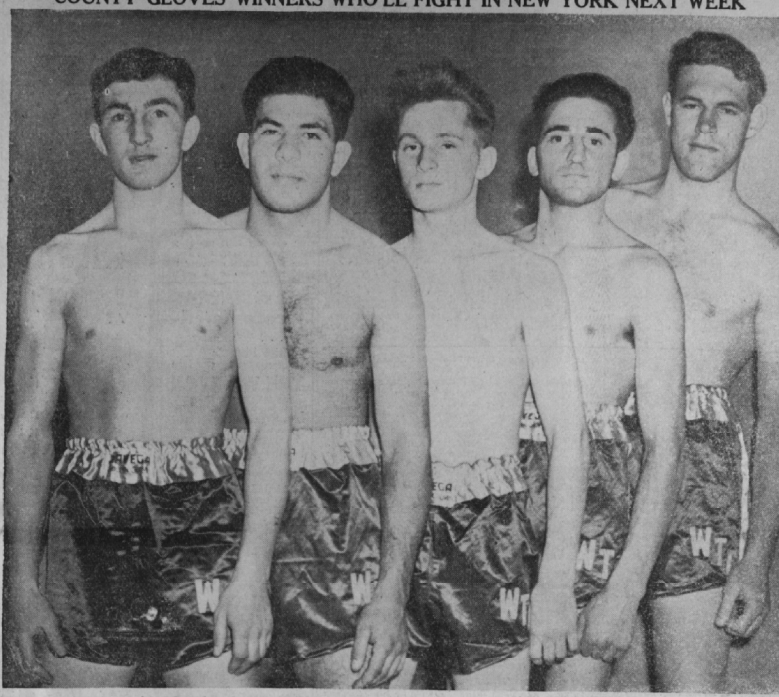

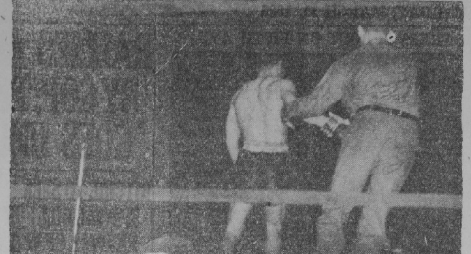
