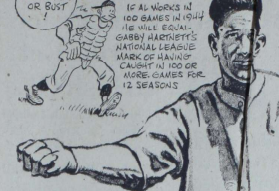

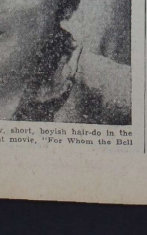

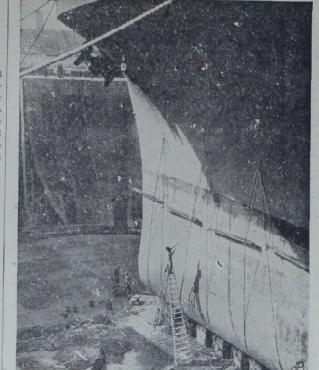

Revenue Bureau Warning—Shun Unscrupulous Tax Expert

WHILE PLAIN—A federal income taxpayer was urged today by Harry M. Hickey, district collector internal revenue, through Division Chief George H. Baker of the White Plains office, to shun unscrupulous "experts" who fabricate tax returns.

Mr. Hickey said that the tax expert should be a certain figure, always more than the tax should be. Then he will offer to "save" a substantial part of the home tax obligation. In return for a percentage of the alleged saving. Finally he will make out a fantastic return, reduce the tax from a fictitious \$200 to an actual \$40 for example, and collect the balance of the difference.

Another favorite method is to use home on a 10-day tour on commission of the taxpayer. The "expert" will credit the taxpayer with a family status or dependents he does not have, and pad up as tax deductions. A married man with an income of \$2,000, for example, will be credited with \$500 taxable taxes, which would mean an expenditure of \$50 for amusements during the year.

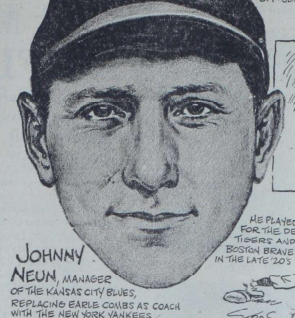

The beautiful and scientific knowledge available at Harvard University's Arnold Arboretum were shown in a series of natural color slides at the March meeting of the Garden Club of Larchmont Monday, Mrs. Dr. Donald Wyman, horticultural expert of the Arboretum, spoke on "Trees of Babes."

Describing the Arnold Arboretum, with its 265 acres, 6,500 different plants, and library of 50,000 volumes in 35 languages, as a place where plants, trees, and flowering shrubs from all over the world are propagated and made available to nurseries for sale, Mrs. Dr. Wyman also showed means of slides the countless varieties and species of woody plants, both native and rare types.

Different species are studied at the Arboretum, and compared with their counterparts scientifically, and many varieties which will grow in various climates are then classified. Slides were shown in great profusion, including the great profusion of hybrid and new yellow crab and the Catharine crab, a new variety not yet available to the public, with great glossy flowers of 30 petals.

Brilliant colored vied with roses, including the native Virginia rose and the new Arnold rose, originated from crossing two roses, one from the Arnold rose, the other from a Louisiana hybrid called, which were shown in different colors.

Confined behind the Great Devon, Mrs. Dr. Wyman showed, in color, the New York spruce, hemlock, white pine, and with dozens of others. Many of these are shown in large numbers of European, Latin and others. Some varieties are cultivated in the Arboretum, others are grown from seeds sent from the four corners of the earth.

Pink lilac, viburnum bearing black red and blue fruits, dogwood and native rhododendron, magnolia, bayberry, and species of plum were shown. Dr. Wyman recommended, that if anyone is going to the ground, when it grows fine tall, with a few narrow, showy display, after several seasons, he should try.



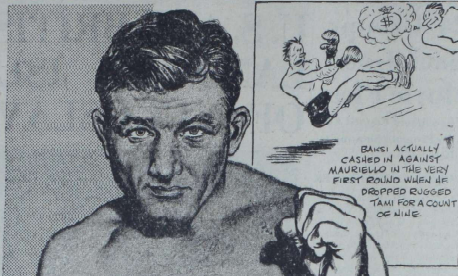

INSTALLMENT V

The Third Step to Peace

At this distance from the last war we can take an overall view. We must accept it as certain that a period of disturbing years will elapse over our enemies.

Therefore, it is urgent that we accept a transitional period of growth of economic and political stability and the solution of long-range problems as a necessary stage of the "Trustees of Peace" should have in their duty not only to see that the terms of the "provisional peace" are carried out but to maintain order in the world and of equal importance to reset the machinery for determining the solution of the long-view problems. Among these long-view questions are:

The further terms to be imposed upon our enemies including reparations and the abolition of militarism.

Transfers of Axis leaders and officials for criminal actions.

The disposition of territories and reparations to be made.

Settlement of private-property questions, reparations and inter-governmental debts.

Final determination of the boundaries and the settlement of the various regional and special commissions should negotiate the acceptance of their conclusions must be subject to acceptance by the various groups involved.
