

Panther Five Triumphs Over Salesian By 63-23 In Season Finale

East Enders Close Schedule With 14 Wins, Four Defeats

Closing their 1944 season with their 14th win as against four losses, the Panthers yesterday afternoon slaughtered Salesian by a score of 63-23 in the season finale at the home of the East Enders.

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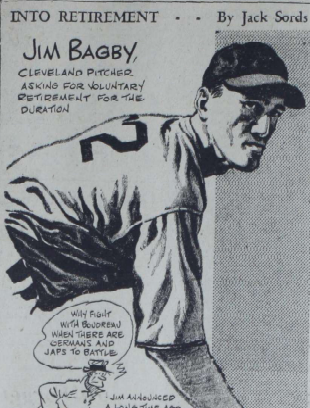

Larchmont Post of the American Legion has launched a comprehensive plan to anticipate and meet the problems of returning service men and women at the close of the war. It was announced today by John M. Palmer, director of publicity of the Legion's civic committee composed of veterans as well as residents of the community.

Local and personal aid, employment in business and industry and educational assistance are among the broad objectives of the unique "Larchmont Plan." Mr. Palmer explained the details of the plan.

"Since the problems of a substantial community differ greatly from those of the average smaller town," Mr. Palmer said, "we call for cooperation from every Larchmont citizen. The plan calls for men and women in the service and all residents."

Following the generally accepted principle, repeated with respect to the President on "Reconciliation Through the Re-Adjustment Act," the plan calls for the future post-war problems of every Larchmont citizen. It is primarily in the lap of the home town citizen that the Larchmont Post started planning in November.

Johnson explained that it was too great an undertaking for any one organization alone and that the plan is complete success, and the measure of that success is to be judged by the returning veterans, it will require service and cooperation from every person in the community who calls himself or herself an American.

This group will be sufficiently representative of all cooperating organizations and will be made up specifically of interested active, experienced citizens who will contribute to the program as a whole, as well as definite services where necessary, functioning as a smaller executive committee with E. H. Gibson as chairman.

Service Clubs Promote Unity, Writer States

Service clubs are among the most valuable instruments in the country for the promotion of unity among various groups of people and the fostering of democracy in municipalities of all sizes, Miss Ruth Taylor of New York City, columnist and labor writer, writes in the Larchmont Rotary Club paper at a luncheon meeting at the Elms Club.

Her newspaper articles reach three groups of people, she said, through the labor press, the rural press and the Negro press and she has discovered by talking in a friendly, unassuming manner to labor groups she is quickly accepted without prejudice or envy.

Representing a foundation organized for the "propagation of democracy," she said, "Why shouldn't we get up and talk about democracy? After all, that's how the Nazis and Fascists first spread their beliefs; they weren't afraid to stand up for the things they thought. There is no reason why we Americans should hesitate to make an effort to spread the principles of democracy."

"We are proud of our democracy. It should be free from prejudice against any group, race, religion, or class. Free from discrimination, a democracy in which the good of all and where the majority respects the rights of the minority, is a democracy in which the status of the father is not necessarily that of the son, where every man can grow in power by merit and by merit alone, a democracy where there is liberty of thought, clean, freedom without artificiality, charity without patronage, religion without bigotry."

Miss Taylor answered several questions at the close of her talk and discussed for some time the probable effect upon the country of the war. "The war will not be over," she said, "until we are united. We must be united. We must be united. We must be united."

Last year each of the two squads won only five games, this year both are well above the 500 mark and with prospects at both schools fairly bright for next year, they are liable to stay over that mark during the next season.

LOCAL HIGH

To the notable subject, Tony Loacono, goes the local individual scoring title for the season. And to LARRY GIBSON, home-grown star of the Tiger outfit, goes the runner-up spot. Loacono tallied 276 markers in his 18 games and was a dead shot from around the foul line. Gibson got most of his scores on close up shots, but he's not much of a shooter when he's away from the court. He's a real shot when he's in the key.

Believes scores weren't quite so high. Only Tony Joyce looks to be the regular season leader, but he's a mere one point. Hamley's best replacements in the past season are expected to take the places of the two Carpenters, who will be lost by graduation.

So neither of the outfits will have to ask for quarters from anyone during the next season. As a matter of fact, from the present outlook other teams will be asking for quarters from both Mamaroneck and Bellmore.

With that we say good bye to basketball for this season. The boys have hung up their suits, the equipment is put away, and this is the final column we will write. It was a good season for both teams and the players and their coaches are to be congratulated.

Negro Artists Give Program Before 600

America must clean her own house and begin to practice democracy at home before she can begin to preach democracy in the rest of the world, Miss Frances, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told a group of approximately 600 persons who attended a program Sunday afternoon sponsored by the association at St. Thomas's Community House.

Outlining the work done by the organization in the struggle to wipe out injustice throughout the country, Miss Baker described the litigation carried on in several states which has succeeded in equalizing teachers' pay. In those states, finally, salaries are based on the number of years a teacher has taught and the amount of training he has had for his job, she said, "instead of on the color of his skin."

Miss Baker mentioned several cases of injustice involving the persecution of Negroes, and said, "We can't preach democracy to the world while we deny our own people freedom from fear."

The variety of democracy, she continued, is how well it serves the needs of the man himself as well as the needs of the man highest up. She denied that the association is a "race baiter" and said that when a protest is made against evil during the war, the charge is made that it is bad for the nation's morale.

If you carry protest in wartime because it disturbs the war and you can't protest during peace because you are "disturbing the peace," then on earth are you going to protest? she asked. "I say the time to protest against a wrong is the moment it arises. I don't believe in the democratic principle until it is founded. The justice to be determined by the majority is not the will of the color of a man's skin? If America is to live up to the challenge in this war, it must be willing to clean its own house. We must practice democracy at home with the black citizen as well as with our white citizens."

"China that is accomplished," she concluded, "America may win this war only to find that she must fight it all over again at home on her own territory."

Miss Baker's talk was sponsored by a program which featured the introduction of W. C. Handy of Brookville, famous Negro composer of "St. Louis Blues," and known as the father of the blues. It was the first time he had attended any public function since a fall he suffered in October, he told the audience.

Germany Still Fight Bitterly Inside Cassino

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS NAPLES, (AP)—New Zealand troops of the British Army were engaged in a bitter struggle for the remaining German fortifications on the western side of Cassino, Italy, the Allies announced today. Many German prisoners were taken.

The German line, which the Allies had placed in the lobby of the Continental Hotel, were broken into 150 prisoner strongholds there, the Germans still were holding out in that area.

The Germans also clung firmly to positions on the slopes of Monte Cassino overlooking the town, including the strategic point they retained in a counterattack Sunday. It was announced, and are laying a heavy artillery gun on Allied troops from these places.

Three enemy counterattacks on the ridge on Monte Cassino held by the Allies were repulsed and three other points remained in Fifth Army hands, despite German attempts to take them.

On the beachhead British troops made two successful raids in force on enemy positions near the west end of the perimeter, inflicting heavy casualties. Sharp pitched attacks occurred on the Eighth Army front.
