U. S. Flays Red Attack On Planes

Navy Brands Incidents As Unjustifiable And A 'Hostile Act'

STRONG TERMS USED

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States today flayed a Soviet attack on Navy planes off the Manchurian coast for two Soviet attacks on Navy planes off the Manchurian coast and for the Red Army's removal of Manchuria's industrial equipment.

The protests followed an unexpected approach in future dealings with Moscow.

The specific reason for the State Department's broadside against the Japanese puppet state related to the attacks on American planes, the Navy used very strong language. It termed an incident an "hostile act" and called the other "unjustifiable."

The Navy's protest coincided with a State Department declaration that Russia had no right and no duty to ally with Japan to strip industrial equipment from the former Japanese puppet state in Manchuria.

The attacks on American planes both were reported to have taken place in the Port Arthur-Dairen area, and the Navy pointed out that under the terms of the 1915 Twenty-One Demands signed in 1915, Japan had no right to ally with China to strip industrial equipment from Manchuria as it had done.

The State Department said flatly: "The United States has no agreement, secret or otherwise, with the Soviet Government in regard to the disposal of Manchuria, a matter of common interest and concern to those allies who bore the brunt of Japan's devastating attack."

Welfare Office Issues Plea For Nurses And Attendants To Meet Grasslands Crisis

An urgent appeal for nurses and attendants to relieve the desperate shortage of help at Grasslands Hospital has been issued by Miss Ruth Taylor, county commissioner of Public Welfare, through Charles DeVine, Town of Mamaroneck welfare officer.

The hospital has a maximum bed capacity of 780. Mr. DeVine said today, but at the present time only 240 beds can be used because of the shortage of nurses, practical nurses and attendants.

There are cases in Mamaroneck which should be under treatment at Grasslands, especially several tuberculosis cases. Mr. DeVine pointed out, adding that, during 1945 there were Mamaroneck welfare cases in Grasslands, 15 of which were TB cases.

The 1945 financial bill has not yet been received, but in 1944, the Town paid \$10,946.65 for 69 cases which included eight TB cases and represented 2,653 hospital days. That was the bulk of the \$23,211.84 spent that year for hospitals and home medicine. Incidentally, it was the lowest total medical bill since 1933 when the Town spent \$55,437 exclusive of home medicine. The highest hospital bill was in 1937 when the town spent \$73,363.

Miss Taylor's communication points out that there is now a waiting list of 135 and that, if they should have to stop admitting patients to the infirmary of the county home, it will mean a rise in the cost for nursing home quarters.

Her letter to Mr. DeVine follows: "You have all known for 18 months, I am sure, of the desperate situation in which Grasslands Hospital is with other hospitals in the infirmary of the matter of nurses. You will remember that in September, 1944, we were forced to take the very serious step of closing a number of wards in the hospital because of our bed capacity to five hundred, this merely because of shortage of staff.

"Now that the war is over, we are still facing serious staff shortages, especially in the field of nurses and attendants. I am writing to you at this time with the hope that with your acquaintance of the staff.

A discussion over the advisability of granting building permits for pre-fabricated homes was presented to the Municipal Building following the hearing on the question of an extension to Addison Street.

Harold J. Kennedy of 12 Locust Avenue told the Village Board that he plans to install one of the pre-fabricated houses on his property and complained that he had been unable to obtain a building permit.

Truman Assails Forces 'Greedy For Gold'

FOR AID OF CATHOLICS TO SPIRITUALITY

COLUMBUS, Ohio, (AP)—President Truman appealed directly today for church support of his stalemated domestic legislative program against the opposition of "greedy gold" men.

"I urged religious support also for the development of atomic energy under a high moral code," the President said.

"The President said that if the people 'truly believed in the brotherhood of man, it would not be necessary to pass a Fair Employment Practices Act to prevent racial discrimination in jobs," he added.

"Certain interests were not so greedy for gold there would be no need to pass the Price Control Act to expire, or to keep down minimum wages, or to permit further concentration of economic power."

"A truly religious fervor among our people would go a long way toward the development of a national health program, a national housing program, an extended and advanced social security program."

President Truman arrived here at 10:30 A. M. after taking his turn at the throttle of his Duesenberg-powered engine for the second time.

Mr. Truman spoke at a special meeting of the national Council of the Churches of Christ in America after his arrival from Fulton, Mo., where he introduced the British Prime Minister Winston Churchill for a foreign policy speech at Westminster College yesterday. He planned to fly back to Washington tonight.

He called upon the forces of "decency and righteousness" to have full use of their war-weariness to save a world beset by "threats of new conflicts, new terror and destruction."

"There is no problem on the earth big enough to withstand the flame of a genuine religious faith," the President said. "Some of the problems of today will yield to nothing less than that kind of revival."

"Or for an Isaiah or a Saint Paul to reawaken a sick world to its moral responsibilities," he declared.

The President called upon all Americans to prove their faith by "starving millions in Europe, and Asia and Africa."
