You Know Where Dewey Stands

NO New York State Legislature in many years has handled larger appropriations or enacted more far-reaching laws, many of them highly controversial, than the 170th session which has now adjourned at Albany.

Included was the upward revision of school teachers' salaries, increase in local taxing power, prohibition of strikes by public employees, wages and means of meeting a \$400,000,000 bonus for veterans, a \$13,000,000 housing fund and an added \$25,000,000 veterans housing program; adjustments in income taxes, relief to financially beleaguered New York City, continuation of rent controls, revision of the State merit rating law to give relief to county, city and town schools, referendum on creation of a 10th judicial district, revision of the State merit rating law to give relief to county, city and town schools, and protection of political parties from "invasion" by non-representatives.

In addition to passage of these bills, the legislature at the same time defeated many other proposals, some of them almost equally controversial. And all this was done in the space of relatively few working days, at a time when the nation itself faces critical foreign and domestic problems, in sessions frequently interrupted by demonstrations from marching high-pressure groups demanding special favors.

Credit goes largely to the legislators themselves, the assemblymen and the senators, and Westchester is entitled to pride in the manner in which our six assemblymen and three senators conducted themselves. But much credit is due to the men and women of the team who called the play and saw that they were executed.

You may or may not agree with Governor Dewey; many were divided during this legislative session as to the wisdom of some of what he wished to be accomplished. And that division was not only among the members of his own party in the legislature itself.

But even those who disagree with him and it gratifying to know where Governor Dewey stands, and you know that he is firm enough in his convictions not to be swayed by high-powered pressure groups or propaganda-induced parades. This is the man who has seen through his major aspects, was the Dewey program and he put it through. His political fortune was made upon it, but there was never any doubt of where the Governor stood.

That, we submit, is a refreshing contrast to what we witnessed under the New Deal, when President Truman, who is also in place in Congress, where Republican leaders change their views almost as often as their clothing and where we have the spectacle of so many hands pulling and pushing at the throat of the engine doesn't get started. Dewey, at least, leaves no doubt of his own wants and of how he intends to get it. He is a strong-minded leader, with the ability to distinguish the rights and interests of the whole people from the arrogant pretensions of selfish political minorities.

News Behind The News

BY PAUL MATLON. MIDDLE AT MOSCOW—The American news dispatches from the Moscow conference said that the Americans were "embarrassed" and "the Russians shifted uneasily in their seats" when Molotov pointed out the secret clause of the past the Yalta Agreement, pointing Russia half of \$20,000,000,000 reparations from Germany. There was no valid reason for any reasonable person to be embarrassed or uneasy.

The truth is Russia probably has already taken more than her allotted half—more than \$10,000,000,000 of the dollar value at the time of the Yalta Agreement. You who have read these dispatches know the look the paper of German man walls, machinery which we had to capture, and turn the German subway, everything she could lay her hands on. German machinery is today strewn out all over Russian railroad sidings. The Russians merely have made it lose its value by putting it to little or no use, because it can be more valuable to them as scrap.

THE ESTABLISHMENT IS THAT OUR "uncanny" and "embarrassed" delegation made no mention of this matter, did not demand opening of secret Germany to find out how much has been taken or make any accusations. (Our military has no Yalta Records.)

The inside reason for this strange omission of the plain facts of reparations looting to date is simple. It is to insure secret spy, current in our official capacity, as to the nature of the Yalta conference. Mr. Roosevelt is supposed to have been somewhat ill as was also Mr. Churchill. It is one said Mr. Roosevelt forgot to have a copy made of the Yalta Agreements, and a Government official once told me the agreement which Mr. Yalta was recorded in American files only by certain personal notes of James Byrnes (then an unofficial advisor), which, persistent, and somewhat stubborn. State Income Tax Facts

(Fourth in a Series) WHAT IS TAXABLE INCOME? In reporting your income for New York State income tax purposes you enter the entire amount of your salary or wages, even though all of it is not paid directly to you. In other words, your income includes such items as the amount withheld from your pay for the Federal income tax.

Not all income is subject to the State income tax—but most of it is. Alger D. Chappas, President of the State Tax Commission, advises that with few exceptions all earnings, including profits and compensation, regardless of source, are subject to the tax. The initial payment is due when the return is filed, on or before April 15.

When you determine the amount of your taxable income, you must consider such items as deductions for savings bank accounts, whether or not withdrawn, must be included in gross income. Earnings of minor children, if their parents have the legal right to them, must be reported by the parent.

If you have been lucky enough to win a lottery, or at bingo, or from betting on horse races—whether legal or illegal—that is part of your income and you are required to report it.

For tax purposes, your salary or wages includes deductions such as State surplus as Federal income tax withheld, pension or retirement fund contributions, group insurance premiums, workmen's compensation, and amounts borrowed from pension funds, Social Security taxes and contributions against salary.

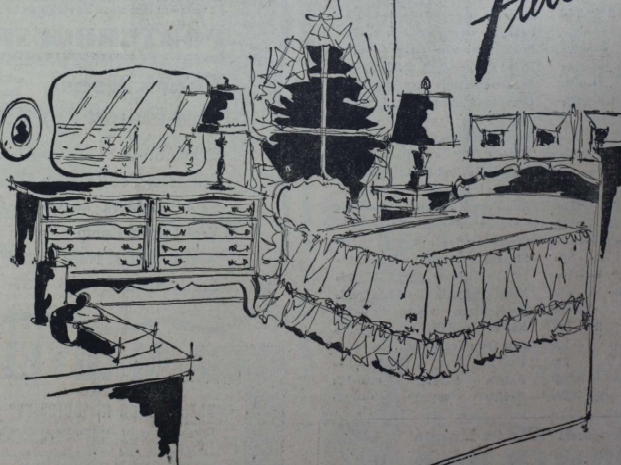

Pronouncing Words Correctly Is Most Important For Child

By ANGELO PATRI In teaching children under the age of eight rhymes, poems and songs, our first thought should be to get the words correctly in their minds and on their tongues.

Children chant poems for their music. They love the rhyme and the rhythm. Few of them have any understanding of the meaning of the words. This is all beyond them and it is better ignored. It is not helpful, for example, to try to explain "America" or "The Star Spangled Banner" to little children.

When we try to explain the meanings of the words, we only confuse the children. We pile sound on sound and that does not help. Later when the children reach the fourth, fifth and sixth grades in elementary school, we should begin probing for the meanings. But first have the words clearly and accurately pronounced.

In teaching such poems, we must say each poem straight through first, so the child gets the whole of it and feels its meaning. Then line by line, every word clearly, so the child every word clear—it sometimes sings, always in concert.

This concert work in learning poetry is often frowned upon by modern teachers, but I stand by it. First, the children hear the music of the words. Then they learn on a chart or blackboard, then they say it. If they like—for the music of poetry is its excuse for being.

By saying it together, the shy ones, the slower ones, feel the strength of the class supporting them and feel happy about it. There is power in the individual, but it is individual power. Nothing that power makes it a force for good for the individuals in the group. None's left out.

Caution here is needed: Ask for individual recitations so that there can be no mistakes, no incorrect words or thoughts set in the mind of any child. But that is a matter that every experienced teacher handles daily, and concert work will aid that work if used correctly.

3. The league will be limited to ten teams. It more than ten apply the executive committee will select the teams.

4. The league will compete in two halves of play with playoffs at the end of the season.

5. Copies of all rosters will be submitted to the executive committee.

6. No player may be registered in more than one league. If a player, registered in one league returns to the first league except with consent of the executive committee. Any transfers must be confirmed in writing with the consent of the managers involved.
