So the Christmas Story and the Easter Story are not stories in themselves at all, but chapters—chapters in a larger story. What makes these first two chapters so beautiful, so inspiring, is the sure conviction, that some day, some century, some thousand year, mankind shall truly WALK the WAY—mankind shall truly worship. And then—say, only then—the third chapter, the COMING, shall come true.

Lenten Thoughts by Our Neighbors Guidance From God Is Needed By All, School Coach Says

President Eisenhower prefaced his inaugural Address with a prayer. The guidance which is equally needed by all men. This is the season, as all seasons should be, for reflection, meditation and prayer.

Much has been said and written about the state of the world, and of this 'younger generation.' Since our hope for the future rests with this 'younger generation,' it is less than prudent to despair. These boys and girls have been thrown into an environment quite different from that of previous generations, and perhaps the parents have adjusted more poorly than they have.

Fundamentally, there has been little change, but people have gotten away from fundamentals. New fads, frills, panaceas and nostrums are being advertised and sold as common 'horse sense.' If one would have a good garden, it requires more than an occasional 'weed pulling.' It requires daily attention, and common sense dictates raising a boy or girl in the same way.

Far better to cultivate before the weeds start; better for the garden, better for the boy or girl.

Mine has been the privilege of close association with high school boys as a teacher and athletic coach. No finer laboratory for the study of human behavior and relationships can be found than that of the school.

Problems Differ from 2 Decades Ago

Surely different problems confront the coach today, than two decades ago, but this is true in all fields, and since this is the parade of life, one must be aware that he gain a point of vantage, lest it pass him by without his knowledge. Inevitably, the boys and girls are not different in their comment, and it takes vigilance and understanding to cope with the ever-changing panorama.

The old expression, 'Let us get down to brass tacks,' is more meaningful. Discipline is an absolute essential, and wherever possible it should be established by cooperation and kindly understanding. Boys lose their respect for any organization where this is lacking. Again, boys are different in the other fellow's heritage nor in his financial worth. They simply wish to know, 'Can he do it, and how he does it?' Isn't this an accurate measurement, and would not this be a great yardstick for all of us?

Home Points the Way

Youth are great explorers, not so much for far-off places as for their particular surroundings. This is where the home taken precedence over all else. Since the home is the bulwark of the nation, it should set as a moral compass to point the way. The church and the school supplement this training, but the home is paramount.

Not only youth, but people of all ages crave acceptance and understanding, rather than mere tolerance. The great barriers, artificially designed by man, for too long have obstructed this goal. While we hear criticism of our youth, the past has little to recommend itself in social behavior. In fact, it has brought us to the crossroads, and there can be no turning back.

Which path shall we take? One is shrouded in complete darkness, the other in shadow, while the other illuminates the mind, and the glow in the hearts of men of good will.

This is, indeed, a time for prayer. Man with his paltry knowledge must call upon Him whose wisdom is infinite to guide his footsteps. Let us all walk in the paths of harmony and peace with fellowmen.





SUSPECT SEIZED
BRITISH HUNT
FOR MAD KILLER
Clerk Is Being Questioned
In Strangling Of
Six Women

LONDON (AP) — John Reginald Christie, Britain's most hunted man, was taken quickly by police today for questioning about the strychnine poisoning of a woman's bodies last Tuesday, which was named while strolling a quiet Putney street only five miles from the murder house in London.

A crowd of 200 quickly gathered outside the police station in suburban Putney where Christie was escorted, southern yard officers searched the man, who was called to direct the questioning.

The balding, fifty-five-year-old clerk, who disappeared just before discovery of the first of the women's bodies last Tuesday, was named while strolling a quiet Putney street only five miles from the murder house in London.

A strapping forty-three-year-old policeman, Thomas Ledger, was walking his beat along the River Thames when he saw a man in a raincoat resembling Christie's well-publicized description. He stopped him and asked him to go to the police station.

The finding of Christie ended a week-long search which extended throughout England.

The little clerk had been last seen at the end of a street in the neighborhood about March 20, several days before the first woman's body was made in the flat he had occupied for 15 years.

A prospective tenant for the apartment, who lived on an upper floor of the house, broke through several thicknesses of wallpaper over an alcove and discovered a body. Police found two more bodies there, and another—that of Christie's fifty-four-year-old wife—under the hoistboards of a window. And the remains of at least two other women in the garden.

A-POWER PLANT FOR SUB TESTED
U. S. Develops World's First Known Version Of Deadly Atomic Weapon

WASHINGTON (AP)—The world's first known version of an atomic power plant to propel a submarine has been placed in operation, the Atomic Energy Commission announced today.

The device—a working model of one that eventually will power the Navy's atomic subs, the USS Nautilus—was set in operation on dry land at the AEC's testing station in Arco, Idaho.

The AEC said the "prototype" power plant—that is the landlocked version of a working type—has "successfully entered its first phase of operation" and will eventually be brought to "full power."

This was the first world actual atomic scientists had actually achieved power in a reactor of the type that is expected to be used to submarine to travel for thousands of miles without refueling and to stay submerged for great lengths of time.

The commission said the atomic power plant had entered a phase known as "criticality" that is, the atomic fuel used in it has been brought to a point where it is sustaining a chain reaction. The AEC said that the energy that can be harnessed for propulsion of a submarine.



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

MAKING CUTTINGS Early In April Is Ideal Time To Perform Rose Planting

A fine display of roses this summer probably means high prices for the list of most home gardeners, and early April is an ideal time to plant the roses which will make this display a reality. Since the amount of food stored in a dormant rose bush is limited and consumed rapidly as the temperature rises, it is essential to have it planted early to enable new roots to develop before the soil is dry enough that a handful will crumble when stepped in. Much of the work in planting roses can be completed even before the plants arrive, by digging the holes and preparing the soil ahead of time. Just as soon as the soil is dry enough that a handful will crumble when stepped in, the planter should be ready to plant. The soil should be prepared in the following manner: For each bush, mix one part of good soil with one part of well-rotted manure or peat moss, and one part of bone meal. This mixture is excellent for partially refining the soil at the bottom of the holes and to fill around the roots when planting, because the roots will develop there readily in such a soil than they would in hard subsoil.

Bone Meal Helped
 If well-rotted cow manure can be obtained, it can be mixed with the soil at the bottom of the holes at the rate of one part manure to three parts soil. A full trowel of bone meal mixed with the soil in each hole is also helpful in encouraging root action. Plant the rose bushes just as they arrive, pruning off any broken canes. In case they arrive when the soil is too wet for planting, keep them cool and cover the roots either with sphagnum moss or moist burlap until they can be planted.

Each rose bush has a swollen area at the base of the stem known as the "union" where the desired variety has been grafted onto a rootstock selected for its vigorous growth qualities. This union should be planted an inch or two below the normal level of soil in the rose bed. This will protect this tender area from drying out and from mechanical injury.

First use the prepared soil mixture in filling the hole, then use the subsoil toward the top. There is no root action until this soil is in place. This soil will be improved as permanent manure and a source of organic matter are added to the soil bed.

Water Thoroughly
 A thorough watering will settle the soil around the roots, and a temporary mound of soil about eight inches high will retard the opening of the young buds on each branch or cane in case of heavy frosts soon after planting. This will prevent desiccation of the canes. This mound can be removed in two or three weeks.

Spring is also a good time for pruning such roses as hybrid teas, floribundas, polyanthas, and hybrid perpetuals. Newly planted roses which have not been severely pruned by the nursery should be pruned to within six or eight inches of the ground, leaving an outward-pointing bud at the tip of each cane, to produce an open type of bush. On established roses, leave five or six buds on strong canes and one or two less on weaker ones for the types of roses mentioned above. Always make clean cuts about a quarter-inch above an outside bud to keep branches growing outward rather than into the center of the bush.

BUILDING CODES PARLEY PLANNED

WHITE PLAINS
 Building code problems and the proposed multiple dwelling code will be discussed at a public conference, to be held in the Little Theater of the County Center on April 30 at 2 P. M. by the Little Building Code Commission.

Invitations have been sent to professional societies, building trades councils, chambers of commerce, real estate boards, building contractors associations and similar groups, as well as municipal officials. The White Plains conference is one of a series of 13 to be held in various parts of the state during April and May.

Material gathered from the discussions will be considered by the commission before the multiple dwelling code is promulgated later this year.

The statewide building code has already been adopted by the Westchester, Putnam, Dutchess, Towns of Mount Pleasant and Ossining, and the Villages of Mamaroneck, Buchanan, Mount Kisco and Ardsley.

Local building code problems will be given special consideration at the conference. The commission points out that the State's plan has advantages for all communities in that it saves them the cost of expert technical services to professional building laws, and also benefits the citizen by providing up-to-date rules and regulations.

No special election is planned but the GOP designation may not be made until July.
