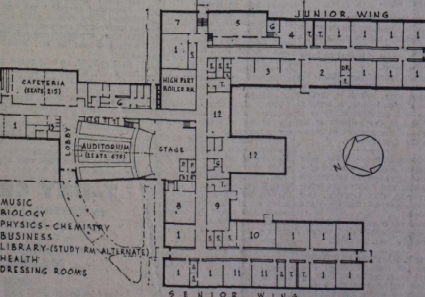

OUR CHILDREN Cooperation More Important Than Authority In Training

by ANGELO PATRI "Caroline, put that business away and go wash your hands, this minute."

"Yes, mother," replied Caroline, her tongue reaching toward her right ear, but she went on tying the ribbon in her doll's hair.

"Caroline, you heard me say 'This minute'!" "Yes, mother," and still the small fingers struggled with the hair.

"Young lady, when I say 'This minute' I mean 'This minute,'" Mrs. Moore said, her voice a little sharper than before.

"It is not good practice to demand that a child, or any other human being, stop what they are doing to do what somebody else wants done on the instant. When a child is busy her whole being is engaged. Her mind, nerves, muscles, glands, all of her are concentrating power on the work in hand. To stop this activity suddenly has about the same effect on the child's mind and body as the brakes have on a car going full speed. Things come to a standstill with a very unpleasant jerk."

It is better for all concerned to give the child a time allowance so that she can slow down to a stopping speed easily. Her attitude toward the situation that awaits her attention will be receptive and more cooperative and she will feel in better health and spirit.

"But I want to feel sure that in time of emergency she will obey instantly and if I let her, take her time!"

Instant obedience is rarely necessary, but when, in time of danger, someone shouts a command to a child she will obey at once. The tone of voice and the situation and circumstances are here and cooperation is an hour-by-hour necessity. If the emergency call it used always, the child ceases to take it seriously and her cooperation is lost and her welfare made insecure. People who insist upon instant obedience to their call, acting like a drill sergeant, are likely

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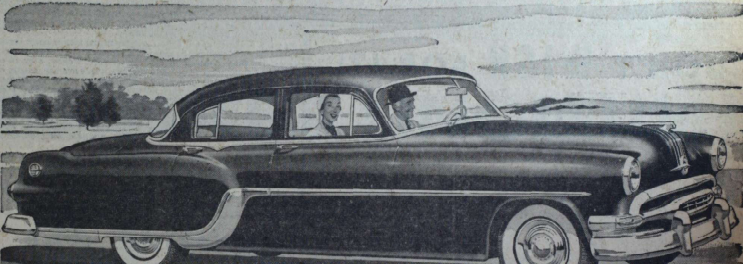

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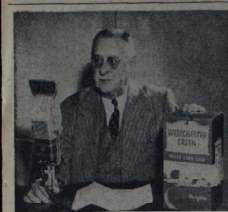

"The facts we get, the prob-worker is the soul of it. We are not taking over the client, we are striving to meet his needs."

New York City agencies utilize a comparable number in Westchester, she said, and there are also a number of private foster homes.

"Our service is related to children who need care out of their homes," she said. "We provide 'nannies' or 'pauques' or vice versa if those unable or unwilling to make a home for an expected child, and we place children for adoption. We now have about 850 children in foster homes."
Mrs. Evelyn Schmidt, supervisor of hospital and medical care, cited examples of the division's work in providing assistance with medical expenses for persons otherwise self-supporting.

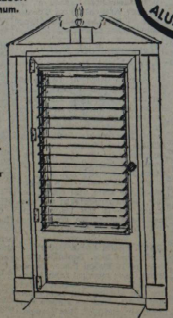

Carthy Fight Rages As Nixon Goes in Radio

Vice President Ready For Speech With Charges Flying

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Nixon states the case for the Republican Administration tonight in a radio-televised address while a family fight rages within the GOP over Senator McCarthy and some of his in-vestigative aids.

Yesterday Senator McCarthy bitterly protested Army Department officials had attempted to "blackmail" his investigations subcommittee into dropping a probe of the Army. He made public a document that represented the Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens as trying to divert the group's attention to a search for wrongdoers in the Navy, Air Force and Defense Department.

Mr. Stevens and John G. Adams, the Army's general counsel, reiterated that such accusations were untrue. Senator McCarthy had said months ago a report embarrassing to the subcommittee would be made public unless an investigation of the Army was called off.

Charged Called 'Famistic'

Mr. Adams labeled the blackmail charge "famistic" a "no name" and Mr. Stevens likewise used "famistic" to describe the charge that he would be "other than" under the hand of the Army, the Navy, the Air Force and the Defense Department.

Before the day was over some Republicans as well as Democrats in the Senate were demanding investigations to determine who is telling the truth in the crooked accusations.

Mr. Nixon had been designated Monday to deliver the party's reply to criticism by Adlai E. Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic Presidential nominee. One of Mr. Stevenson's thrusts was a description of the GOP as "half McCarthy and half Eisenhower."

President Eisenhower had been earlier round with Senator McCarthy, the Secretary said he had asked Army witnesses to testify "abuse" at the hands of investigating committees.

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TWO AMERICANS, 30 OTHERS DIE IN PLANE CRASH

Constellation Airliner Bursts Into Flames At Singapore Airport

SINGAPORE (AP)—A BOAC Constellation airliner crashed and burst into flames on landing at Kallang Airport here today, killing 32 of the 40 persons aboard. BOAC officials said two Americans and one Canadian were among the passengers.

Eight crewmen reportedly survived the crash but were hospitalized but released after treatment.

U. S. Navy Planes Attacked by MIGs Near Czech Line

Reds Charge Aircraft Crossed Border, Fired First

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—Two American Navy carrier-based fighters were attacked by Communist MIG near the Czech-German border yesterday. Czech pilots charged immediately that they had flown over the vital airbase-producing center at Jablonec, 35 miles inside the Iron Curtain and fired the first shot.

The Navy said one of the two American propeller-driven planes was damaged but both pilots landed safely at Neuburg Air Base in the American zone of Germany near Munich.

The Navy said the two planes were on a routine training flight off the Essex-class carrier USS Monterey (CVL-26) when they were shot down by MIG fighters.

The planes had been flying over the American zone of Austria, just at its junction with the German state of Bavaria and Czechoslovakia.

The two Navy pilots still were at the Neuburg Airbase this morning, but the commanding officer there said he was ordered to fly over bridges and captured, burned and destroyed many watchtowers and gun emplacements.

The 44-mile railway and road paralleling it are the pipeline for most of the coal and oil that the Czechs use to power their industry.

The French said the coordinated Viet Minh attacks appeared to have been an attempt to smash the supply line.

French troops, with three tanks and a company of paratroopers, are the Viet Minh's hard-fighting regiment. It last night routed the Viet Minh's 42nd night militia from the city in the village of Shui Quynh.

French planes gave new evidence of their hostility to the Viet Minh. He said the Soviet propeller plane had been shot down, but that the plane had been shot down by the Viet Minh's hard-fighting regiment.

The Rebels put up heavy mortar, machinegun and rifle fire against French tanks, armored cars and mobile artillery. The artillery barrage was one of the heaviest of the eight-year war. At times, fighting was hand to hand.

Hornridge On Democratic Line Only In Election Tomorrow

The final appeal of the Non-Partisans for a line on the ballot in tomorrow's Mamaroneck Village elections was denied yesterday by a six-judge Court of Appeals in Albany.

The action to keep the Non-Partisans off the ballot was started last week by Village Republican Chairman John T. McKeevee on the basis that petitions for Village Judge Henry T. Hornridge, Democratic candidate, and Republican Trustees Eugene Eustein and Jack Holland for a separate Non-Party ballot were illegally drawn in that signer mentioned Village instead of Town addresses and election districts.

Mr. McKeevee's contention was upheld in the Supreme Court, the Appellate Division of the State Supreme Court and finally in the Court of Appeals in Albany.

Judge Hornridge argued for the Non-Partisans in Albany Saturday, and Mr. McKeevee's arguments were presented by Morris Golub, New Rochelle attorney.

The decision restricts the ballot to the Republican and Democratic nominees. All Non-Party nominees have placed on either the Republican or Democratic slates.

Board Acts to Resubmit Bond Issue Again On April 9

The Rye Neck School Board proposal for a \$21 million bond issue to finance construction of a new school and alterations to the present plant, will be resubmitted at a referendum April 9 as was unanimously decided by the school board at a special meeting Saturday.

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GOP Acts To End Rift With McCarthy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republican leaders faced critical decisions today on strategy for ending the war between Senator McCarthy and the Army and fighting an outright break between the Wisconsin Republican and the Eisenhower Administration.

Senator McCarthy and top leaders seemed agreed that a showdown at which he and top Army officials would testify under oath is in order to get at the truth in the so-called "rotten apple" and counter charges.

But where and when to stage the showdown and whether to be held closed doors—remained undecided.

One major question was should the investigation be entrusted to Senator McCarthy's own subcommittee.

After Vice President Nixon's speech Saturday night, with its message obviously directed at Senator McCarthy, the feeling spread on Capitol Hill that a showdown must come soon.

Mr. Nixon said "reckless talk and questionable methods" in fighting Communism played into the hands of opponents of the Administration and that the Administration insists procedures used both in the executive and legislative branches must be fair and proper.

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GOVERNOR ASKS FOR TROT LAWS

Dewey Calls For Reforms In Special Message To Legislature

ALBANY (AP)—Governor Dewey called upon the Legislature today for a strict law to ban public and political officials from owning stock in harness race tracks.

In a special message to the Legislature, the Governor said he felt sure he was reflecting the views of the people of this State in proposing the public officers, party leaders and state employees be forbidden to sell stocks or services to any licensed racing association.

Mr. Dewey said the "opportunity of public officials for private gain" in racing should be removed "for all time to come."

He proposed that public officers and employees, both in state and local governments, members of the Legislature and legislative employees and political leaders be barred from owning any interest, direct or indirect, in a racing association licensed to conduct pari-mutuel meetings.

A reasonable amount should be allowed for such persons owning stock to dispose of their present holdings, Mr. Dewey added.

The Governor said he recognized that no present member of the Legislature had been found to own race track stock and that only three executive branch employees of the state government held shares.

Opportunity For Gain Cited
He conceded that it was legal for anyone to hold race track stock. But he said that "As long as public officials are permitted, there will always remain the opportunity of political influence for private gain."
