Dr. Ayerest is noted for his articles in the field of political science, foreign and comparative government, which have appeared in the Canadian Journal of Political Science, the American Political Science Review, and the Review.

SNOW EXPECTED TO END TONIGHT

3 to 6 Inch Fall Comes Two Days Away

Three to six inches of snow were predicted for today — two days before the official start of Spring. One day after brush fires were reported and while forecasts were trying to come out above-blooming crocuses.

The U. S. Weather Bureau sent a telegram from New York to public utilities at 12:15 saying the show would increase during the next 24 hours.

Driving conditions were hazardous throughout the area with scores of cars damaged in collisions.

Boston warning service gave the depth prediction in telegrams at 7 A. M. and 9:30 A. M. and no traffic was down to 30 degrees at Westchester County Airport where "a considerable accumulation of snow" was expected. The snow was beginning to freeze on highways.

Four skidding accidents completely blocked the Hutchinsons Ferry Parkway between 10 and 10:30 A. M. and no traffic was moving in either direction. Parkway police strongly advised tire chains and said cars would be towed away if they blocked traffic. Trucks were out plowing and spreading sand as soon as they could to the fast-falling snow.

New York Mayor to Offer Proof of His Charges About 'Targets'

NEW YORK (AP)—Mayor William O'Dwyer's version of New York's strange wire-tapping scandal probably will be told to probing grand jurors next week, the District Attorney said today.

The Mayor had been expected to testify today. However, District Attorney Frank S. Hogan said the jury still had more to hear from William J. Ryan, wealthy reformer and bitter O'Dwyer foe. Ryan already has testified for three days.

Meanwhile, a criminal court bar association investigative wire tapping, welcomed the Mayor as a "valuable and conspicuous" witness against the practice.

Herman Hoffman, president of the group said "Mr. Mayor, you almost missed the bus on the argument of wire tapping, but we are happy to have you in this light now, better late than never."

O'Dwyer has charged that at least 75 top city officials including himself were the targets of state eavesdroppers, acting out of the law.

He is going before the Grand Jury to try to offer proof.

Details of the case are expected to be reviewed tomorrow at a meeting here of New York City's Democratic Congressmen.

The session, described by Rep. Emanuel Celler, D. N. Y., as "an important" raised the possibility of a Congressional inquiry.

Million-Dollar Freedom Train Due In Mamaroneck Next Year

The million-dollar State Freedom Train, carrying precious documents dealing with New York State's heritage, will roll through Westchester next Autumn and early winter, making more than 200 stops in the State before adequate inspection by residents of the community.

Peekskill is tentatively set to have the train in late September. During October, it would go to Ossining, Tarrytown and Yonkers. After November and December in New York City, the train would be back in Westchester in January.
