Nazis Say 'D-Day' Here, Claim Rommel Will Invaade Britain

LONDON, (AP)—Nazi-controlled Marshal Petain from Vichy to a radio, reportedly captured by the Allied Italian offensive, declared today that the "D-Day" of the Allied invasion had come—and named strongly that a counter-invasion of Britain might be Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's defense.

The "goat" has already sounded for the certain to rise—if in fact it has not already risen. "Jean Paquis said over the Paris radio last night was felt as far inland as London—said a picked German attack force spearheaded by paratroopers would strike at England the moment the Allied invasion began. These accounts insisted that Rommel, who was described in a Berlin dispatch to LaSalle at Geneva as "Hitler's communications chief in western Europe from the last days of the Low Countries to the Mediterranean," could be counted on to defend by attacking. See **Foreign Corridor**.

Most London observers took this with a grain of salt—believing it more likely that the Nazi press was putting out dispatches of feigned confidence rather than sinking disclosures of any real German plans for the defense of the continent.

Another report said that Rommel had demanded the appointment of a German general with extensive military police powers to take charge of France on the grounds that Vichy may be unable to control the French population when the Allies invade.

This report came through European underground channels after French quarters in London announced the Germans had shifted their headquarters to the south of France.

Americans Hit Oil Plants In Leipzig Area

LONDON, (AP)—American heavy bombers attacked four major synthetic oil plants in the Leipzig area of Germany and one at Breslau, according to Czechoslovakia today in the mounting campaign to paralyze the German war machine ahead of the western invasion.

LONDON, (AP)—American heavy bombers thundered back into the heart of the Reich today, carrying the gigantic pre-dawn assault on Europe through its 28th straight day, following up a heavy hammering of the French invasion coast last night by a fleet of up to 700 big RAF bombers.

First reports did not name the targets of the heavy American daylight blows but Berlin broadcast said bomber formations were over western Germany streaming toward the southwest and that fighter formations were over west, southwest and central Germany, indicating widespread attacks. They said great aerial battles were raging.

American medium bombers got in the day's first assaults with attacks on airfields and other installations in northern France, and channel coast residents were witnessing one of the most impressive displays of Allied aerial might ever seen as an unending cavalcade of lighter bombers and fighters raced back and forth to the continent all morning.

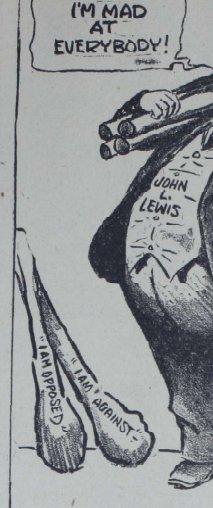
