This Land Of Opportunity

JOHN Macri of Port Chester who died early Monday morning came to this country from Italy while quite young. Mention has been made in his obituary of his hard work as a struggling youth, of his entrance into the construction field as a contractor, of his development of real estate and of his success in other branches of endeavor. As a consequence he was able, although without collegiate education, to put together a modest but nevertheless substantial competence.

In innumerable ways, many kept conscientiously from public knowledge, he aided other young men as they also came up in life. Perhaps the full extent of his beneficence will never be known. In his own life, too, he became the close friend of thousands throughout Westchester.

When Bureaucracy Runs Wild

UNDER the New Deal's peacetime program, magnified by the demands of war, Federal employment has grown to the stage where one out of every 11 employable persons in this nation is on Uncle Sam's payroll. If we eliminate from consideration school teachers, only one State in the Union, West Virginia, has within its borders more State than Federal employes.

That is why the plan now proposed for a "general manager" over all Federal employes is worth study and sympathetic consideration. This new executive would be directly responsible to the President and his job would be to streamline Federal bureaus as an efficiency expert would undertake such a task in private enterprise. It would be a gigantic job if it could be performed, provided patronage and politics were tossed out of the window.

For the job of "general manager" we can conceive of no one better qualified than the Senator who has been here for years voluntarily assumed the role of watchdog, the Honorable Harry F. Byrd of Virginia. We suggest his availability as a Democrat, as a successful business man in his own right, and as one thoroughly informed on the ramifications of the Washington bureaucracies.

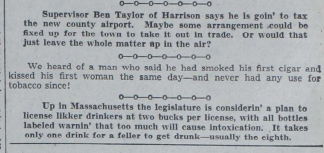

Social Security Broadened In Wagner's Bill

By Tom Reedy

WASHINGTON Staff—The broad concept of social security, including health insurance, was introduced in Congress today by a bill that the nation needs it as a post-war bulwark.

The far-reaching measure, involving costs to both employers and employees, was proposed by Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.) and Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.).

Explaining the legislation in detail in a speech prepared for the Senate, listed these principal provisions:

- 1. Contributions of employers and employees are to be increased from 4 per cent to 6 per cent.
- 2. Excess earnings would be eligible for health insurance similar to that provided by voluntary hospital insurance plans now in effect. New health insurance plans would be affected, they could continue in business.
- 3. The Government would embark on a 10-year plan, with an appropriation of \$25,000,000 to help states build and improve hospitals in rural areas. An additional \$3,000,000 would be provided to help the states make the necessary surveys.
- 4. The U. S. Employment Service would be established permanently. After the war it would take over the War Manpower Commission and other related services within the Social Security Board.
- 5. Social Security coverage would be extended to an additional 15,000,000 persons, including farm workers, domestics, those in non-profit institutions, and the independent, professional, personal and small businessmen.
- 6. Increases are provided for unemployment insurance, especially in rural areas.
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- 10. The U. S. Employment Service would be established permanently. After the war it would take over the War Manpower Commission and other related services within the Social Security Board.

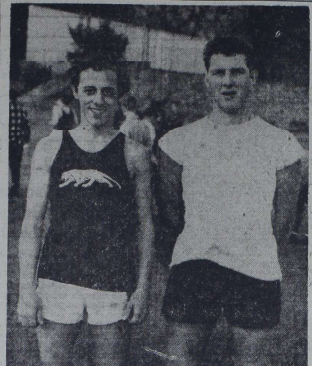

GUAM (AP)—Superfort crews returning today from their heaviest and deadliest destruction work in Japan reported they had lighted giant fires in the industrial section of Yokohama in the first strike against Tokyo's port city.

More than 350 B-29s dropped 3,200 tons of bombs in their third strike in six days within a 20-mile radius of the Imperial Palace.

Airmen reported smoke billowed for four miles above the city and predicted destruction would rank with that of previous highly effective B-29 raids against other major Japanese industrial cities. Even the enemy's high command conceded "considerable damage" was inflicted.

GUAM (AP)—In the wake of Japanese air attacks which sank one light United States fleet unit and damaged 12 others in Okinawa waters, American biplanes slashed down both sides of the muddy island today to begin closing a pincers around stubbornly defended fortress Shuri.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commanding the fleet, said at least 17 raiders were shot down as they attacked Shuri night and Monday. He gave no details beyond saying damage was "light to moderate."

The air raids were the second in less than a week and have cost the Japanese more than 240 planes. Last Thursday they lost 166 planes, damaged 23 American fighters and more than 240 planes.

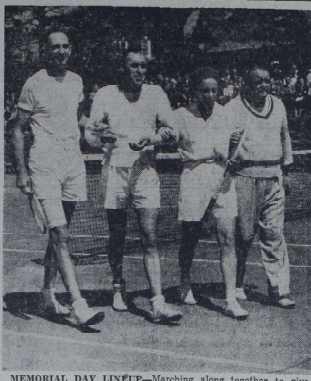

Hungry Laborers Find Army Supplies Tempting Targets

By CENITHA LOWRY Associated Press Staff (Substituting for Hal Boyle)

ANTWERP—The United States Army understands it is hard to handle food and clothing when you're hungry and shabby, but it is bending every effort to halt the pilfering of its supplies.

Thousands of French and Bel-

gians hired as laborers in supply depots, find it difficult to resist temptation when confronted with huge quantities of things they need so badly.

The postmaster said one port officer as we watched long lines of shabby workmen being searched by military police. They have it not anything — even enough to eat — until they have first unloaded a siphoned of candy bars, canned meat or cigarettes. I think under the same circumstances I do almost anything to get hold of a can or two to take home to the kids."

But when you multiply a can or two by thousands of workers it adds up to short supplies for American soldiers. So every possible precaution is taken to dam the holes through which supplies leak into civilian homes and into the extensive black market.

The system isn't perfect. American clerks are peddled openly by black marketeers in Brussels and other cities; chocolate bars are worth more than their weight in gold; the familiar olive-drab cans of Army rations are seen frequently in places far from Army personnel.

Each exit of this great, rubble-strewn port is a search station. Sometimes the MPs at the gate garner a three-foot high pile of discarded food just during the mid-day tramping of departing workmen.

"We get everything," said Sgt. Walter Boyers of Enfield, Conn. "All kinds of rationed goods, food and clothing. The only thing they haven't tried to get out of here is a Liberty ship with a locomotive hauled to the dock."

"They try to smuggle out stuff under their hats, in their wooden shoes, under their armpits. They open cans of meat and stuff it in hollowed-out loaves of bread, or they cut it into sandwich filling. They hide stuff under tobacco in tin cans. I've caught them with stockings stuffed in every pocket."

So, things still disappear. One room in a huge warehouse at the Antwerp port is known as the "pillbox room." In it are goods rescued from broken cartons or taken from the workmen. There's everything there from rubber heels to officers' pants.

I stood before a stack of cigars 30-feet high. Here and there near the bottom layers a heavy cardboard box would have a rough, round hole gouged out of it. The hole was big enough to permit passage of an arm. Each box was empty of cigars.

"The sort of stuff are smart."

Churchill Says 301,201 Died In British Service

LONDON, (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill has announced that the British Empire's armed forces had suffered 1,128,315 casualties during the war, including 301,201 killed.

The reported death toll for the 68 months of the war was only a little more than a third as large as that of the British Empire in the 52 months of the first World War.

In reporting to Commons, Churchill said that official losses were inflicted upon the civilian population of Britain by enemy bombardment. He said civilian casualties totaled 60,383 killed, 86,175 seriously injured and upwards of 150,000 slightly injured.

Traffic Deaths Take Big Toll Of Pedestrians

CHICAGO—A study by the National Safety Council of traffic accidents in 68 large American cities shows that 69 per cent of all traffic deaths in those cities in 1944 came to pedestrians.

This preponderance of pedestrian fatalities came despite a 7 per cent drop in the number of pedestrian deaths in those same cities from the year before, the Council said.

The study made by the Council's committee on pedestrian safety, covers a four-year period beginning with 1941.

In 1944, the study showed, pedestrian deaths in the 68 cities accounted for 70 per cent of the total traffic fatalities.

"The fact that the percentage of pedestrian deaths to total traffic deaths remained practically the same in 1944 despite a drop in the actual number of pedestrian fatalities, indicates the pedestrian still poses the most serious problem of traffic accident prevention in large cities," said the committee.

In three of the four years covered by the study, December brought the greatest number of pedestrian deaths. This, said the committee, is due to seasonal hazards in rain, snow, fog and more hours of darkness—plus the Christmas-New Year holiday activities.

It is obvious," said the committee, "that too many Americans literally walk themselves to death. A little more care and common sense would cut the toll in half."

This increase was achieved in the face of mounting inflation, said Mrs. F. R. Ingraham today.
