

County Pastors To Attend Lutheran Synod Convention

Pastors of Lutheran congregations in Westchester will play prominent parts in the 20th annual convention of the United Lutheran Synod of New York which will be held in St. John's Lutheran Church, May 24 through May 27.

The Rev. Frederick R. Knobel, D.D., a resident of New Rochelle is president of the Synod and will preside at all the sessions, while Edmund P. Wagner, a member of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in White Plains, is treasurer and will report that the 400 congregations of the Synod last year

showed an encouraging increase in benevolent giving.

Two county pastors, the Rev. Ernst A. Tappert, a member of St. Paul's Church, Mount Vernon, and the Rev. Edward Stauderman of Crestwood, pastor emeritus of the Mount Vernon church, will participate in the report of the committee on recognition. Dr. Tappert is secretary for linguistic interests of the Board of American Missions and this year marks the third year of his services in the ministry. Mr. Stauderman has 52 years of service.

The Rev. William C. J. Weidt, pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Mount Vernon, is in charge of Synod's publicity and also serves on the home missions committee, and a special committee preparing for the observance of the 20th anniversary of the United Lutheran Synod of New York.

Dr. Kanzer informed the board that the Veterans' Administration had renewed its contract for the coming year and he praised Dr.

Henry Schiner for the service to the community by his handling of the veterans. So many new cases keep coming in that Dr. Schiner now needs an assistant to work with him. Dr. Kanzer recommended that Paul Prish be

employed in this capacity because of his "fine record" and the board approved.

YCS Luncheon Hears Outline Of Help For Young Women

The role that Youth Consultation service plays in helping adolescent girls solve serious personal problems in a changing world was outlined by speakers yesterday at the annual luncheon meeting of the Westchester YCS Committee at White Plains. Mrs. Richard W. Wilson of Yonkers, chairman, presided at the speaker's table which was addressed by Dr. Leslie E. Lushers, consulting psychiatrist of the agency, and Miss Muriel J. Irvin, district director.

Recalling the organization of the Church Mission of Help in 1913 by a group of earnest churchmen for "youth work with girls who had begun by making a slip-work of their lives," Dr. Lushers

why they are being shipwrecked and how best they may redirect their course." He contrasted the standards and problems of today with those of 1913. Today, he explained, we place less blame on the girl and more on the parents and environment. It is the task of the caseworker to fashion the unconscious motives and with understanding to redirect life. Dr. Lushers continued, "If a girl's conduct is to be good, she must have a chance to be good," he insisted.

He described the background and problems of the average girl who comes to YCS today, with partial high school education, perhaps involved in unmarried motherhood or "navigating very close to dangerous rocks," about 18 years old during the early period of the great depression, suffering from the family insecurity of those days, growing to teenage to find years of war with the accompanying relaxing of standards. Now war has ended but settled peace has not come. There is talk of another depression and another war, and these are the disturbances which the average girl finds, he continued.

Parents are not indifferent today, but they don't know how to help, he reminded. The community is setting standards and must select the kind of professional workers who can give competent guidance, he maintained. Today's adolescent girl must feel self-confidence in four ways: to know that she can hold her place in the world and function socially; to know that she is secure in her family life; to know she has a friend who knows her worst side as well as her best; and still accepts her, and finally to be at ease with herself. Dr. Lushers listed. She must also have good health and a goal in life, a sense of spiritual values.

"A deep faith in the meaning of life, together with an alertness and skill in using all the facilities of the community can often save girls from shipwreck," he said. Miss Irvin commented on the curtailment in staff which will mean YCS can take only referrals of extreme situations. She discussed the philosophy of prevention. "The need has not diminished and our responsibility at this point is not being completely met," she declared. She urged support to restore the service to its full strength.

German Girls Working At Jobs in Poland GORZOW, Poland (AP)—Young German girls have to work for their daily bread in this former German town of Landsberg. Most of the girls appear to be between 16 and 18 years of age. Poles pay them 4 1/2 cents per day in addition to their food and lodging. About 1,500 Germans remain in Gorzow. Seven hundred of these are women. All are awaiting repatriation to Germany and probably will be sent to the Russian zone of occupation.

JURIST DEFERS JAP CAMP SUIT WHITE PLAINS—Trial of a suit by an Army captain against a Rye man he met in a Jap prison of war camp, was deferred until Sept. 20 by Supreme Court Justice J. Gordon Flannery yesterday. Justice Flannery announced the case would be set down permanently for that date the first day of the October term of trial term, Part 2. He explained the delay is necessary because of other cases scheduled for trial through next week, the last of the current term. There is no trial term, Part 3 in June, nor during the Summer recess.

TWO MORE SEIZED IN TROOPER DUEL HAWTHORNE—Two Brooklyn men were arrested today on charges of acting in concert with two others arrested Wednesday after a high speed gun battle with two State Troopers on Taconic State Parkway near Mohan's Park in Yorktown. State Police said they were bringing Joseph A. DeSteno, 22 and Vincent Vacono, 21, two longshoremen, from their Brooklyn homes to Hawthorne Barracks. New York police say the pair sold a gun to Dominic Ososco and Richard Chapman, ex-cowboys who held up Corporal Raymond McCoy of the State Police on the Parkway Wednesday. Ososco was shot through the mouth and both he and Chapman captured by Corporal McCoy and Trooper Schaeffer in an 80-mile-an-hour chase and gun battle after the holdup. Dorino, New York police say, has 15 years on a robbery count to serve for violation of parole.

Yacono, police added, has just completed probation on a burglary charge. DEVICE SHOCKS BIRDS SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP)—An electronic device designed to get rid of pigeons that roost on building ledges is being produced by a newly formed company here. The gadget, said to be 90 per cent effective, creates a field of static electricity along a fine wire. Albert D.
