The St. Maurice river hurries down from the northwoods carrying its cargo of logs for the pulp and paper mills and bringing with it the clear water which is so much affected by the march of civilization.

Highways and hotels are first-class in the St. Maurice, and the fishermen come in their thousands to make their homes at famous St. Maurice Valley hostels at Shawinigan Falls, LaCelle, Grandmere, or at the trident-like mouth of the river where stands the illustrious city of Trois-Rivieres.

It is a picturesque corner of Quebec. The rushing water has insensibly brought great dams and hydro-electric plants, but there are Bellevue and the trout do not seem affected by the march of civilization.

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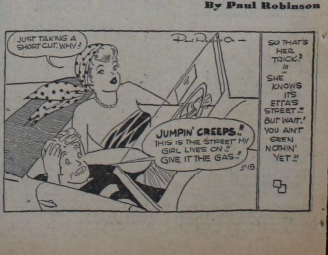
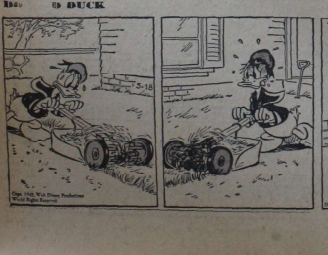
