"Should We Have Socialized Medicine in the United States?" was the subject of a panel given yesterday by members of Miss Edna Stueben's ninth grade social studies class at Mamaroneck Junior High School. Bill Dixon was moderator.

Panel members were Tom Murchard, Carlotta Henriques, David Meadow, Elizabeth Nordwall and Vanessa Ekelov affirmative, and David Neville, Jay Stahn, Dick Steffens, Amy McLaughlin and Joan Hillary, negative.

The affirmative side emphasized that the proposed plan would help the majority of Americans who are unable to obtain adequate medical care; that money would be saved through reduction of less man hours through illness; and that the plan would be democratic, controlled by the people through local governments.

The negative side stated that medical standards would result from socialized medicine, the negative side pointed out. Socialized medicine is a socialized state, in addition to general confusion and waste of time. The negative panel urged a more improved plan for medical care in rural areas but stated that the present proposed plan would not meet the needs of a democratic state.

To this scribe, who has only the benefit of a few short years of experience, the reporting of sports activities has always been a honorable profession. The first thing which blocked the way for the creating of sports writing positions was the limit on the available space. Newspapers 75 and 100 years ago were weeklies, much too limited in space to chronicle the few sports happenings of the times. The word "sports" in those days referred chiefly to occasional cock-fights, bullfight occasions, rowing contests, foot races, epamorphic harness horse and running horse races. The very nice people shunned the cock fights, boxing matches and some of the other sports and, as a consequence, when sports periodicals came into existence, the earliest writers never used their own names in print. They either wrote without any acknowledgment or made up something, such as "Left Jab," "Gallop" or "Berne Finger," in summary, sports writers did not want to be known as scribes to protect their social status.

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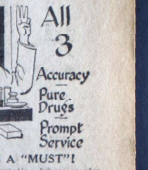

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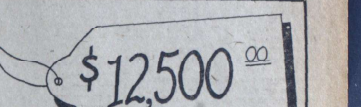

SCHOOL GUIDANCE NEEDS EXPLAINED

All Students, Ryne Neck Speaker Holds

An adequate guidance program for the Ryne Neck School will require the services of a full time guidance counselor and at least three-quarters of a skilled psychologist, time, Dr. Robert Carey, principal of the school, told a group of parents and teachers at a meeting held under the auspices of the Ryne Neck Community Educational Association at the Bellows Falls Community Club, and the Parent-Teacher Association of the Barry Avenue school.

"Guidance as we think of it today," he said, "is part of the answer to an unsettled society. A guidance counselor in a school helps the school administration and the community answer the needs of the children who are to serve as future citizens or students. Are public schools or institutions for a selected group or everyone? Are public school teachers to train a superior group for leadership or everyone for service to society?"

Answering his own questions, Dr. Carey declared, "Education and school guidance should be aids for all boys and girls in the selection of curricular and extra-curricular activities that will adequately develop their emotional, intellectual, physical, and social possibilities so that they may direct themselves into fields of work

Simplified Derby Rules Give All Entrants An Equal Chance

Each year a new rule is added to the official All-American Soap Box Derby rule book and others are changed. It is important for boys who are planning to enter any coming year to get their rule books early and to study them carefully.

Books have already been distributed to some 10,000 local boys and others are being sent to think Applications only be accepted official when the entrant, accompanied by a parent or guardian, signs the official entry blank at either the Daily Times office or at Luby Chevrolet Co. Inc. in Larchmont. Both offices are open during business hours and each evening, Monday through Friday.

The official rule book which can be procured at either office contains official regulations and illustrations which help Derby contestants to interpret the rules.

The National Rules Committee of the Derby, is made up of representatives of all sponsoring newspapers and of the group that is in charge of the operation of the National Final race. Every year this committee goes over the rules in an all-day meeting and makes changes that are thought to be necessary.

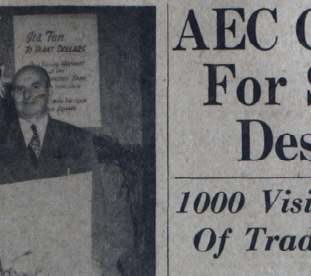

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Potato Mutations

By DAVID A. EMBURY
Author of "The Fine Art of Mixing Drinks"

13. Miscellaneous Mixtures
Rocks and Mists.
Among the various "Gin-and-

drinks, mostly of British origin listed in my book, I included in 1937 "Gin 'n' Rocks." Somehow, the "and" has been commonly corrupted to "on" and, among those who abhor wishy-washy drinks and enjoy the full-bodied

flavor of a well-made, well-aged liquor, there appears to be a steadily increasing popularity of Bourbon-on-Rocks, Rye-on-Rocks, Rum on Rocks, and so on. Old-fashioned glass pour the liquor over it and stir. No "ear-thing" please for this is a real beer-man's drink. If you use crushed ice instead of cubes, the drink is known as a "Mist," the most popular of which is the Scotch Mist. That, of course, is merely a Frappe. Personally, I like my Old-Fashioned best with a spoonful of sugar syrup and a dash or two of bitter - Angostura with bourbon or rye. Peychaud with Scotch, orange with gin, and so on. I must admit, however, the "Rocks" and "Mists" which are not too strong, are nevertheless, not bad drinks. Careless.

A great to-do was made in 1948 over this drink which was said to have been concocted by the head bartender of one of the leading New York restaurants in honor of the Broadway production, "The Loves of Carmen." Actually, there is nothing new about this drink whatsoever. It is merely the Morning Rose (p. 137) under a new name. In the recipe given in my book, I changed the proportions somewhat because I felt that three or four quantities of Curacao and grenadine in the original recipe made the drink far too sweet. The "Carmen" also substitutes lime juice for lemon, which is an improvement.

Omar Khayyam
Essentially this drink is the Short Butter (p. 249) or if made in the Waring Blender, the Frozen Blended (p. 233). Here, again, and for the reasons given above, the proportions given in my book differ slightly from the original recipe. This drink is a specialty of Sabre Knott's restaurant, the Omar Khayyam, in San Francisco, famous for its Balkan cuisine. I am surprised that a drink bearing the restaurant's name does not feature the rose melba flavor which was used in some of their remarkably delicious desserts.

Tommy's Eggs
In my recipe (p. 307) for these eggs (of which No. 1, made with gin, is now available here, but the others) I recommended lemon soda or Tom Collins Mix. In England, ginger beer is also frequently used and makes a delicious summer drink. I noted in an earlier number of this column (no. 3, 4-8-49) both a domestic ginger beer known as "Cook 'n' Bull" and the original Schweppes' imported from England, are now available.

In my recipe (p. 295), I specified crushed water but noted that some recipes call for sinner-ale. Being a British drink, the sinner-ale, unless it is the strictly proper sinner, sells, than sinner-ale. It can also be used with the other sinner-ale (p. 285).

Tail Feathers
Throughout my book I have emphasized the importance of providing, at your parties, non-alcoholic drinks for those of your friends "thoroughly good scouts" for one reason or another, just don't drink cocktails" (p. 248) or other spirituous drinks. If you are serving Tommy's Eggs

or Gin Sling, how about "Tail Feathers" for the less-alcoholic? Simply substitute orange juice for the gin and leave out the cucumber, per se.

Nothing new respecting this drink, the recipe for which is given on p. 281 of my book except that substituting water is now available - both Schweppes' imported from England and a very satisfactory domestic product, made by Canada Dry, Brooklyn.

In my book I gave the recipe (p. 163) for the real Brooklyn cocktail made with whiskey - a specialty of the Hotel St. George, and also pointed out (p. 167) that the Silver Bronx made with gin is sometimes erroneously called the Bronx. I have now been asked about a "Brooklyn" made with Jamaica rum. Well, a lot of people live in this great old New York borough of churches and of homes and I suppose any one of them is entitled to concoct a drink and name it. If he is doing it for the Army and Navy, here is the rum Brooklyn, as given by that grand old Colonel Col. Fougere, in the "Wine Trail" column a number of years ago. It calls for 1/2 ounce 2 parts Jamaica rum with a dash or two of grenadine to each ounce. In other words, it is merely a Jamaica Rum Sour using grenadine in place of sugar.

At present, there is a strong movement on foot unification of our armed forces - a movement which, despite ancient rivalries and petty jealousies, must ultimately succeed. Few people realize that this trend toward unification originated in the field of cocktails. In my book, I gave (p. 163) the recipe both for the Army and for the Navy cocktail. There is another cocktail, called the "Army and Navy," which several years ago was praised both by Clementine Padelloni in the Herald Tribune and by Col. Selmer Fougere in the Sun. Quite probably, it is better than either of the two separate branches of the service.

The original recipe calls for 1 part lemon juice, 1 part orange, and 2 parts gin. This, however, as pointed out by Col. Fougere, is far too sweet. It is at its best if made exactly like the Gin Sour (p. 120) substituting orange for the sugar syrup.

Kahlua-Alexander
In my book I pointed out over and over again that the Alexander is in a grade to a meal but is a meal in itself; that it is, in any true sense, a cocktail; and that while it is a pleasant, hunger-satisfying, mid-afternoon drink to be taken with marshmallow cake or chocolate cookies, as a pre-prandial aperitif it is one of the most deadly of all the many over-iced and creamy appetite-destroying concoctions. For whatever they might be worth, however, I set forth the recipe for the original, as well as the slightly modified and safer Alexander (p. 213), the Panama or Bandy Alexander (p. 172), the Blond Negress or Combined Alexander (p. 214), the Lucy or Rose and Ice Alexander (p. 233), and the Savannah, which I suggested as a possible means of weaning an Alexander hater

of p. 231". I even mentioned, in passing (p. 238), the Scotch Alexander. Now, if you or any of your friends chance to be a devotee of Alexander, try substituting the Kahlua (see No. 6, 4-14-49) for the creme de cacao in either the Alexander, or even better, the Panama.
