# Democratic Chairman Charges Westchester Has Bookie 'Coverage'

Industrial Employes Also Feel Blow of Firemen's Tieup on Rail Lines

CHICAGO, (AP)—More thousands of railroad workers joined the ranks of the idle today — laid off by the docked firemen's strike against four major carriers.

Workers in many other key industries also were getting layoff notices and others were threatened with forced idleness.

There wasn't a sign of peace in the nation's biggest rail strike since May, 1946.

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Charging that Westchester appears to have "a systematic coverage of bookmakers," Democratic County Chairman Harold T. Garrity last night called upon District Attorney George M. Franklin to investigate and warned that otherwise a demand will be made for a writ to restrain him.

The nation's newspapers have carried headlines for months of organized gambling in this county. It is the contention of the Democratic County Chairman of Westchester and county the number of so-called "bookies" in this county appears to have a systematic coverage of bookmakers.

Mr. Garrity cited the discovery of a large crap game operating in Harrison last fall and a subsequent Grand Jury investigation which resulted in the conviction of several individuals.

Mr. Garrity said he expects to call Mr. Franklin as a witness before the Grand Jury.

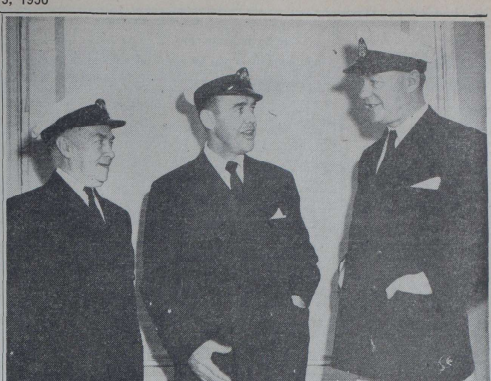

of directors; (2) a few disgruntled stockholders who want dividends; (3) one of the biggest life insurance companies in the country; and (4) some parties who would like to be sitting where Dumaine is.

Sale of Debentures
The questions will center mainly on the proposed sale by Dumaine to the New Haven of about \$2 million in Boston & Providence Railroad Corp. debentures.

Dumaine and his friends bought them in 1945 when he was a director but before he had control of the railroad. They stand to make about a million dollars on this transaction goes through.

The B & P. proposal is a handover from the court settlement of the New Haven's reorganization.

Though no amateur in a financial fight, the thirty-four-year-old Dumaine has a good chance of losing this battle which recently brought one insurance stockholder to his feet shouting:

"This is like the days of Jay Gould."

Dumaine and his friends say the New Haven, at this price of \$2 million, is getting the debentures at a discount. That's because the bonds, at their face value of \$2 million, would be worth more than \$3.5 million if the back interest were figured on 1938.

Year the bonds matured without payment of principal.

In addition, Dumaine contends the purchase would put the New Haven in the position of being the only creditor of the New Haven who owns the rails over which the New Haven travels between Boston and Providence. The New Haven would have a chance to win control of the B & P. when that company's reorganization settlement is made.

But the opposition looks on the whole thing as a big deal for typical of Dumaine. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., a major New Haven stockholder, says the debentures aren't worth \$3.2 million.

How It Looks to Many
To many it looks like Dumaine is selling bonds like Dumas—a million-dollar profit.

Probably the biggest opposition comes from Charles U. Bay, U. S. Ambassador to Norway, and H. H. Haven director (since 1949) and Haven director of the Connecticut Railroad, he owns 45 percent of the New Haven common.

In Boston's financial district it is said that Bay—who got the job because his company is the largest single common stockholder—believes that Dumaine ought to be chairman of the board, president etc.

Publicly Bay's counsel says the B & P deal is illegal and would be detrimental to the common stock's best interests because, when full settlement of B & P's reorganization is made, the debentures is likely to be a lot less than \$3.2 million.

Boston rumors also have it that John L. Hall, representing the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. in its opposition, has never become reconciled to Dumaine's victory that won him back control of the New Haven. Hall was a director under Dumaine until 1949.

Has Some Answers
"Though Dumaine might admit he and his friends can net a million by the sale, he also could say that he could have done it without all the publicity; that the proposal was submitted without necessity to a press conference; that he and his friends made a profit, it is still a wise move from the New Haven's point of view.

Most of all, his associates say, it's up to the Interstate Commerce Commission anyway. The I.C.C. must approve the transaction and it's a certainty that the federal agency will have plenty of opportunity to express every detail. The opposition has emphasized that it will see to that.

At the end, though, alias, respectable Dumaine will still be running the New Haven.

'WORTH RIP' AGAIN, DEWEY TELLS GOP

ALBANY (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey has told several Republican leaders that he is not going to run again for Governor but has not closed the door definitely.

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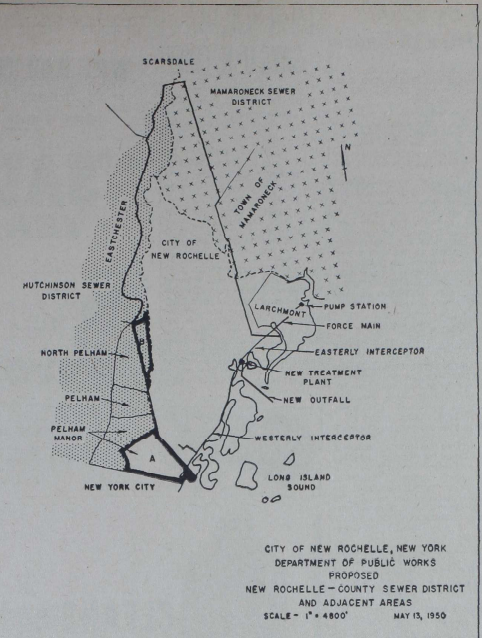

Answer: Well, kid, a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush, according to the old proverb, and if all you want to marriage is a man, a house and a baby, you had better grab off the man who can give you to you right away. Especially as you seem to have no preference in husbands. Any port in a storm. Anything in trousers who will accompany you to the altar.

Certainly the greatest mystery on earth is the insane mania women have for getting married. 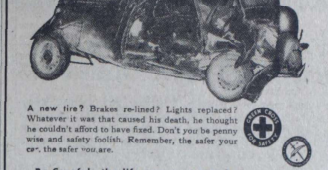

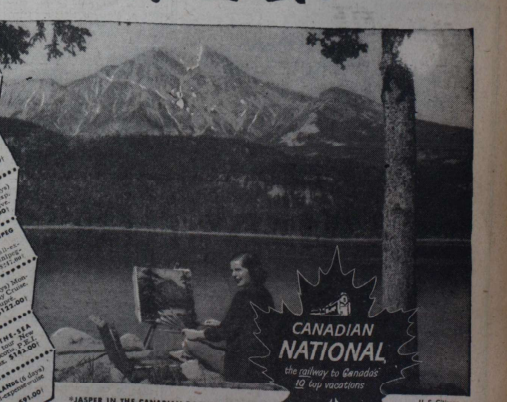
