

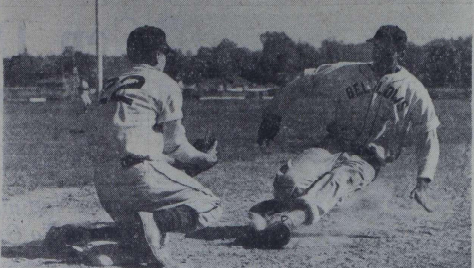
Tigers Overhaul Gorton, 5-4; Eastchester Holds Off Bellows, 4-3
