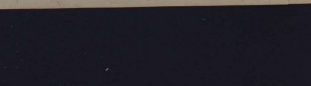
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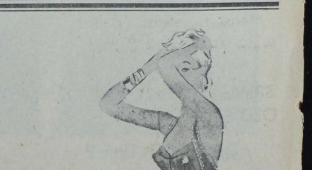
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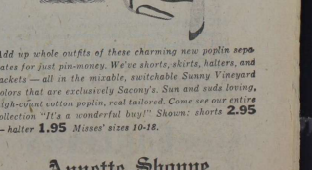

GENEA PARLEY SWINGS BACK TO KOREAN DEBATE

New Plan Aimed To Unify War-Torn Country Faces Red Rebuff

GENEA (AP) — The Geneva Conference switched back today to the so-called Korean debate, but behind the scenes maneuvering centered on Indochina.

South Korean Foreign Minister Yun Yung-ik planned to place before the Korean party a new proposal designed to unify the war-devastated peninsula, but it appeared destined for a quick rebuff.

Foreign Minister Choo En-lai also asked to speak at the Indochina party.

In separate Indochina talks yesterday, American and Communist spokesmen reportedly agreed to points to be discussed for ending the seven-year war in Indochina.

The next session on Indochina takes place Monday. Informants said the Viet participation in the session — the Big Four, Red, and Communist — was agreed to use some sections of the Communists' Viet Minh proposals.

The French and Communist spokesmen are expected to discuss at their next meeting the proposed demarcation line.

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House To Get Ike's Program For Workers

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's program for a bigger and more liberal Social Security system was a "most important step for the country," members of the House Ways and Means Committee predicted.

The committee approved all of President Eisenhower's requests for higher benefits and a few steps aimed at some of its own.

It also approved over the objection of most committee Republicans — the President's plan to raise from \$3,000 to \$4,000 the maximum annual income on which benefits are based and rates are levied.

That left only two substantial items still to be acted upon: a proposal to extend coverage to farm laborers, and a plan to give disabled workers full benefits.

The committee already had accepted Mr. Eisenhower's request to extend Social Security coverage to doctors, lawyers and other professionals, to farm operators, ministers, state and local government employees and various other smaller groups.

If the bill becomes law, the system now covering some 70 million workers and paying benefits to six million persons, would blanket almost the entire working force of the nation.

County Population To Hit 657,482 This Summer WESTCHESTER — Westchester's population is expected to reach an estimated 657,482 persons by July 1, according to the latest vital statistics report by the State Health Department.

The monthly population report enables health officials to plot the probable trend of births, deaths and various diseases.

A breakdown of the latest figures shows that Mount Vernon reported 159,839 by July 1; Mount Vernon, 73,307; New Rochelle, 61,331; White Plains, 45,664; Peekskill, 18,843; and City, 12,749.

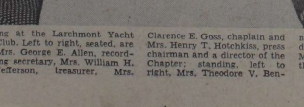
