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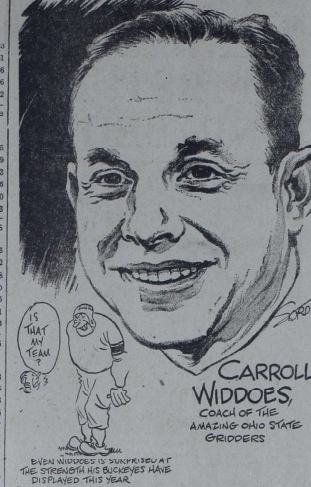

Best Duck Shooting Season In 20 Years Awaits Hunters

By NEW YORK, (AP)—The "duck-heat" shooting season in two decades is winging its way toward U. S. shores.

Some 140,000,000 waterfowl, big game crop in 20 years, are expected in the states this week from Canada and the border, beating the big north-of-the-border freeze by a few days.

Ducks Unlimited, the sportsman-supported organization which aids and abets the breeding of ducks in 120,000 acres of Dominion territory, announced recently that the early flight of teal, pintails and mallards was already on its way and that some shooting has been heard in border states where the season opened a month ago.

But the heavy fringe and the good eating—are still to come in the form of northern mallards, blue bills and canvas backs, along with the huge geese known to the trade as "bonkers."

Last year, Benson disclosed, the water fowl flight consisted of 125,000. 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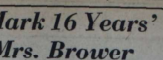

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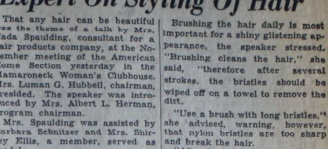

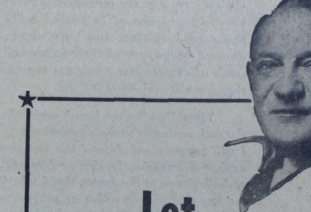

In Answer To An Editorial In The Macy Newspapers

To The Editor, Mamaroneck Times:

This letter is in reply to the Macy publications in the county in which an editorial appeared on October 21st last, proposing the question: "Which keeps his promises?" referring to President Roosevelt and Governor Dewey, on the assumption that your readers, Democrats, Independents and Republicans as well, have a right to know the facts.

That editorial was in reply to a speech made by Orson Welles at the New York Herald Tribune Forum, in which he asserted he was for President Roosevelt "because he is a man who keeps his promises."

You ask if it wasn't Mr. Roosevelt who in 1933 was going to reduce expenditures by 25 per cent and if it wasn't Mr. Roosevelt who in 1933 was going to end the depression, only to leave us in 1940 with 10 million unemployed.

The answer is that the highest authority in the land, the American people, passed upon these same issues raised against the President in the election of 1936, when all the circumstances that followed the Hoover depression were fully discussed and understood. What was the result? Forty-six of the forty-eight States of the Union re-elected the President. His popular majority, the highest ever given to any President, in competition, was 11,069,699, and in the Electoral College the vote was Roosevelt 523, Landon 8.

Next you ask "Wasn't Mr. Roosevelt in 1937 who promised us solemnly that he was going to balance the budget?" Again, that issue, too, was raised, in the election of 1940, and what was the "solemn" verdict of the American people? Thirty-eight States of the forty-eight voted Roosevelt a third term by a popular majority of 4,948,711 and in the Electoral College the result was Roosevelt 449, Willkie 82.

You then ask "Wasn't it Roosevelt who told us flatly on October 30, 1940: 'You mothers and fathers, I have said this before, but I shall say it again, and again, and again, your sons are not going to be sent into any foreign war'?"

Your attention is respectfully directed to an article appearing in the New York Sun on August 7, 1944, written by David Lawrence, the distinguished correspondent, who will hardly be described as a Roosevelt supporter. Mr. Lawrence stated that the President was misquoted and that the Republicans who think they can get votes for Governor Dewey through this form of misquotation are making a mistake. After pointing out that Mr. Roosevelt hoped Hitler would not provoke the United States and that the European War would be kept out of this country by preparation for its defense, the war actually ceased to be a foreign war when the United States was attacked by Japan on December 7, 1941, and when Italy and Germany both declared war on us.

The article then cites the different meetings at which the President spoke in 1940, at which he used the words "except in case of attack," or of similar meaning, noting a partial quotation from the National Democratic platform that nominated him.

These quotations may all be found in the New York Sun of the date mentioned above.

Your next question read: "Wasn't it Mr. Roosevelt who told us at Cleveland and at Hyde Park in the last campaign that in 1945 you will have a new President?"

It is not a fair assumption that he hoped and believed that this country would remain out of the war by proper preparation for defense, despite the overwhelming opposition in Republican congressional circles "Who can doubt who would be said by the campfires of today, were he, the President and Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces, to have become a quitter and refused to stay in the midst of a struggle to overcome the greatest convulsion in military history?"

Finally your comment: "By contrast look back upon the campaign pledges of Mr. Dewey when he ran for Governor of this state in 1942. Turn back and read his platform of that year. Where do you find an unmet pledge or broken promise?"

Well, he did solemnly declare he would complete his full term as Governor, didn't he?

And there was something, not in his platform, it is true, that might be described as an omitted pledge, for obvious reasons. Governor Dewey did try, only this year, to usurp the naming of the Judges of the City of New York, and when his bill came up for a public hearing at Albany—see New York Times, March 2, 1944—not one voice was raised in support of it. Even the heavily partisan Republican Legislature would have none of it and it died a timely death.

And here comes something else of a most serious nature. At the Chicago Convention on June 28th last, Mr. Dewey in his speech of acceptance, heard by the Nation, said:

"The military conduct of the war is outside this campaign. It is and must remain completely out of politics." That sounded well, in fact he said he made it crystal clear. But what happened on September 19th, less than two months later, at Valentine, Neb.? Did not Mr. Dewey boldly declare that "greater scope and recognition," "long overdue," be given the talent of General Douglas MacArthur in the course of picking the military command for the coming drive in Japan now that he was no longer "a political threat to Mr. Roosevelt."

Mind you, the President cited General MacArthur on the General's 64th birthday, two years older than Roosevelt, incidentally away back on January 26th, for Distinguished Service, and some weeks before the Dewey demand. Mr. Roosevelt had arranged at Pearl Harbor with the General and Admiral Nimitz and their staffs for the joint conduct of the Pacific campaign, with the glorious results now so apparent to everyone. What became of that June 28th pledge?

Once more, at Chicago, on June 29th, the morning after Mr. Dewey's nomination, the reporters asked him if he was going to confer with all leaders of the Republican party—including Wendell Willkie. His reply was that he hoped to confer with all leaders of the Republican party, including Mr. Willkie.

Mr. Willkie died on October 9th, more than three months later. Was Mr. Dewey's hope or promise ever fulfilled?

The answer as to Mr. Dewey's reliability can best be made by the voting citizens of Westchester and the Nation, the mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers and wives of the Servicemen. Also the boys at war themselves, in far lands, if given a chance under Governor Dewey's palpably cumbersome soldier ballot law.

One Auto Death For October

G. O. P. Candidate Inches Ahead In New Jersey But President Records Gains In Michigan And Ohio

See-saw swings in three key states today kept in doubt the size of President Roosevelt's fourth term victory.

Governor Thomas E. Dewey inched into a lead in New Jersey while Mr. Roosevelt threatened to capture Michigan and Ohio.

New Jersey shifted from the Roosevelt column at midday but in a vote total approaching two million Dewey's margin amounted to only 400. Outstanding ballots made the eventual decision uncertain.

The President was gaining in both Ohio and Michigan and there was a possibility that if New Jersey switched back and he won a lead in those two states he would run his electoral vote up to 451 against 80 for Dewey. His third term electoral count was 449 to 82 for Wendell L. Willkie.

At midday the popular vote for President, from 100,414 of the country's 130,810 counties, showed Roosevelt 20,424,100 and Dewey 17,094,641.

At one stage Dewey had a lead of over 133,000 in the contest for Michigan's 19 electoral votes. But Wayne County (Detroit), cut into this steadily and by mid-morning it had dropped to about 60,000. The Republican candidate's Ohio lead was less than 800.

The victory vote which the democracy's majority stamped approval on Mr. Roosevelt's conservative German in the town of Vossenaar, 13 miles south of Aachen. Bloody and as yet inconclusive fighting continued through out the Hurgren Forest area. Two Nazi counterattacks near Schmidt were broken.

The Third Army "substantially improved" its line between the Meuse and Rhine rivers, said Midway between the two French cities, the Americans crossed the Sella River. Resistance ranged from light to moderate.

In Holland, the Germans retreated to the north bank of the Meuse River had wrecked every river bridge between the sea and Holland. The Germans were held back by the American advance and for the first time shelled Yank positions along Carigara Bay with heavy artillery.
