The fire department, under the direction of Chief Michael Oraino, responded to a full alarm at 4:08 P. M. Saturday when five players were injured in a matter of seconds.

The quickness of the fire department's response was demonstrated by the fact that the infernos were extinguished in a matter of seconds.

Fire filled with water, fuel and gasoline, and pyramids of kerosene-soaked railroad ties became roaring infernos as they were lit, but were extinguished in a matter of seconds.

BIG VOIE EXPECTED IN TOWN ELECTIONS; BONUS TOPS LISTES

2 Major Parties Hold Optimistic View Of Outcome
Opposing parties were making optimistic forecasts today, with the general elections tomorrow.

Expectations point to heavy balloting in the "off-year" election, the first of the expected on the ballot of the proposed New York State amendment on the veterans' benefits.

A total of 257,956 persons are eligible to vote in the county. Voting hours will be from 6 A. M. to 7 P. M. This is a record figure for an "off-year" election.

The all-time high for the county is 317,831, set in 1940, a presidential election year. Last year, 270,455 registered, but there were races for governor, U. S. senator and congressmen and state senator and assemblymen.

John G. Winant Sued Blamed On Overwork

CONCORD, N. H. (AP)—John G. Winant, western Ambassador to Great Britain and three times Governor of New Hampshire, told himself to death last night with a 32-caliber Belgian pistol.

The 58-year-old diplomat, who retired only in January as permanent U. S. representative to the United Nations Economic and Social Council, was officially pronounced a suicide by Medical Referee Clarence E. Butterfield, Dr. Butterfield attributed the act to overwork.

His secretary, J. Bernard Tullow, said Winant's health had not been good and that a doctor advised him to "take things easy" as he had a heart condition and was suffering kidney or bladder trouble.

"I know Mr. Winant had been working very hard lately on writing and business affairs, and I believe that he suddenly cracked," said Tullow. "This said 'Tullow' was done on the spur of the moment."

Governor Charles M. Dale of New Hampshire said his predecessor was considered a casualty of World War II.

Winant had just received his memoirs—"Letter from Governor Squier"—for New Hampshire and was understood to be planning a sequel.

His body was found lying face down near a firearms cabinet in his son's bedroom by a secretary and maid after they heard a thud—but no shot.

Doctors said there were indications Winant had fired the bullet through his right temple while kneeling.

A box of headache pills, some missing, was in the room.

Two guns were a nearby—L. B. Cochran, former chief of the town's fire department, was thrown against the bedroom wall when Winant could not find ammunition.

14 Residences To Go Up Soon On Barry Ave.

The first post-war residential development of any size in the village of Mamaroneck is being planned in the construction of 14 one and a half story colonial cottage type residences on the former Bixler property on North Barry Avenue, Mamaroneck.

Plans for the development were revealed through the office of Peter C. Deane, Jr., Inc., which is handling the construction of the property by Richard Dolan of New York City to the Kolt-Miller Construction Company, new Mamaroneck firm.

Building Shows October Gain In Larchmont

Permits were granted for the construction of three new homes in Larchmont during October, when a total of 17 permits of various kinds were issued, covering an estimated cost of \$44,450.

The amount represented an increase of \$24,100 over the preceding month, and an increase of \$1,780 over the corresponding month of a year ago, when no permits were issued for the construction of new homes.

Two of the new homes, estimated to cost \$12,000 each, are being constructed by the Pine Construction Company of New York City at 10 Beverly Place and 6 Beverly Place. Ackerman and Baltz of Scarsdale were issued the third permits to construct a new home at 5 Flint Avenue at an estimated cost of \$16,000.

New Tax Roll Up \$294,204 In Larchmont

Larchmont Village Assessor Frank J. Barnes reported to the Board of Trustees last night that the assessment roll for the year 1947 has been completed and shows an increase over the previous year of \$294,204.

The total assessed valuation for 1947 is \$23,302,560. Mr. Barnes pointed out that of the \$294,204 increase, \$104,100 is accounted for by new construction. He reported that two more homes completed since Nov. 1 last year were also included. In addition, there are now 10 new houses under construction, as well as two commercial buildings.

Transport Rescues 30 From Schooner

NEW YORK (AP)—The Coast Guard said today that the Army Transport John Stafford reported it had rescued a crew of 30 men from a three-masted schooner, the Schooner Maria Carlotta, which had run aground last night. It was sinking in mid-Atlantic.

The 230-ton schooner was set adrift by its crew and left adrift, the Coast Guard said.

Captain White Star Lines said in London that the liner Queen Elizabeth, which had changed her course to aid the disabled schooner, was proceeding on her voyage to Southampton.

Rescue units including a Coast Guard cutter and a converted Navy transport, the USS Albatross, were on duty to assist in the rescue operations, which were completed yesterday.

Bus Line To Bronx Wins Favor

Fordham Firm's Appeal Backed By Two-Thirds At Larchmont Hearing

DECISION RESERVED

The proposed Larchmont-Bronx bus line received a two-thirds majority approval of the more than 150 residents who attended the public hearing last night on the application of the Fordham Bus Company.

The Larchmont Board of Trustees, however, reserved decision. A strong opposition came from the County Transportation Company which now operates buses through Larchmont and the New York, Westchester and Hartford Railroad Company.

A delicate situation was indicated in the hearing when it was argued that the granting of the application would bring an influx of "undesirable persons" into Larchmont, especially during the Summer.

Brice Campbell of 42 Woodbine Avenue, Larchmont, first to be heard, expressed his disapproval of the application on the grounds that the "rafes as advertised" were not in competition with the railroad in that they were not cheaper; that it would bring an undesirable element in traffic; and that it would only benefit those people working in the Bronx.

Mayor E. Spencer Gresson replied that in the present setup it is rather difficult to get to Fordham. He said he had traveled the route for two years and it took at least three quarters of an hour, which is longer than the time proposed by the bus company for exactly the same cost.

James J. Caffrey of 61 Prospect Avenue, Larchmont, said that the way to get to Fordham by train was to take the train to Mount Pleasant, then transfer to the trolley to the Third Avenue elevated, which would take you to Fordham. He said he had traveled the route for two years and it took at least three quarters of an hour, which is longer than the time proposed by the bus company for exactly the same cost.

Michael J. Harrington of 5 Sindenka Avenue, Larchmont, said he would "like to see the bus come to Larchmont. It is a point of progress in the village of Mamaroneck."

Walter F. Reiss of 6 Virginia Place, Larchmont, added he "very much in favor" of the application if any of you have had the experience to change at New Rochelle and wait for a train to get to Fordham.

U. S. Blames Russians For Peace Snag

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department today accused Russia of failing to cooperate in efforts to bring about a peace settlement in Germany.

The State Department document said that the USSR is to blame for the failure of the United Nations to "grasp the fruits of peace and victory."

The Soviets have failed to make good on wartime commitments for the demilitarization and reconstruction of Germany.

The USSR is mainly interested in getting "maximum reparations" from Germany and in setting up a German political regime "friendly" to the Soviet.

These and similar charges, most of them previously aired by Government leaders, are summed up in a statement entitled "Aspects of current American foreign policy" issued yesterday. Fifty thousand copies are being prepared for public distribution.

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U. S. Corporation Would Supervise Relief Moves

WASHINGTON, AP

Congressional leaders who will tackle the foreign aid problem at the Nov. 17 special session studied today a recommendation that the United States Government corporation.

The suggestion came from a 15-man panel house for economic committee which toured Europe last summer for the background of the stop-Communism program.

The committee said the new agency should sift all requests for help in Western Europe, boss the purchase of materials in the country, wield any controls necessary to protect the economy of the United States and make sure that the aid reaches those for whom it is intended.

The committee's recommendations were expected to carry heavy weight, since the group was formed at the insistence of Republican leaders who wanted Congress to obtain its own information to consider along with the Administration's Marshall Plan and stop-aid proposals.

They were made public late yesterday by Vice-Chairman Herbert H. Hays, in the form of an informal interim report.

Under the Hays group has no legislative authority and cannot draft legislation, it left the details of the program to be filled in by the standing legislative committee.

It proposed new Government foreign aid corporation would be headed by a bipartisan board of directors appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate.

MOSCOW, AP—An informed source said today that U. S. Ambassador Walter B. Smith probably would go to Washington for a meeting with the President on the coming special session of Congress, perhaps to give his views on the stop-Communism program.

He probably also will attend the Council of Foreign Ministers meeting in Moscow, which begins on Nov. 25 in London, this informant said.

Emergency Food Measures Needed, Kreighbaum Says; Three Others Speak At Forum

Declaring that the world food problem is still very grave, Hiler Kreighbaum, public information officer of the World Health Organization, the UN and a veteran of 10 years service with the United States, told a gathering of more than 50 persons at a forum sponsored by the local branch of N. A. C. P. in the Manaroneck Avenue School auditorium last night that at present there are 12 nations which do not have the money to purchase food for more than four months.

Mr. Kreighbaum, who returned last month from Europe, said that the UN reported this week that money shortages in Great Britain, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Finland, France, Greece, Italy, Luxembourg, Poland, Sweden, and Yugoslavia make it impossible for these countries to import food to last more than 120 days.

He said that emergency measures are necessary in both Europe and Asia to see the starving people of these two continents through the coming winter. The production of cereals in Europe he declared, has been sharply cut by drought. The fat shortage, he thought, not so serious as that of bread, but it is a present, with no immediate prospect of betterment, he said.

Shipments of wheat will relieve the protein shortage, he said, but in France, Germany and Japan especially, food production still sits at a low ebb.

Three steps which he believes the U. S. should follow were outlined by Mr. Kreighbaum. 1. Organize machinery to speed up production, distribution and utilization of food. 2. Stabilize prices at levels fair to both consumers and producers. 3. Get individuals and groups of individuals to conserve grain so that 100,000,000 bushels of grain and an adequate supply of meat can be sent to Europe during the coming year.

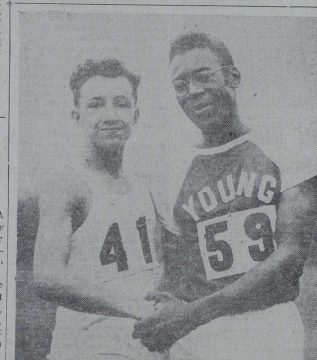
Police, called by some worried citizens, came to the scene with stearns howling and the foxes leaped into the twilight and disappeared as mysteriously as they had come.

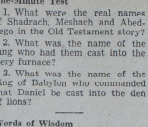

Town Council Approves Cuts In Tax Rates

The Town Council put its stamp of approval last night on the preliminary budget prepared by Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville, after making two revisions which decreased the tax rates for the unincorporated areas from \$1.49 to \$1.53 per \$100 of assessed valuation while the village savings of \$1.16 remained the same.

Rye Town Council May Vote On Building Referendum

Referendum Weighed By Officials On Plan For New Town Hall

COUNCIL TO DECIDE

The possibility of a referendum to determine final action on the proposed Rye Town office building was disclosed tonight by Supervisor Arthur G. Sammarco following an informal meeting Saturday of Town officials and the building architect.

The meeting was called to consider alternatives in the building to be used for the town office building. The one-story, non-commercial building proposed to be built on the corner of Rock and Chester, added to the cost of the land, exceeded the \$775,000, \$800 estimate by \$175,000.

The Council which had planned a \$100,000 bond issue to meet the cost will gather in a special session Wednesday night to decide whether to increase the bond issue by the necessary amount or to put the entire bond issue to the people in a referendum.

Attending Saturday's meeting were John M. Liska, architect for the proposed building; Town Attorney Joseph M. G. Lyons, Esq.; Sammarco and John J. Lattella, Edward J. Kuhn, and Albert J. Berman.

The consensus of the meeting was, if possible, to go ahead with the plan for the building rather than to attempt alternatives.

Students Being Molested, Parents Claim In Appeal For More Police Protection

Last night was petition Night for the Mamaroneck Village Board as it received three signature petitions, one of which was accompanied by a delegation of parents led by H. W. Dockertill, 207 Hill Street.

Dr. Dockertill presented a petition signed by the parents of 33 school children, seeking more police protection in the area of Rockland and Palmer Avenues because (1) children are being molested by men in a secluded section of Rockland Avenue near the railroad bridge, and (2) the volume of traffic on Palmer Avenue makes crossing the street extremely hazardous.

The petition asks that a police officer be assigned to the area of Rockland Avenue, or at the intersection of Rockland and Palmer Avenues, or at the intersection of Rockland and Palmer Avenues.

Mayor R. J. Santoro told Mr. Dockertill that the board has considered this and other similar problems in the Village. "It is one of the problems that really has a long history," he said. "We don't have enough policemen to take care of the school children and the rest of the village at the same time. The board is reluctant to add on taxes by increasing the force, but at the same time one must realize that it is worth a lot more than whatever taxes must be paid. Your children are being molested and the protection as children in other villages and I assure you that the board will take immediate temporary measures until the problem can be permanently solved."

He directed Village Manager William H. Johnson to install two "running boy" signs on Palmer Avenue 700 feet apart to slow down cars approaching the intersection, and requested Corporation Counsel Anthony Sansone to study the legal status of auxiliary policemen to determine whether or not they would conflict with the local police system.

Mr. Dockertill, who asked that an auxiliary policeman be placed at the intersection if the police department is short-handed, also inquired if it would be possible to get the Town or Larchmont police to lend a man. He was informed that such a measure has been attempted several times in different cases, but that the departments could not see their way clear to lending a member of their force.

Trustee John Withers said that he thought it was "immensely unwise" for the community to "help in the true spirit of cooperation" by having a patrol for Village of Mamaroneck children, but that the Town of Rye children and the Town of Rye children.

Police Chief Arthur W. Masten said that the rest of the Village is left virtually uncovered when his school patrol has to be on hand as students are entering or leaving the schools. He complained that the police are being used as a "monitor system" by the schools, the chief said that "it works when you get the compliance you would expect, but many children cross the streets where they see fit."

Another petition, signed by six residents of Wagner Avenue, urged the Village to plant trees with signs in Wagner Avenue from Lorenz Street to Boston Post Road, was referred to the Village Board.

PARIS (AP)—The Paris newspaper L'Humanite said today that Russia is making sample atom bombs and already has set one off in a test in Siberia.

The newspaper said an authority "information transmitted from Moscow" to "confidential sources" in a dispatch from Prague that the Russians had set off a 12-1/2 pound atom bomb at 10 A. M. June 15, which was heard for 20 miles around the proving grounds, near the Amur River not far from Irkutsk.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov said in a Moscow speech last Thursday that Russia had the atom bomb tested to exist a long time ago. He did not say specifically that Russia had the atom bomb.

WASHINGTON — Secretary George C. Marshall's brusque and uncommunicative handling of his affairs of state has assailed a chorus of criticism against the public's only contact with the war-time Chief of Staff.

Mr. Marshall has become a target of certain presidential aides, members of Congress and newspapermen assigned to the State Department. They point out that he did not hold a press conference from Sept. 10 to Nov. 5 and at neither session did he divulge any pertinent information.

During that period of self-imposed seclusion, he was engaged in formulation of the so-called Marshall Plan, now known as the European Recovery Plan, in framing a more definite policy toward Russia, in trying to arrange a Korean settlement, and in seeking to straighten out the Chinese middle.

FAILURE—The General's failure to consult with members of Congress as Cordell Hull and James F. Byrnes did, accounts for the growing opposition to several of his policies on Capitol Hill.

MANNER—His manner, too, is unfortunate. He should have announced when visitors try to obtain information from the American people on both the details and the broad purpose of our postwar foreign policy. He treats questioners as if they were disobedient backbiters. His attitude, it is realized, derives from his military training and background—he is accustomed to making decisions before talking about them.

VIEWPOINTS—For different viewpoints on methods of implementing and toning down the Marshall Plan were advanced by members of the 19-man Merger Commission when those European investigators sat down behind closed doors to prepare a specific bill for presentation to Congress next Monday.

ALL-OUT support of the Administration program with hardly any deviation was urged by Candidates Chairman Charles A. Eaton of New Jersey and Vice-Chair-

man Christian Herter of Massachusetts, who had been a Hoover aide after World War I. A group led by Representative Eugene J. Keogh of Brooklyn, Indiana, that not a penny of assistance be given to a Russian satellite and that precautions be taken so that aid advanced to nations hostile after World War I.

Anti-Soviet Pacts Urged For France

De Gaulle Asks Nation To Take The Lead In Forming Alliances

PARIS, (AP)—Gen. Charles De Gaulle urged France today to take the lead in forming alliances with the United States, Great Britain and other countries "who feel themselves similarly menaced by Communism."

"France must take the initiative because she is the most-conscious" leader of the anti-Communist front of the French people (RPF) told a news conference.

"France is the most menaced externally by this enormous power—the most formidable she has ever faced—and internally because, independent of her own people, she is being encircled within France," De Gaulle declared.

The general said that one of the aims of the RPF, which showed surprising strength in France's recent municipal elections, was to foster such a system of alliances as a means of self-defense.

De Gaulle asserted that France must begin to organize itself to meet the danger of Communist aggression, and mentioned specifically the need of a military and political tie with the United States.

He declared that his RPF was not to be used to express the hope that the French people, who feel themselves menaced at home and abroad.

He predicted that the party would continue to grow "like a tidal wave" until it "conquers the whole nation except for the Sapevalles in the Alps and a few ferocious melancholics."

"Power, he said, would have to be taken from the Communists as far as possible" to establish "a legitimate government" truly representative of the people of France.

He repeated his previous assertion that France must not permit the establishment of a strong centralized German government.

"Until there is definite proof that the German people are ready to accept a new political order," De Gaulle said, "France must continue to hold her trump cards and refuse to surrender."

He predicted that the coming French Foreign Ministers' Conference would result either in the establishment of a United Germany, or in a United Western Germany.

"If a United Germany is formed, he added, France must insist on a strict Allied control, especially of the Western German, separated from the East by the Elbe. It is a split in the Foreign Ministers' Council could not be without France, De Gaulle declared.

There have been proposals that the royal family sell or pawn the crown jewels, with some folks estimating their value at many billions of dollars.
