Pin Clinic by Billy Sixty

IT IS a cross-slinging shot, angling from the left for the Nos. 3, 6, 9, or 10 pins, and from the right for the Nos. 2, 4, 7, or 8. That is the value of the slide-finish in embossing.

Only with a slide, long or short—but slide, nevertheless—will you swing hold its groove to the follow-through. On cross-slinging shots the slide braces the left leg, controls the body by keeping it in line, pointed straight ahead.

The cross-slinging stroke is a swinging motion, close to the body and on to a reaching finish. You don't think of swinging into your leg muscles, you're short on the slide. Add 10 lb. in practice and be sure, of course, to move back six inches or so to allow the added slide.

Important: When you're sticking at the foul line, don't make the mistake of strutting you. Lengthen it a bit. It's slide you need.

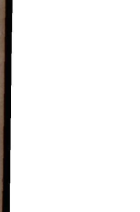

Additional \$540,000 Issue School Bonds Okayed By 590 - 107 Margin

The \$540,000 supplementary bond issue for addition to and remodeling of Manaroneck High School was approved overwhelmingly Saturday by a vote of 590-107 on the part of the 696 eligible voters turned out.

The supplementary bond issue won by a larger margin than the original \$1.9 million which was approved overwhelmingly last year. At that time 68 per cent of 986 eligible voters cast their vote in favor of the issue.

The plans submitted a year ago by McCoy and Blais and approved by the School Board will enlarge the present building to 1,500,000 cubic feet.

When bids were received in October, costs of construction had risen to such extent that they far exceeded the original bond issue.

On Oct. 11 the School Board announced, after thorough study of the plans and the bids, that the issue be placed before the voters to complete the plan, meet architects fees, legal costs and other items.

Assessment Value Raised

California Comes Of Age As Style Industry Center

LOS ANGELES—The measure of this community's all-out Southern hospitality is exemplified by its weather, which has suddenly switched from weeks of swimming sunbath to bleak skies and raw cold, to make the eastern contingent of the now assembling fashion press feel right at home. I say community, because although the designers whose new collections I'll be telling you about this week and next, as well as the date-line, are both Los Angeles, our headquarters and most of the coverings are out in Beverly Hills.

This year the California market has really hit its stride, both in big-time designing and in public acceptance which has catapulted it to the rank of the second largest apparel manufacturing center in the world, largely even than Paris, and second only to New York.

It is a young market, and an exuberant one, with fully two-thirds of its manufacturers in business less than 10 years. Sportswear, its biggest and most important component, is not classified separately but absorbed in the dress, coat and suit categories. You can get an idea of their size by the fact that as far back as 1948, the latest year for which figures are available, the Los Angeles dress market did a business of \$157 million at wholesale, and the coat and suit industry did \$70 million. Both have multiplied these figures by many times in the intervening seven years.

This spectacular rise is generally attributed to two main factors: Price levels that can successfully compete for the consumer dollar with "hard" goods such as automobiles, television sets and appliances, and the freshness and gaiety of the styling. I guess a designer has to live in this kind of play, patio and pool atmosphere to be one in each and every beat with the market and pass on a genuine feeling of joie de vivre.

Until now, blinding effect of intense sunlight playing on the prevailing two-tone stucco architecture has resulted in almost too warm apparel colors. Now the designers have become acclimated to the vivid landscape, and their greater calm is reflected in still-bright but more subdued hues, both in the pastels and the high shades.

Four silhouettes, or "looks," are expected to make the headlines:
 1. The shaft silhouette, a definite if gradual narrowing for 1956 to be seen in column coats, sheath dresses and stem-line lines in sportswear and suits. Fewer full skirted and bloomer swimsuits, more suits with curves moulded in a sleek and unbroken line.
 2. The ubiquitous Par East-Asian theme, even as it has been captivated designers in New York and Paris.
 3. The covered-up look, but here as we've been seeing it. Not it is expected to express itself in camisole tops matched by dainty low backs, as already noted here, and in ensembles—the beach dress that covers the matching swimwear, the little jackets that cover the torso, only more so.
 4. The knitted look, currently a preoccupation of designers everywhere. Newest should be the

Tricks, Tips On Tasty Stuffing

Thanksgiving cometh and turkey is king.

So let's be obvious: let's stuff turkey. We'll begin with the stuffing.

With the market offering a mighty improve small bird, there is no excuse for even a family of two not to serve the traditional fowl.

Here are stuffing variations for your consideration. To your packed stuffing add ½ pint oysters, cooked just until the edges curl, or add 2 or 3 hard-cooked eggs, chopped fine, or ½ cup chopped apples, or ½ cup finely chopped parsley, or 1 cup of cooked dried and drained chopped prunes, or ½ pound of cooked, drained sausage meat broken with the fork into bits.

Would you prefer to make your own stuffing? Here's a Brazil Nut stuffing that will please many. The quantity is enough for a 15-pound bird, or two 8-ounce rounders.

Melt ½ cup, or 1 stick, of butter in a large saucepan or skillet; add ½ cup finely chopped onion and cook over very low

heat until onion is tender but not brown. Stir in 2 cups chopped parsley, 1 cup finely chopped celery and leaves, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 2 teaspoons poultry seasoning. Add 8 cups of soft bread crumbs and toss lightly. Remove from heat, stir in 2 beaten eggs and 1 cup stock or water.

A nice Stuffing.

If you have always used bread stuffing, the time may be here to try rice. Sauté, perhaps, and buy wild rice for the following:

Simmer 1 cup dried onion, ½ cup dried celery in ½ cup melted butter until tender and yellow but not brown. Add ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, ½ teaspoon nutmeg, ½ teaspoon dried thyme. Mix with 2½ cups wild rice, cooked according to package directions.

Brown rice makes a delicious stuffing. Cook 2 cups brown rice until tender, drain and rinse with cold water. Sauté 1 medium minced onion and ½ cup minced celery in 2 tablespoons butter. Add the rice, the cooked and drained grains from the turkey,

Mince And Pumpkin Variations Listed

Thanksgiving means the turkey, but it also means that pie time is here again. Cold, wet days, intensified entertaining, the children home weeks from college, and pie comes into its own, especially mince and pumpkin.

Many good cooks will, of course, have nothing to do with prepared pie crust mixes. At least they won't admit it, but somehow the stuff continues to sell in increasing quantities. There's no doubt about it that one of the first, if not THE first, still remains tops in quality and results. This is Flako, of course.

Mince Pie with a difference is this one. Having prepared your Flako, line a nine-inch pie plate with it. Fill with the following:

Break into small pieces, one ounce condensed packed mince meat and add 1½ cup water and 1 tablespoon sugar. Place over heat, stir until lumps are thoroughly broken, boil briskly for one minute. Cool. Then add 1½ cups chopped cranberries sweetened with ½ cup sugar; or 1½ cups raisins soaked in ¼ cup orange juice; or ¾ cup chopped walnuts combined with ¼ cups coarsely chopped orange pulp.

Moisten edge of crust with water. Cut pastry for top in half-inch strips. Lace them together over the top. Press ends against lower crust and place a twisted strip of pastry around edge of pie. Bake in a hot, 425 degree oven, 30 minutes.

With this serve a hard sauce made by creaming ½ cup butter with one and two-thirds cup confectioners sugar, and flavoring with brandy or rum as desired. This should be chilled before serving.

Family always say they are too stuffed to eat a piece of pie. Pumpkin chiffon tarts may be just enough. Prepare 12 baked tart shells, using your Flako and following its directions.

Blend 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin and ¼ cup cold water. Mix together in a saucepan the yolks of 4 eggs, ½ cup brown sugar, 1 pound can pumpkin, two-thirds cup milk, ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon allspice and 2½ teaspoons cinnamon. Cook over low heat, stirring until it boils.

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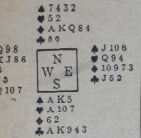
Contract Bridge

A READER'S QUESTION

The hand below was sent in with the query: "Was it possible for South to make his three-trump contract against the best defense, after the natural opening lead of the fourth-highest heart by West?"

South dealer.
East-West vulnerable.



Before going into the question of whether South could or could not fulfill his contract against the best defense, let's conduct a preliminary survey.

Obviously, South should hold up the heart ace until it is given out, because he intends to pass a diamond into the West hand and hope to exhaust that hand of hearts that could be used for communication purposes.

Having taken the third round of hearts, South leads a diamond—and now the fate of the contract depends on West. If West plays nothing, putting in the diamond five as a master of course, the three-no-trump contract is as good as done, because South will scarcely fail to pass this trick into East.

Since the most elementary type of safety play to insure four diamond tricks out of dummy's five. In other words, South will not risk his contract by playing out the A-K-Q of diamonds, he knows that a 3-3 break of the suit is improbable and since he requires only four diamond tricks, he keeps a diamond in his own hand for communication.

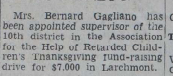
East, after taking his diamond trick, cannot put West back up lead, said declarer easily wins two spades, one heart, four diamonds and two clubs to round out the contract.

All this, however, is a little aside from the point, which is that the contract cannot be made if West simply puts his diamond ace on the first lead of that suit. This neatly destroys South's chance to pass the trick to East and limits South to the three top diamonds.

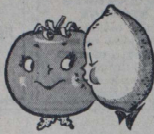

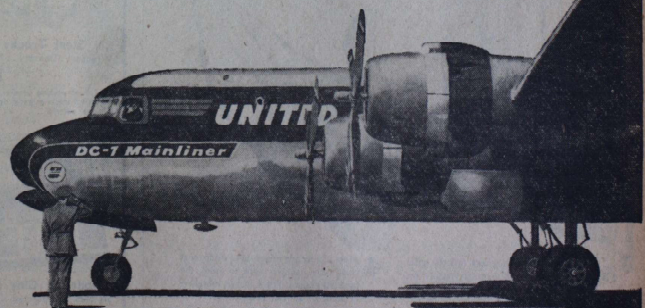

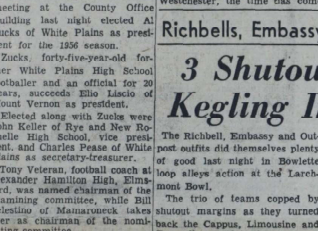

STANCE ADJUSTS ANGLE... On certain days the ball hooks more readily than on others. So it is important that the player be adjusting the stance or striking.



When to meet the changing alley conditions is learned early. 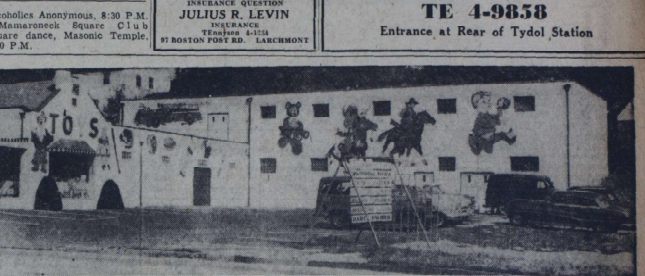

Combing The Town

Dystrophy Drive

Members of the Larchmont and Town of Mamaroneck Fire Departments are collecting funds this week for the Westchester Chapter of the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America Inc.

The fund raising job has been taken over by volunteer firemen throughout the county, the chapter office in Mount Vernon reported. More than 200,000 victims of this crippling disease are listed in the United States, mostly children who will die before reaching teen-age, unless a cure is found.

'In No Military Alliance' India Tells Russians It's On Side Of Peace

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru told there Thursday the Soviet Union's top leaders last night that India is "in no camp and no military alliance." He said the only camp "we should like to be in is the camp of peace and goodwill."

Soviet Premier Bulganin followed with a speech at the State banquet in which he said the Soviet Union has "not lost hopes" as a result of the Big Four foreign ministers' deadlock at their Geneva Conference.

Russia, Bulganin said, is "certain that in the end the four powers will succeed in solving the problems which face them."

The Soviet Premier and Communist Party boss Khrushchev said he was delegating to a state visit to India, Burma and Afghanistan.

The Russians banqueted after visiting the Taj Mahal at Agra, where Khrushchev said the Soviet Union wished to help India become strong industrially "to assure its freedom and independence."

On Saturday Bulganin in a speech called Russia and India "allies" and offered to share Russian experience in atomic energy, industry and electric power.

In his banquet speech, Nehru said there is a deep friendship between India and Russia but he added:

"We are convinced it is not by military pacts and alliances and by piling up armaments that world peace and security can be attained." The camp of peace should include as many countries as possible and be opposed to none."
