Over-Hospitable Woman Advised To Call a Halt

By EMILY POST. An instance of over-extended hospitality is described vividly in this letter: "Little by little an old friend of my husband's has acquired the habit of bringing his special gift friend with him to our house almost every evening. The gift has no home of her own and they know we'll always be in, because we have no one with whom to leave our children. 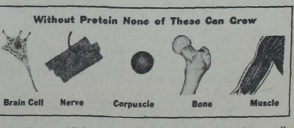

VOTERS REPEAL P. A. VOTE PLAN

YONKERS—The proportional representation method of electing city councilmen which had been in effect nine years, was repealed yesterday by a vote of 31,684 to 29,975, a majority of 4,369 for a return to election of council members by vote, and city-wide election of a mayor.

In 1938, Yonkers voters adopted the City Manager form of government, with election of councilmen by P. R., the first such council had been chosen in the 1939 election to take office Jan. 1, 1940.

When the P. R. form of voting was adopted the membership of the council was reduced from 19 to five, with the number being increased to seven later. As a result of yesterday's voting there will again be 12 councilmen representing each ward of the city.

Under the present city charter the mayor and vice mayor have been chosen by a separate proportional representation method among the councilmen.

The proposal, which had the support of 100,000 Republican and Democratic organizations in the city, was the second effort to overturn the P. R. system. Four years ago the voters defeated two proposals which were advanced by the two parties. This year, the political organizations took no official part in the movement until shortly before the election.

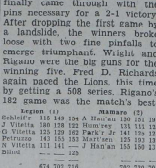
