WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson today announced that he had set in motion a possible movement of the seat of government from Washington if the city ever becomes the target for an attack.  
 These plans include movement of the command of the Army, Navy and Air Force from Washington to a safe place.  
 The secretary said that "certain definite steps" have been taken to insure the continuity of a destructive military attack at the seat of this government. He did not disclose these steps.

 Wiley previously had asked Johnson to move the seat of government from Washington to a safe place.

War II Cost to U. S. to Reach 1 1/2 Trillion Dollars, Says Gray

By The Associated Press World War II ultimately may cost the United States more than \$1,400,000,000, Secretary of the Army Gray said today. That's nearly one and one-half trillion dollars.

In a speech prepared for delivery to an Armistice Day audience at Greenlawn, N. C., Gray said the high cost of the war is the excellent reason for keeping the United States military machine powerful.

He said a military strong United States might discourage another war precipitated by an aggressor, or might insure victory if war comes.

Gray declared that the army still wants two steps taken to assure its strength: (1) Retention of the Draft Act on the statute books instead of letting it expire next year. (2) Adoption of a universal military training system.

Gray was one of a number of notable war participants in Armistice Day ceremonies. The nation's observance was led by President Truman, who was to place a wreath on the grave of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery.

The President had an Armistice Day speaking engagement at a luncheon meeting of the National Conference of Christian and Jews in Washington.

Numerous other government notables, military officials and civic leaders across the nation recalled in speeches the need for peace and urged the need for military readiness to prevent another.

"A 16-year-old looks at Armistice Day" might be the title of the following editorial which was written by John Tubb, a Mamaroneck High School senior, and appears in this week's issue of the school paper, The Record. The attention of The Daily Times was called to this editorial this morning by Joseph C. McGinn, principal of Mamaroneck High School.

A day off from school—that is what Armistice Day brings you. But is that all that day means to you? If you are the average American, Armistice Day means that you stop work, of whatever you are doing, at eleven o'clock in the morning, but your head for a few seconds, and perhaps every day a little, that there may be no more such mass slaughters such as the one whose ending is celebrated by Nov. 11.

Twice within a period of 25 years, the scourge of war has hit the world, and yet, even today, people talk about a third world war, and so naturally a war is inevitable, apparently not realizing that should another world war occur, it would probably mean the destruction of civilization. However, the people who agree that war is inevitable don't take this into account at all. Their prime concern is that there is another large power in the world, whose ideals and principles differ with ours, and so naturally a war is the only way to settle these differences. Logical, isn't it?

Armistice Day should not mean more to every youth today than a day off from school, a short glimpse of the horrible consequences of the two world wars, and a prayer for those who gave up their lives for their country. It must be a constant reminder to every person in this country of the uselessness of war, and of the need for peaceful settlement of differences. It must be a constant reminder that should another war come, and so naturally a war is the only way to settle these differences. Logical, isn't it?

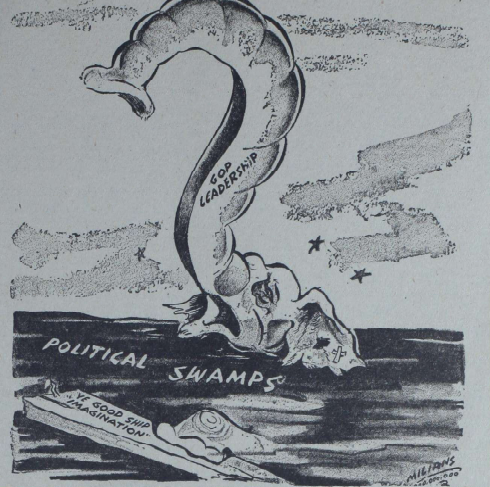

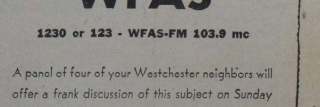

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Another Federal Agency Sees Planned for Miner's Benefits

By RAY TUCKER
WASHINGTON.—The alleged disquisition of John L. Lewis's pension fund for 40,000 coal miners and the general extension of government systems to other parts of the industry is expected to result in creation of another vast federal agency to supervise the collection and distribution of benefits which will eventually total many millions of dollars annually. Members of Congress and the Truman administration have already discussed the plan in closed conferences. Their theory is that management of so much money, in view of its broad effect on the national economy, cannot be left to the arbitrary control of the unions or the corporations. Inasmuch as the cost for these pensions amounts to a tax on the public in the form of royalties, which are reflected in the price level, advocates of the scheme contend that even private retirement programs are clothed with a public interest.

DISPUTE.—They also point out that the government may have to assume charge for protection of the prospective beneficiaries. In the event of strike and shutting down a union, as has happened in the United Electrical Workers in recent weeks, there will be a dispute as to which group of workers should be paid. The logical method of settling rival claims would be through the courts. But pending months and possibly years of litigation, the money would be tied up and workers entitled to benefits would suffer. They would protest their penniless during the protracted arguments.

Another reason for federal control, according to proponents of the idea, is that all these pension benefits are being integrated with the present social security system. The payments from industry in general are supposed to tie in with a benefits amount to a monthly income of approximately \$10 a month. SECRET.—The ultra secret handling of the Lewis pension fund will provide powerful arguments for government control, so many of the mine bosses maneuver have already forced Washington to crack down on its casualization. Government officials and members of Congress have been provoked by its arbitrary management of a fund which amounts to almost \$100 million a year.

The UNW's welfare money is supposed to be handled by a board of trustees consisting of Mr. Lewis, an operator's representative and a third neutral party. So far, however, Senator Styles Dildes of New Hampshire, the third member, has usually voted with the mine leader. But he now admits that he is dissatisfied with the distribution of so many emergency payments and concludes that he lacks detailed information on the welfare operation.

EMERGENCY.—Director of the fund is Miss Josephine Roche, former Colorado mine owner, an erstwhile official in the Roosevelt administration and a longtime personal friend of Mr. Lewis. He selected her, and she is entirely loyal to his interests. She will give out no data on the reasons for payments or the amounts of the current balance, except under Congressional subpoena. Miners themselves are reported dissatisfied with management of the fund. Emergency payments, which brought a recent

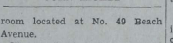

GRASS ROOTS EVIDENCE WE HAVE since election been critical of the unsuccessful efforts made by the Republican Party to return United States Senator John Foster Dulles to Washington, for we consider his defeat a national loss. We have also pointed to sharply reduced royalties for Republican candidates in Westchester. It has been our contention that the Republicans coasted instead of working; that they held parties and clamorings among themselves instead of rousing the doorbells of independent voters.

There appeared in the White Plains Reporter Dispatch on last Wednesday a letter from Mrs. David Vallancourt which makes our point far better than could we, for hers is an actual case, a fact instead of theory. Mr. and Mrs. Vallancourt, registered Republican voters in Greenburgh, moved two years ago to White Plains. Never since moving to their new home, said Mrs. Vallancourt, has either her husband or herself been approached by a representative of the Republican Party. And she continues:

Last year, during the Presidential campaign, when I should think all of the Republicans should have been diligently working, we did not even know we were to register and vote, and because I had two small babies to care for, I had neither the time nor inclination to make a half-dozen phone calls to find out. As a result neither my husband nor I bothered to cast our votes.

"This year my husband was contacted by the Democratic Party so he enrolled and voted Democratic. To date I haven't been contacted by either party, so if it isn't worth their effort to try and gain my support, it isn't worth my effort to get out and vote.

In a closing may I state that I can't imagine Vio Marcanolet letting two votes go to waste in the White Plains district. If that happened in White Plains where the GOP organization is comparatively active, it could happen in many other places in Westchester.

We wonder how many times the Vallancourt case has been multiplied in the 439 election districts in Westchester? Why, only five such two-vote families in each district mean a difference of almost 5,000 Republican votes. And if those families, affected by the lack of interest of the GOP, turn Democratic, it means a difference of nearly 10,000 votes.

Westchester elected a Republican Congressman last year by a majority of only 10,089 in the Westchester portion of the district.

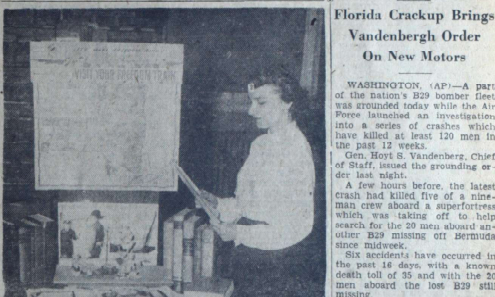

WHERE'S THE RUB?... AS leaders of organized labor claim, it will be a simple matter next year to unseat United States Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio. Why have these labor leaders and their affiliated Democratic Party chieftains experienced such difficulty in finding an opposition candidate?

Governor Frank J. Lausche, Ohio's Democratic Governor, has reiterated his flat declaration and has openly intimated he takes the attitude because of agreement in so many matters, including labor reform, with Senator Taft.

Or could it be that the disinclination of potential candidates is based upon their knowledge that the people of Ohio will themselves have something to say in the matter?
