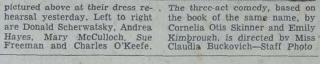

WESTCHESTER'S PREFERENCE

IT IS not at all too early to give thought to the best manner in which the voters of Westchester may express next Spring their preference for Presidential candidates for the 1952 elections.

Ordinarily, we have only Fall primary elections. But in the years of Presidential elections we have Spring primaries. At these the delegates to the respective national conventions of the parties are chosen by the voters.

Usually, this is a cut-and-dried affair. The Republican and the Democrats pick their delegates and alternates, place their names upon the respective ballots, and the voters have no other choice unless they indulge in a "write-in" campaign on their own volition.

The point we now raise, then, is whether any choice is to be given next Spring to voters whose views may not coincide with the attitude of the leaders of the two major parties in Westchester.

Let us assume, as now seems likely, that the GOP leaders of Westchester will go along with the expressed views of Governor Dewey and sent to their national convention delegates who are pledged to support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Here, it seems to us, is a question which cannot and should not be settled by any others than the voters themselves. They are the ones who are to be governed and who are to pay the taxes. Accordingly, they have the right to have their preferences made known.

What we would like, specifically, in the Spring primaries, is the chance for Westchester voters to cast ballots for their particular candidates. We don't like the idea of only one choice on the ballots of either party.

For those citizens who are not willing to give blank checks to the respective national convention delegations, we suggest some thought be given to this problem.

HOW'S THINGS ON THE FARM?

THE period between Thanksgiving and Christmas, with that festive day marked by bounty upon the family table, is one wherein we might well concern ourselves with the situation of the man who provides much of such seasonal provender—the American farmer.

How does he fare under present economic conditions? The U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics, separating wheat from chaff and moulting dry figures into plain facts, reports that he hasn't much to worry about right now. In fact, it looks like a pretty good year for Mr. American Farmer.

Net income is expected to be almost as high as in the record year of 1947. And while the 1951 farmer won't buy as much, an official estimate is that, for agriculture as a whole, farm incomes this year went up about 10 per cent more than farm expenses.

Average net income per farm from 1940 to 1950 more than tripled, according to the Office of Price Stabilization. And in the same period, reports the Federal Reserve Board, the dollar value of farm real estate more than doubled. At the same time the amount of farm real estate mortgage debt decreased by one-eighth. And total liquid assets of American farmers of \$4 billion in 1940 went up by 1951 to \$20 billion.

That is, it seems to us, an excellent balance sheet. Only one column, however, is a little less than ideal. Within a period of one year, from April 1950 to April 1951, reports the U. S. Bureau of Census, more than a million persons left American farms. So, the question of labor is serious.

It seems that the farmer must rise early and work hard. And who likes to do that these days?

THE HARD-TO-GET-INTO CITY

ONE of the silliest proposals this year was that of the fellow who ran unsuccessfully for Council President of New York City—well, now, let's see, what was his name? Oh, yes, Sharkey. Well, remember, he wanted to put a tax on commuters coming into the metropolis.

Well, there's another one just as absurd now. A member of the New York City Planning Commission has suggested a 25-cent charge on the Harlem and East River bridges. Since there are tolls already on the West Side Highway, on the Triborough and on the Whitestone bridges, this would pretty well hem in New York City so nobody could get in at all without paying a fee.

If this sort of thing keeps up, what with rising railroad and bus fares, the time may not be far distant when practically everybody will ask whether getting to New York City any time at all is worth the cost.

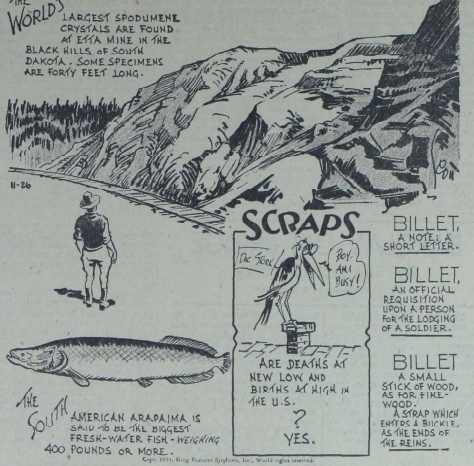

# Local Gridders Have All-County Openings Since Policy Change

Tomorrow the results of the voting among coaches, officials and athletes in Westchester for the 1951 All-County grid squad will be revealed, as a quick resume of the county's history in the last decade seems appropriate at this time.

Without question, Westchester County Publishers Inc. has done a huge stride forward in determining just who the so-called experts think are the best schoolboy footballers of the year. The biggest jump was the decision to bring into consideration players from schools in surrounding jurisdictions. B. C. and even D. Until 1945 the annual poll was restricted to gridder from only the largest schools and consequently White Plains, New Rochelle and Port Chester dominated the selections. There was a huge gap of four years between the naming of Al Hunter to a halfback spot on the 1945 first team and the fullback post in '48. The gap was, of course, the absence of Mamaroneck players on the team. Munter was a real triple-threat who stood out like a sore thumb on a sub-par team. His eleven white Doyne's recognition marked the first step up the county ladder for Mamaroneck High. In 1945, Doyne had a winning season for the first time in almost a decade but there has not had a winning season since then.

No deal player received enough votes in '47 but in 1948 Doyne had an undefeated season that included five wins and two ties and set a record for the county. He was voted the top left halfback on the county Class B squad. MRS. Doyne was on the first team in '48 while Tiger guard Joe Staropoli and tackle Carl Huber made the second team. The following year Staropoli was elevated to All-County status and Joe Peterson made the status as second-string backfield man.
