Liberation Near Allies Tell Greece

Landing In Force Now Imminent, Gen. Wilson Says In Broadcast

ATHENS RADIO TAKEN

Rome, (AP)—Gen. Sir Henry Maitland Wilson, supreme Allied commander in the Mediterranean, said in a broadcast tonight that "A force under my command is about to land in Greece" and that the kingdom's liberation was "a matter of days."

Unofficial reports said that the Greek flag was flying over the Acropolis in Athens and that the Athens radio was in Allied hands. Allied proclamations were broadcast promising immediate aid to Greece.

Gen. Wilson told the Greeks: "Your day of liberation is at hand. For the second time in history, a force under my command is about to land in Greece, but I am thankful for any under your different conditions."

The Allied commander declared: "We come now to sweep away all traces of the invader and with Greek patriots endeavor to harness his retreat." He said the Allies were also returning to restore Greece's administrative services.

Gen. Wilson's broadcast tonight indicated an Allied landing in Greece was imminent, as contrasted to the rather small force employed in the Peloponnese.

U. S. INFANTRY DIVISION BATTLES WAY INTO AACHEN; SWORDS CROSS PRUSSIA BORDER AT 3 POINTS

Reds Also Race Toward Austrian Frontier

LONDON, (AP)—A Paris broadcast heard by Reuters said this morning that "the Russians are reported to have crossed the East Prussian border at three different points."

MOSCOW, (AP)—Russian tanks and infantry stormed the centuries-old Junkers' lands of East Prussia, barely 10 miles north-east of the important city of Tilsit today, while in doomed Hungary the victorious Red Army raced for the 160-mile-distant Austrian frontier.

The East Prussian frontier was cracked in the Memel sector. Hitler annexed this region from Lithuania in 1922, recovering Prussia's main rail lines here for hundreds of years before the first World War.

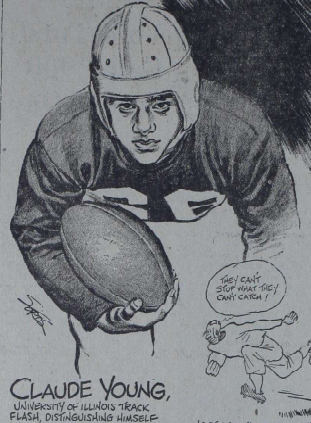

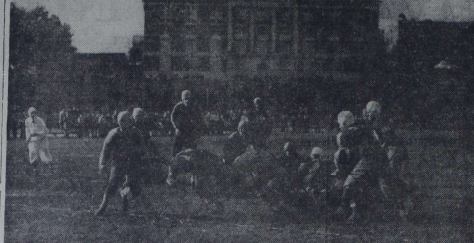

Noted Author To Carry On Writings Here

Carl Crow, the author, has purchased the house and an acre of surrounding woods at 45 Orchard Street, just off Halsted Avenue, Mamaroneck. He will take possession Nov. 1. As soon as arrangements can be secured, he will erect a study on the banks of the Beaver Brook which bounds his property and here he plans to do his writing.

Mr. Crow has lived at the Grayson Club in New York most of the time since his return in 1937 from Shanghai, China. It is as a writer about the Far East that he is best known. Born in Highland, Mo., and educated at Colleton College, Mo., where he was a member of Phi Delta Theta, Mr. Crow began his newspaper career as a printer's devil in 1908, and for some years was a reporter on the Fort Worth, Tex., Star Telegram. In 1911 he went to China where he was assistant city editor of the China Press. He spent 1912 and 1914 in Tokyo as business manager of The Japan Advertiser. During the first World War he was Far Eastern representative of the committee on Public Information. From 1917 to 1927 he was the owner of an advertising agency in Shanghai which he was forced to abandon when the Japs took Shanghai.

His first book was "A Handbook for China" published in 1921. He gained international literary fame with the publication of "400 Million Customers" in 1927 in English, Spanish, French, German, Italian, Swedish, Danish, Dutch and Polish editions.

He gained additional reputations as an authority on the Far East with the publication in 1928 of "The Chinese Are Like That" (published in London as "My Friends, the Chinese"), "Foreign Devils in the Flowery Kingdom" in 1940, "Japan's Dream of World Empire" in 1942 and "The Great American Customer" in 1942.

Following a tour of South America in 1941 he published "Meet the South Americans," followed in 1942 by "The Great American Customer." He has made two trips into China for American magazine articles. He has been a frequent contributor to magazines on Far Eastern subjects.

He is at present completing a history of one of the great automotive industries of America for Winter publication.

Mr. Crow lived briefly in Program Manor, where Mrs. Crow died, after his return to America from Shanghai.

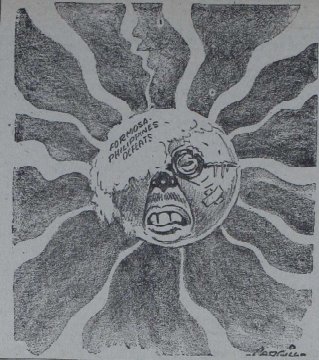
