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Dior Breaks Girdle Bonds, H Line Ends Era Of Torture

NEW YORK — Whatever the fate of Dior's new "H" line, his chief by-product should earn him the lasting gratitude of every woman who has borne her tortured undergarments with Spartan fortitude.

For with the foundation he designed he has changed the entire concept of corsetry engineering. With neither straps to pull on shoulders, nor the usual alternative of bone ribbons into the flesh, he has ushered in a new era of comfort.

The construction principle resembles a T-square: two curved wires under the bust, for the top, and several rows of flexible spiraled wire down the length of the front. The latter is a pretty panel

of lace or contrasting satin. The bust cups are an inch and a half higher than in standard garments, rounder, and with less separation in the center. This, as I've already pointed out, elongates the rest of the figure by contrast. It also serves to "mini-mize" the bosom, so that even a mature and buxom figure is given a more youthful appearance.

The bra top of his all-in-one does not arch as high at the neck, and unseparated, their fastenings may not be spiraled wire. But Dior, they don't cut anywhere near the 880 top of the Dior corsets.

Some even incorporate his decorative front panel of contrasting color and lace, and make all in nylon, including the power-nylon.

shes and feather boning. It lifts the bust slightly, waists the figure into a longer, more look, and has a new inner hip-band that is said to make for split second fastenings.

Dior has also designed short bandeaux in this new lifted and rounder silhouette, made with conventional shoulder straps, and worn with companion girdles whose "high waist" reaches right up to the bra. His entire foundation collection is now being manufactured here.

U. S. Collections Influenced

Dior's influence already has affected other American collections. Waist, hip, and full length garments (his own three important lengths) have a modified bustline that is less high, rounded, and unseparated; their fastenings may not be spiraled wire. But Dior, they don't cut anywhere near the 880 top of the Dior corsets.

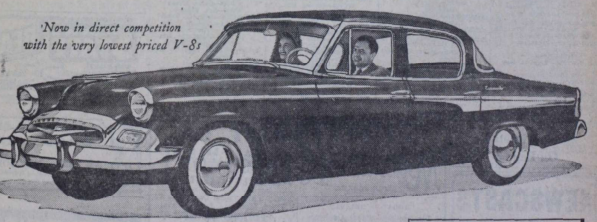

It's all over! The Mamaroneck Cardinals, after a long and determined uphill battle, finally won the Shaugnessy playoff championship in an exciting and dramatic Central Westchester Double League finish at Inver Hill yesterday.

Yonkers' Curt Dunham tossed a best-of-three series by downing the Redbirds in the morning affair, 6-3, forcing a third encounter—and what a battle it was! The Cardinals won the thrill-packed nightcap in eight innings, 2-1.

Lack of daylight nullified the tying run scored by Yonkers in the ninth frame, and caused the most lustrous finish in league history, as the Dunhams victoriously protested the calling of the contest for approximately 45 minutes following the climax of the CWBL campaign.

Sacramento's Reilly Completes But Five, But All For Scores

If P. E. Bellows had hopes of mates 45 yards to right, tossing winners ways at the expense of Blessed Sacramento Saturday at the Daniel Warren Field, it should have picked a day when Terry Reilly was suffering from trouble from throwing that they skin around too much.

With its annona snow blown out to sea, the air over Los Angeles was diffused with the scent of roses today. And under the air around the Golden Gate is especially heavy, you could smell the same aroma, in Columbus, Ohio.

It may be only the last week in October elsewhere, but in those two spots it's Jan. 2, 1955, and Southern California and Ohio State, a pair of upstarts in the Pacific Coast and Big Ten conferences, are battling in the Rose Bowl.

The Trojans and the Buckeyes got past big threats this past weekend to remain unbeset in their leagues. After surprising California 28-27 last Saturday, Southern Cal now needs only a form performance against Oregon State, Stanford and Washington in conference play. The Trojans then wind up against UCLA, but the champion UCLA can't return to the Rose Bowl.

Ohio State Wisconsin Ohio State moved out of its darkhouse role last weekend by beating previously undefeated and second-ranked Wisconsin 21-14. The fourth-ranked Buckeyes now must dispose of Northwestern, Purdue and Michigan.

One-batter Michigan made it a two-team race in the Big Ten with its 3-0 rout of Minnesota, previously unbeaten and No. 8 in the nation. The Wolverines like an Indiana tie Saturday on the way to what may be a win-

ter-take-all showdown with Ohio State Nov. 20. The Rose Bowl also apparently will have an unexpected edge. The Razorbacks, No. 7 nationally, added to their unbeaten record with a clear-cut 49-0 rout over fifth-ranked Mississippi.

The Bruins ranked No. 3, made a 133-point note during No. 6, returning to action against Navy after an idle weekend. Navy carried up for the battle with a 33-14 victory.

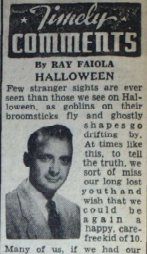
