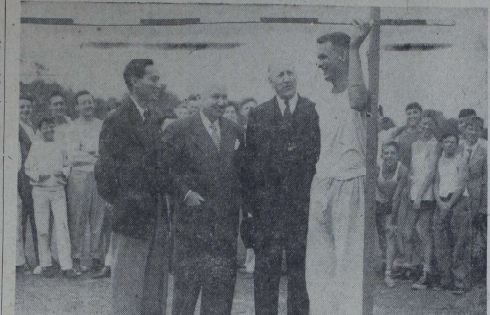

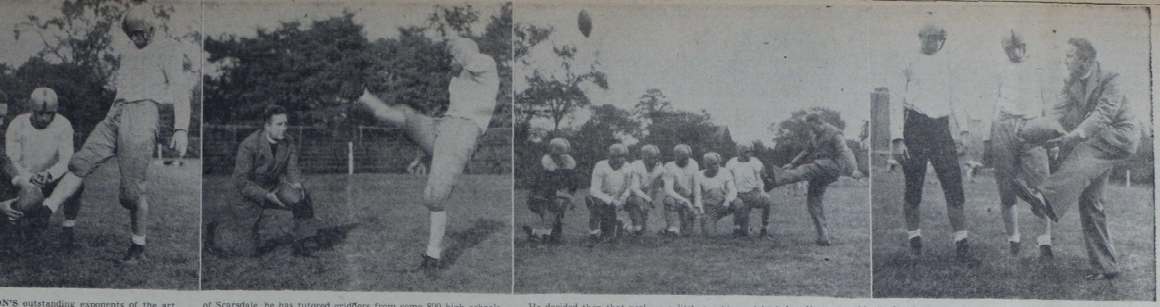

In including these second line performers, Rickey was in position to bring up catcher Steve Tombo and second baseman Everett (Rocky) Bridges from Montreal, and first baseman Dee Fong from Mobile. All six are considered first prospects.

The New York Yankees brought up Phil Hinrichs, a righthanded power pitcher from Kansas City, at the same time sending righthanded pitcher Ralph Burton down to their American Association farm club and releasing veteran Hugh Casey.

The Yankees paid a \$40,000 bonus to Hinrichs last year after he was declared a free agent by Commissioner A.B. Chandler.

He was the first bonus player in the Yankee organization. Two days ago they acquired another, Billy Martin, from Oakland and purchased along with infielder Bill Mauer from the Oakland club of the Pacific Coast League.

DAVID'S ISLAND in Long Island Sound off New Rochelle has borne many names. It was originally included in the Indian grant of 1640 to the Dutch West India Company.

The island's military history runs from leased use to the Camp General Hospital in 1861, with both Union and Confederate soldiers treated, to government purchase in 1867, and the official naming as Fort Stocum in 1896.

It was at Fort Stocum that soldiers trained for action in San Domingo in 1870. Four companies went from the island to protect property along the Chicago River.

Originally purchased for \$38,500, David's Island now contains improvements valued at many millions. It is prebarricated with what would bring at auction. But there is strong likelihood that it would be a tangible program developed for communal, educational or industrial use.

British Modernization Plans Seen Threat To U. S. Program

By RAY TUCKER WASHINGTON—British foreign, financial and industrial leaders have taken to heart the wise American criticism of their outmoded and out-fashioned technique of production, salesmanship and distribution which the dollar crisis provoked several weeks ago.

Their modernization of their economy and industrial plant, however, may be a disadvantage to U. S. competitors for some time.

Under the auspices of an Anglo-American Council sponsored by the administration, the British are making a serious study of our mass production and mass sales system. Select committees of owners, managers, foremen and working groups are scouring our factories in the same way that their purchasing commissions investigated and lived in munitions plants during the war.

British experts, mostly young and forward-looking men, have penetrated our steel, textile and automobile, mining, shipping and public utilities. They have been given full access to government reports in those fields. Only the national trade secrets have been withheld from them.

Generosity—It is doubtful if any nation ever opened up so completely on the human and material resources which made great as the United States has within recent months. As one prominent British visitor said, "It is like a gift."

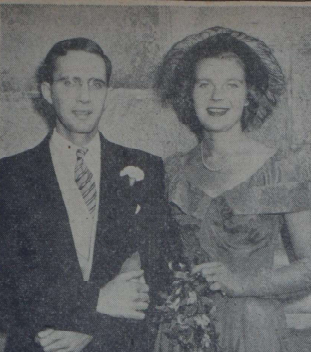

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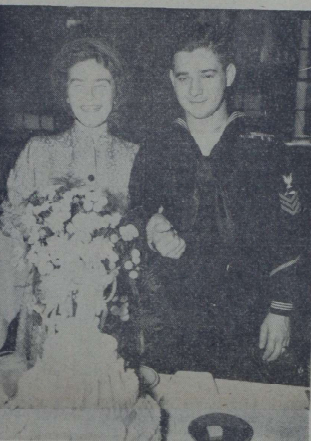
