WEDDING DUTIES

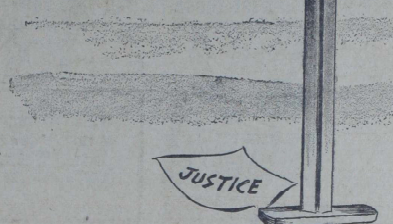
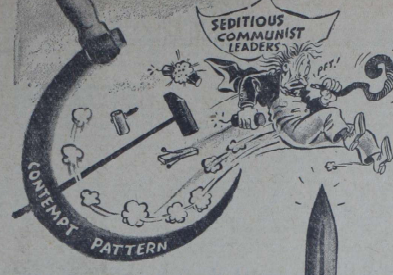

COST OF ONE STRIKE

THE 168-day-old strike of 7,500 employees of a sewing machine plant in Elizabeth, N. J., has ended. It was the first in the company's 75 years of operation and did tremendous damage to employees and employer without any appreciable benefits whatsoever. Conservative estimates place the loss to employees at \$10 million and to the company at \$24 million. Incalculably more loss, such as its prestige and trade lost to competitors which cannot be regained, cannot be measured in dollars. And merchants of Elizabeth are estimated to have lost \$24 million too, more than the total of wages because such funds pass through many hands, all of them potential store customers. Thus we have in dollars an overall loss of nearly \$60 million. The employees of the company represent about 20 per cent of the working population of Elizabeth. Many of their families were reduced to destitution and the taxpayer load because of relief and welfare costs was staggering. What was gained? The CIO union objections to a bonus-pay or "incentive system" lost. The union's fight for a general wage increase lost. Only a small percentage of workers not affected by the bonus-pay plan received slight increases of from two to six cents an hour. There was also some slight benefit in new interpretations of seniority rights.

Although the Elizabeth strike was one of the longest and costliest in New Jersey's labor-management history. Nobody may win a strike, any more than anybody wins a fire or an earthquake. But this strike in Elizabeth, in its paralysis of the economy of a large city, in its tremendous losses to workers and to the company, is particularly strong proof that everybody can lose a strike.

CAREERS AT STAKE

WHEN General William Mitchell placed his reputation and military career at stake after World War I to prove his theory that air power had outmoded the battleship, the outcome was a forced resignation. Yet after World War II was ended, and long after General "Billy" had died, vindication came to his memory in the award of a posthumous medal "in recognition of his foresight in the field of American military aviation." The protests now of high Naval Chiefs against policies of the Secretary of Defense which would weaken the air arm of the Navy while increasing the prestige and power of the Air Force itself are not quite along the same line. General Mitchell fought for recognition of air power; the Navy is fighting for what it considers its proper share of that air power. General Mitchell's reputation at that time may have suffered. But later events proved him largely in the right. And those who then differed with him, including a certain Assistant Secretary of the Navy by the name of Franklin D. Roosevelt, were subsequently proven to have been far more of the course than was the General. It may be that history repeats. Certainly both fighting factions within the Department of Defense cannot be right. And all on whatever side, might well review the case of General Mitchell. For now as then important careers are definitely at stake.

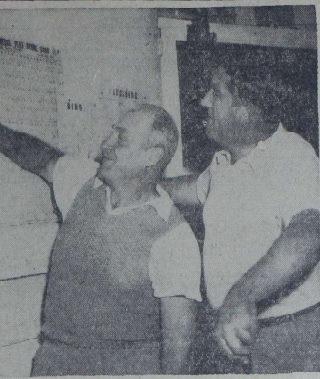
