ALBANY—A low bid of \$15,606 for the construction of a storm drain system on a section of Route 1 in the Village of Mamaroneck, according to New York State Superintendent of Public Works Bertram D. Tallmy.

The two sessions of liaison officers today lasted three hours and ended with a large tent erected by the Communists across the highway for four lashed-roof huts that make up Panmunjom.

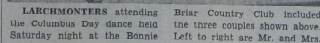

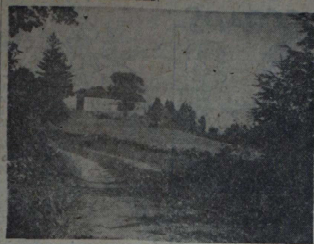
### Teen-Age Tribulations Theme Of Third Novel By Mary Stolz
