

Tigers Go on Road To Roosevelt; Bellows Plays Host To Bronxville

Rough Riders Rule Favorites To Beat MHS

Although neither the line nor backfield has really shown to date, Mamaroneck's forward will get the supreme test tomorrow at Yonkers when Coach Harry Harrison's charges try to snap out of their trance with one of the best Roosevelt High School teams ever assembled. The game will be played, starting at 2 P. M., on the Roosevelt field and the home team will be wearing the robes of favorite. Despite some blows from fate that could ruin any team's morale, Mamaroneck's grid warriors have retained their faith with that hope to get into the victory column on a major upset. They have played carefully in all three games and have nothing to show for their efforts except a tie. Now, caution is no longer necessary and Coach Harrison has thrown it out the window.

With fans of the injured players able to play as yet, the Tiger platoon cannot make any real shifts of personnel. However, he has cooked up some backfield switches that may see various ball-carriers operating from two or two different spots during the game. Those manning the line will be used, of course, only if the Orange-clads have trouble scoring. With only two tries to show for three contests, that possibility looms large.

Roosevelt Ledged
Last year, during Mamaroneck's first undefeated campaign, the Tigers had to rely, besides down against a club Coach Harrison termed the best he'd ever seen, on the prowess of their backs. The line has been the real strong point but the backs have been progressing and they now run a pretty fair variety of attack.

Fred Bobb has been inserted as a Roosevelt halfback starter via good showings in the win over Port Chester and the defeat to powerful White Plains and Yonkers. Rochelle Pete Amato remains the quarterback, with Frank Tricoli playing the other halfback and Charlie Hatcher operating out of the fullback post in the T-formation offense. Tom Egan and Jim Ryan are a pair of good wide receivers who play around and can amaze the aerialists. Roosevelt led a big and rugged White Plains last week but they then collapsed under a second-half onslaught. This is a completed 14 of 13 passes and rushed for only 7 yards, their low for the season.

Some observers wonder why Roosevelt continues to play so many large schools, but actually the Yonkers school has an enrollment of almost 1,500 students, a sizeable contrast is Mamaroneck's, which stands at about 600 now. Nevertheless, the Tigers are determined to beat this one and they can rely on the determination of their loyal roots in doing it.

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County Golf Courses Host 200,000 Players

From a small beginning 25 years ago public course golf in Westchester has grown to provide recreation for more than 200,000 players each year, on the four county - owned - and - operated courses.

By the close of the current season—which will be extended as late as weather permits—almost four million golfers will have enjoyed the 18-hole layouts according to the Park Commission. The constantly increasing patronage has led county officials to consider the advisability of adding to the facilities.

It is estimated that fewer than 16,000 played during the first short season at Mohanic, the first of the county courses, which opened July 15, 1926. More than 10 times that many have played the county courses already this year, with about 60,000 additional rounds expected before the end of the year.

County Golf Courses Host 200,000 Players

More Courses Opened
Two years after Mohanic's opening, the Maple Moor course was opened, followed at similar intervals by Sprain Lake and Saxon Woods.

The influence of location on play is vividly demonstrated by the result at Saxon Woods, which has rolled up a total of more than one million players in the slightly more than 20 years since it opened Aug. 1, 1931. Maple Moor, in business since July 19, 1927, has also drawn more than 1 million while Sprain Lake, which opened June 20, 1929, is slightly under that mark. Mohanic, most distant from population centers, is nearing the 500,000 mark.

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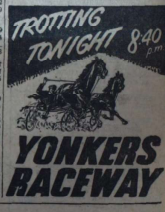

Primed to put the right pitch and making every move a well-calculated one, Bellows' tight end, Pete Lenzi, found success at over Bronco, 25-14 Saturday before a crowd of about 2,000 at Daniel Warner Field. Coach Jack Pearson's Panthers thus registered their second straight impressive triumph and didn't have to march more than 34 yards to get any of their four TDs. They waited for the openings and then hammered away with ground-crunching force.

Frank Pokorny, husky Bellows wing, was the shonoff performer in the runner surge and he was in better time than at any time since he transferred to the River Neck school two years ago. Pokorny took a 39-yard run at

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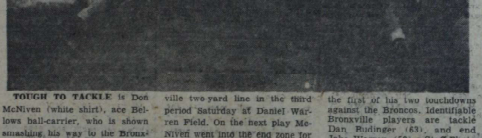

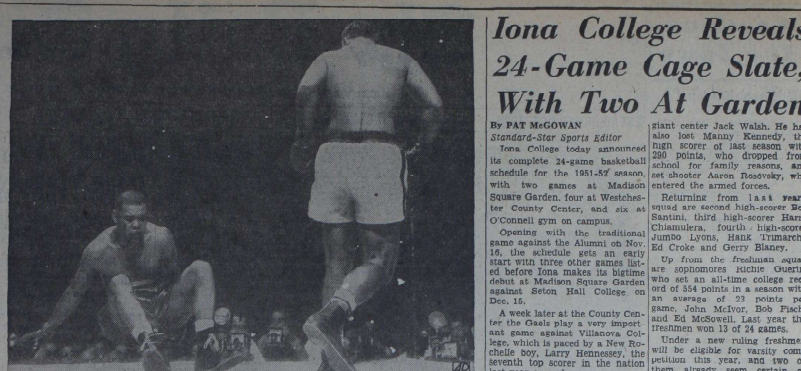

NEW YORK, (AP) — Insurgent stevedores ended their boycott of military ports today, but otherwise there was only a small dent in the dock strike that has immobilized the world's biggest port. For the first time since the ship-docking, today waterfront shut-down began, defense loading and unloading jobs apparently were fully manned, except for longshore piers.

Picket lines disappeared from the military docks in Staten Island, Jersey City and at Brooklyn's huge Army base, where more than 500 rebel strikers streamed back to work.

But while they along the miles of idle docks, pickets still marched. Only on one Hudson River pier did pickets line up. For a second day in circumventing the picket barriers.
