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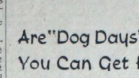

Touch Of Fur Is Highlight Of Winter Season Fashion

NEW YORK — Fur—in small doses—is the rule this season. Often it shows up in unexpected doses—in the rule this season. Laces, dyed mole makes the top

of Volupte's compact, dark mink edges Mme. Adrienne's bra, and white mink, no less, covers an ice bucket in Carole Stupp's peach Madison Avenue empurium. Still others, far from the toppling of coats, suits, and dresses; from Henry Rosenfield's mink-collared bodged dresses, to Triere's Persian ascots. Dior's mink one, and R. S. Zuckerman's ashle shawl. The last named also features fur trimmed theater costumes, as do Jack Fath of Joseph Halpert, and Hannah Troy. Mink appears on utility fabrics, too; on chiffon, in Dorothy Dickerson's separates, on lace gowns, at Countess Alexander.

'One Touch of Fur'

You could call it "one touch of fur." It's widest application is on coats and suit jackets, as scarfs, or as important looking collars, shown in almost every designer collection. More important still, it's used as linings—most practical when the coat or jacket can reverse to its fur side, giving the wearer two-for-one, a cloth coat and a fur coat, frequently without soaking her for the fur tax.

The use of flat furs keeps them from looking the least bit bulky. Monte Sano lines a reversible coat of blood fleece with exactly matching sheared racoon. Built for warmth and luxury, without the practical consideration of reversing, he lines a wrap coat of gray plaid with gray kidina; a tapered coat of thickens and broadcloth with black seal fur; and a tapered coat of high-litre

black sealcoat with dark mink sides (they're less costly and less bulky than the backs).

On Collars, Too

When the coats are not lined with fur, Monte Sano likes to give them collars of mink, leopard, or peccot; these collars stand away from the neck, so that they are unobtrusive, and those that are turned down, the fur is never repeated at the wrist, which are uncutted, or self-cuffed.

Even Lo Balbo's popular priced coats reverse to fur linings. A tawn color coat reverses to its mink side, with matching mink collar and cuffs on the companion suit, while a dark blue coat reverses to seal that's dyed to match. Several of his boys suit jackets are lined with American processed leopards in either white or black.

Young Seymour Fox, who started the whole vogue for reversible a couple of years back, has a large collection of fur lined and reversible coats and suit jackets on tap, all non-savable. His suits with reversible fur jackets are fine fare because the jackets are wonderfully supple and cut with just enough flare for both dash and for wrapping. He calls them "town suits," because they are "warm enough" to go solo almost until it snows. He does them in Fortstarm broadcloth-lined with mode on broadtail, the latter particularly good in dark blue, and in oatmeal lined with blood or dark mink.

Non-reversing fur linings make news here, too. Fox lines the back of a suit in a black-and-white "eyelash" like wool with white muskrat, a fitted coat with "eyelash" in the same material, has a white mink shawl collar. Unfurled suits and coats carry their lush boas-toles (they're short enough not to be unwieldy) of black fox, or silver fox lined with ruy ruy.

Ben Zuckerman's many fur-lined box coats—and fur-lined dresses—are also uncuttable. And rich looking, in his currently favorite shades of tawn and taupe. One of the most stunning is a cashmere costume dyed the same shade of taupe as the coat's mink lining; the matching dress is lighter only in weight. Its fabric a mixture of silk and wool.

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR EXPERIENCE

IN PUBLIC life—just as in private business—there is no substitute for experience. And yet during the heat of a political campaign, the candidate who secures the loudest often attracts the most attention regardless of his fitness for the office he seeks.

This condition is particularly apparent in this year's Rye Town election where Mr. Postillipo, the Democratic nominee, who is waging a vigorous campaign for Supervisor, is showing loud and often in an obvious effort to drown out any question about his qualifications for the job.

Despite his lack of experience in town affairs, Mr. Postillipo is unquestionably a gentleman with many fine personal qualities. As he matures he should go far in political life. But Mr. Postillipo is still cutting his eye teeth as mayor of Port Chester, a position to which he was only recently elected. Because he is doing such an excellent job, we believe that his defeat on Tuesday will render a service to the Village of Port Chester which elected him with the understanding that he would serve out a full term.

Let's take a look at the comparative experience Mr. Postillipo and his Republican opponent have to offer in return for the \$11,500 job they are seeking from Town of Rye taxpayers.

In addition to his uncompleted first term as mayor, Mr. Postillipo served for six years as a Port Chester Village trustee. His unsuccessful bid for the supervisorship two years ago was his only other foray into town politics.

Against Mr. Postillipo's meager background, let's see what Mr. Kuhn, his Republican opponent, has to offer in the way of experience.

Mr. Kuhn has served the Town of Rye for more than 20 years. Starting as town auditor in 1932 he subsequently became Justice of the Peace, an office he held for two years. In 1934 he was chosen as a member of the Town Board, a position he held with distinction for 17 years. He has been town comptroller for two years and in recent months has been acting as Supervisor.

There is no phase of town government in which Mr. Kuhn has not had thorough personal experience of an intimate nature.

But that is not all.

In addition to this training, Mr. Kuhn served on the Mamaroneck Village Board of Trustees for six years. He has been a member of the Village Republican Committee for 30 years, during eight of which he was chairman. A resident of Rye Neck for 40 years, Mr. Kuhn is widely respected as a political power and has exerted a far-reaching influence for good in the village political arena. As an active member of the Haledale Manor Hose Company, he has been a volunteer fireman for 31 years.

His many years of valuable experience gain added significance when the caliber of his service is considered. He is a firm believer in good government and has been responsible for leading many qualified men into public service.

One of the outstanding reforms he championed brought many thousands of dollars into village coffers by cracking down on long delinquent taxpayers. His efforts were responsible for scrapping the old tax lien evil which today has been replaced by in Rem foreclosure proceedings.

The people of Rye Neck are particularly fortunate in having the opportunity to vote for a man who knows virtually every family, every building in what has come to be known as Kuhn's bailiwick.

Because of his political prestige over the last 30 years, Mr. Kuhn's voice on the County Board of Supervisors will be respected.

His Democratic opponent, inexperienced in both politics and government, would be a pitifully weak representative on a strongly predominant Republican county board.

Two other Rye Neck residents appear on this year's ballot; both of whom we recommend as also deserving of emphatic support.

On the Republican ticket, Judge Reuben Sirin is seeking election for his first full term as Justice of the Peace. His education, experience and by the capable manner in which he has performed his duties during the few short months of his incumbency, Judge Sirin is entitled to the favorable consideration we feel sure he will receive.

On the Democratic ticket, Peter C. Doern, Jr., popular and personable real estate broker, in offering his services as school director. A true Democrat, a man of principle, a leader for the things in which he believes, Mr. Doern has never related his wholesome influence on village affairs. He is a champion of the movement to consolidate Rye Neck and Mamaroneck and as president of the Westchester County Rally Board, ranks high among his fellow craftsmen.

Mr. Kuhn, Judge Sirin and Mr. Doern are men of character and experience; the type of official for whom we would be proud to vote. Their election will be a credit to their community and their town.

HIS IS THE WRONG WAY

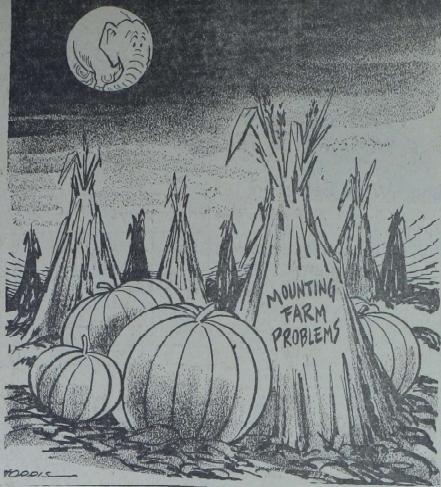

However, this milk is analyzed and kept from the market and not sold by the retailer. This milk does not reach the pasteurization stage in preparation for the market. The Westchester Department of Health and Cornell University brought up this information when they made a joint survey of marketable milk a few years ago. Any further questions about milk may be answered by the Dairy Council of Westchester, Inc., at 75 Lake Street, White Plains.

Mamaroneck's undefeated Tigers and the F. E. Bellows Panthers will both continue football play tomorrow, but most of the local and County interest will be focused on the oval schedule for the Mamaroneck High and high-flying Roosevelt Indians.

The Tigers, winners of four consecutive, have only been scored on once, but have been riddled with numerous minor and a few serious injuries in tough battles against Pelham and Gorton the past two weeks. They have a speedy single-wing attack that has not displayed any aerial potency as yet, but has been effective on the ground. The Main defense is excellent, but the reserve strength is below par.

Mamaroneck is expected to break through air and win a close decision. Coach Frank Torres has completely juggled his lineup in hopes of making the necessary changes to get his rapidly-skidding Panthers on the winning path again. However, doing so will probably present quite a problem, because the Harrison Panthers have been improving each week, and are in top-notch condition for tomorrow's battle.
