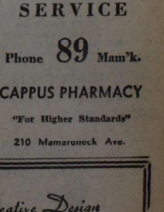

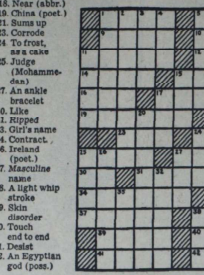

Elementary school teacher who first opens the eyes of a child to the world of possibilities that education can bring?

"Then, the modern school is a far cry from the little red schoolhouse which seems in actuality to have been a rather grim and forbidding place, where all was controlled by an ill-trained school master who stood before the class with a McCaffrey Reader in one hand and a birch rod in the other. Again, a far cry from the modern sympathetic, understanding teacher.

"The generation that was young at the turn of the century had at least one great advantage over the generation that looks over the chaos of the nineteen forties. Life was still comparatively simple and in a simple society education could afford to be a simple thing. It could concern itself largely with reading, writing and arithmetic and a training in the mores of the community. In our complex society a different type of

OBEDIENCE A NUSSANCE!
To the "How About It?" Editor:

Is there any logical reason why motorists still get summoned and fined in the Town of Mamaroneck for parking violations? Approximately 10 years ago the State of New York established a law requiring cars to be so when all cars were manufactured with reflectors on their taillights. New York City, New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, Port Chester, Harrison, Yonkers and even Larchmont immediately relaxed the enforcement of local ordinances requiring the observance of this ordinance, unless regulation; but the Town of Mamaroneck still pesters visitors and residents alike with its enforcement.

It is a sheer waste of batteries and light bulbs, not to speak of the injustice done to visitors who in all probability never receive any such regulation. If the Police Department is forced to issue summonses because the local government hasn't relaxed the code, it seems to me that the Police Court judge could at least give suspended sentence to first offenders.

PREVENT HOLDUPS
To the "How About It?" Editor:

The business section of Larchmont lies between the Post Road and the railroad tracks. Within it is one bank and a theater. Now take the classified section of the telephone book and count up the number of stores, gas stations, etc., etc., listed therein. You realize that Larchmont is a flourishing community. Also you see visualize the amount of money which passes from the trader to the tradesman, from the employer to the employee on a work day. On a Saturday multiply your mental calculations three or four times and you arrive at the conclusion that a large amount of money is circulating outside of the bank over the weekend.

What happens to this money? Many merchants do not have adequate safes. Some ask the police to pick it up on Saturday night and to hold it until it can be taken to the bank. Still others carry it home.

Last Monday night Larchmont was visited by holdup men. Professional robbers first learn what they can expect to the amount they will take. They next study the town and the layout of the place they intend to rob. In this case it was the theater. At the point of a gun they straddled with money which had been looked in the safe. Had the manager of the theater been bold-headed, or stubborn and refused to open the safe he would have been killed.

Now why were robbers able to rob a small community theater of roughly \$1,000? During July and August the one and only local bank is closed on Saturday. When a legal holiday falls on the following Monday it means there are no banking facilities from Friday at 2 P. M. until the following Tuesday at 8 A. M. Every Larchmont citizen knows this.

The next holiday in Larchmont may not have such a fortunate ending. The loss of money is distressing but a human murder is a tragedy for which no insurance can pay.

How can this be avoided? Perhaps it can't. But one thing which may help to prevent it is a night deposit in the local bank in Larchmont. If this is too much

Betty's quick little eyes seemed to say these sporting dogs before her were coming along very nicely. Like other Tuesday evenings, there were about 30 of them practicing with their masters in the Riding Hall of the Crawford estate on Lincoln Avenue.

The Port Chester Obedience Training Club, boasting nearly 50 dog-lovers, is one of the oldest clubs of its kind in the country. "Amateurs trained by amateurs," their aim is to inculcate "companionship, obedience and usefulness" in their dogs.

Jerome R. Allen, Jr., recently returned from Naval duty, is president and either his wife or George W. Allen of Mamaroneck generally act as trainer. The handlers are taught such still puppals as "sits," "down," "sit" and "lie." Performing on a leash, they are taught to follow their masters in a figure-eight.

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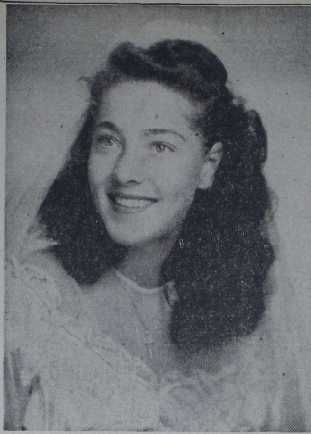

Schools Up Insurance By \$397,000

Rye Neck Board Raises Fire Loss Protection To \$1,078,000

SURVEY REPORT MADE

As the result of an exhaustive survey of the fire insurance held by the Rye Neck School Board, Malcolm D. Brown, chairman of a special insurance committee appointed last month by President Raymond T. O'Connell to study the situation, recommended last night that the Board purchase \$397,000 additional fire insurance on the three buildings. The present insurance based on the in-place value for the district property is \$681,000, a figure set in 1936, and the new fire insurance will total about \$1,078,000.

Mr. Brown was assisted by Truman G. Everett, H. Smith and Edgar B. Burckhardt, Jr., in making the study, explained that the present insurance policies so that a fifth of the entire insurance bill is paid each year will eventually meet the new insurance will average about \$500 per year but that the first year's bill will add about \$1,320 to the 1944 bill the board is already paying for its fire insurance.

John P. Fox pointed out that the 1946 budget was figured close to the minimum requirements and asked Clerk Edward J. Lister to check the procedure for transferring funds to the insurance fund. Mr. Campbell said that the committee arrived at the figure recommended stating that three appraisals had been made of each building. The high and low estimates differed only slightly on the Daniel Warren and Bellevue High School buildings but \$50,000 on the two insurance company appraisals of the Barry Avenue building. High and low appraisals of the Daniel Warren building were \$172,000 and \$481,000; of the Bellevue High School building, \$460,000 and \$443,000; and of the Barry Avenue building, \$249,900 and \$196,000.

The figures were determined after consulting Robert B. Rogers, Jr., a resident of the village who offered an engineering estimate without charge. Rogers recommended that the two insurance company appraisals on the Daniel Warren and Bellevue buildings be used, and suggested a figure of \$228,000 on the Barry Avenue building.

The new insurance, then, based on 80 percent of the appraised values, was listed by Brown as follows: buildings, Barry Avenue, \$85,000; Bellevue, \$133,000; and Daniel Warren, \$109,000; and contents, Barry Avenue, \$104,000; Bellevue, \$20,700; (Continued on Page Three)

The Village completed the arrangements for the transfer of the deed to the Post this week and when the deed became the possession of the Legionnaires yesterday they reimbursed the Village the \$100 originally paid the Town.

The Post formerly used the old Armory Hall on Barry Avenue as headquarters and for the last year has been meeting in a rooming house at 100 Mamaroneck Avenue, quarters which have proved too small to accommodate the membership which now numbers about 275.

At the A & P and Safeway stores completed plans to close 740 street trolley for the duration of the strike, union and employer officials said there was little prospect for a quick end to the 15-day old strike.

John E. Strong, president of Local 877, key unit in the dispute, said he saw no chance for an agreement "for at least a week."

The United Parcel Service, which hauls merchandise to Westchester and other sections for warehouse department stores, furniture houses and other firms, said about 1,000 of its 1,700 drivers and helpers were on a "wildcat" strike today and no store merchandise would be picked up.

The strikers seek a 30 cent wage hike, a reduction in working hours from 44 to 40 hours a week and changes in working conditions. The operators have offered a flat \$3 a week bonus. O'Dwyer proposed a compromise wage increase of 18 cents an hour but was rejected by the trolley operators and union members.

Comprising the committee are: Mayor William O'Dwyer, president of the Federation Bank and Trust Company, chairman, John A. Coleman, chairman of the Board of the New York Stock Exchange, executive secretary of the N. Y. State Board of Mediation.

Hopes For End Of N. Y. Truck Tieup Brighten

NEW YORK, (AP)—Prospects of a settlement of the trucking strike that has shut down many industries and food stores in New York City appeared brighter today after a breakdown in negotiations between the union and an employers' committee.

The sold front of employers was broken by two large firms which offered the union a reduction in working hours and a \$7.40 weekly pay increase and union representatives unanimously agreed to accept the proposal and their membership at a meeting today.

Mayor William O'Dwyer's advisory committee reported the offer made by the H. C. Bohack Company, Inc., and Daniels and Kennedy after the unsuccessful conclusion of the committee's talks with organized employer representatives and officials of Local 808, 282 and 816, International Brotherhood of Teamsters (AFL).

The committee reported at the same time that one of the three employer associations, the Master Truckers of America, had asked that it be allowed to deal with the union apart from the other two. A spokesman at City Hall, who declined to comment, said the name, said it was hoped that the union membership, which last week voted not to authorize signing of separate agreements, would go along this time with the "divide and conquer" strategy.

Only the membership of Local 807 now ratifies the agreement. The other two locals have empowered their negotiating committees to enter into an agreement.

Joseph M. Adolzi, chairman of the joint wage scale committee representing the motor carrier association and the state motor truck association, said in a statement that the new wage offers were "outstandingly out of line" and would be opposed by his group. He also said that the team, delivery service of 375 department and specialty stores remained at a standstill and the wages of Local 804, International Brotherhood of Teamsters (AFL) disregarded instructions of their executive committee and refused to return to their jobs at the United Parcel Service Inc.

OSISING—The publicity stunt which the "Westchester Save Our Homes Committee" opposing United Nations Headquarters in the County had planned for the Courthouse steps in White Plains was transferred to this village Saturday afternoon, after County Executive Herbert C. Gerlach and Supervisors' Chairman Richard H. Levitt had declined to participate in the White Plains demonstration.

With brass band blaring in a chartered bus, followed by several cars carrying members of the committee, 50 leaders of the movement to "save our homes" in Westchester drove to the Courthouse here and played upon the lawn while committee workers stuck a number of their placards upon the walls and entrance to the County Executive's home.

About 50 cars started out in the driveway, according to a committee spokesman, but got jammed in the heavy traffic. Of the starters, 27 cars arrived at the Gerlach home but the Harrison delegation never did get there, the spokesman said.

The change in the setting of the demonstration came after Mr. Gerlach and Mr. Levitt had declined on Friday the proposal of the committee's press agent that they share in the spotlight. Mr. Gerlach explained that he would not lend the prestige of his home to any propaganda campaign either for or against the United Nations location in Westchester.

When they were told that his committee desired to present a petition to the county board in their offices any weekday prepared to receive the committee and the petition, Mr. Gerlach told them to accept the committee's decision to participate in the stunt, which was to include photographs and movies of the United Nations location in Westchester.

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Among the show's guests, who flew to Niagara Falls as fliers of the Army Air Forces in two C-47 planes from Mitchell Field, Incumbent Maj.
